1 INTRODUCTION

The following report outlines the Public Participation activities conducted as part of the Environmental regulatory processes for the proposed Transvaal Gold Mining Estates Limited (TGME) Existing Underground Mine Redevelopment Project, Pilgrim's Rest, Thaba Chweu Local Municipality, Mpumalanga Province ("83 MR project").

2 PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PROCESS

The Public Participation Process (PPP) offers stakeholders an opportunity to be informed about the Proposed Project, to raise issues of concern and to make suggestions for enhanced project benefits. The PPP has been undertaken to ensure compliance with the relevant legal framework applicable to the proposed 83 MR project.

2.1 Applicable Legislation

The PPP as required by the environmental laws and regulations specified therein will be followed as best practice. The PPP will be undertaken in line with the statutory requirements for public participation. The following legislation will be considered when developing and implementing the PPP:

- ❖ National Environmental Management Act, 1998 (Act No. 107 of 1998) (NEMA)
- ❖ Public Participation guideline in terms of NEMA;
- ❖ The Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) Regulations, 2014 (as amended);
- ❖ The Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996;
- ❖ Protection of Personal Protection Act, 2013 (Act No. 4 of 2013) (POPIA);
- ❖ Promotion of Access to Information Act, 2000 (Act No. 2 of 2000) (PAIA); and
- ❖ International good-practice guidelines for public participation and the Core Values of the International Association for Public Participation.

2.2 Objectives of the Public Participation Process

The PPP objectives for this project are to:

- ❖ Ensure that stakeholders are informed about the proposed 83 MR project
- ❖ Provide stakeholders with the opportunity to participate in the environmental regulatory processes.
- ❖ Involve stakeholders in identifying ways in which concerns can be addressed.
- ❖ Work directly with stakeholders throughout the environmental regulatory processes to ensure that stakeholder concerns are consistently understood and considered.
- ❖ Verify that stakeholder comments have been recorded and addressed.

The stakeholder engagement process will be undertaken in four phases as presented in Table 2-1 below:

2.3 PPP Approach

2.3.1 Landowner consent

Engagement activities were undertaken with the directly affected landowners and land occupiers for the proposed 83MR environmental authorisation application. In terms of the provisions of the Environmental Impact Assessment Regulations, 2014, as amended (most recently in June 2021), *“if the proponent is not the owner or person in control of the land on which the activity is to be undertaken, the proponent must, before applying for an environmental authorisation in respect of such activity, obtain the written consent of the landowner or person in control of the land to undertake such activity on that land”*.¹

2.3.2 Submission of the Environmental Authorisation Application Form

An application for an Integrated Environmental Authorisation listed in terms of NEMA was submitted to the Department of Mineral Resources and Energy (DMRE) on **Monday, 29 November 2021**.

2.3.3 Stakeholder Identification and Analysis

Project stakeholders are defined as individuals/ groups/ entities who:

- ❖ Are impacted or likely to be impacted directly or indirectly (positively/negatively) by the proposed project; and
- ❖ May have an interest in the proposed project. They include individuals/groups/entities whose interest may be affected by the proposed project and who have the potential to influence the project outcomes.

To ensure a proper representation of all stakeholders, the following identification methods will be used as part of the stakeholder identification and analysis process:

- ❖ WinDeed searches for the directly affected and adjacent farms;
- ❖ Desktop and online research;
- ❖ Developing a list of relevant community authorities;
- ❖ Identifying the relevant ward councillors for the affected wards;
- ❖ Consulting landowners and land occupiers;
- ❖ Land claimants (if there are any);
- ❖ Consulting government departments relevant to the project;
- ❖ Stakeholders who respond to the publication of newspaper advertisements;
- ❖ Stakeholders who respond to the distribution of project documentation; and
- ❖ Updating the stakeholder database from attendance registers from meetings.

A stakeholder database has been compiled and will be updated throughout the environmental regulatory process (**Appendix E1**).

2.3.4 Land Claims Enquiry

A formal Letter of enquiry was compiled and sent to the Land Claims Commission, Mpumalanga Department: Agriculture, Rural Development, Land and Environmental Affairs (DARDLEA) Office of the Regional Land Claims Commissioner: Mpumalanga Province on **Tuesday, 28 September 2021**. The letter contained a list of all the directly affected properties for the project. Should DARDLEA confirm that there are land claims on the affected project areas, our project team will consult with the relevant parties (**Appendix E2**). A follow up email was sent to DARDLEA on **Tuesday, 23 November 2021**, to date no response has been received.

2.3.5 Communication and Engagement

2.3.5.1 Public Participation Materials

Considering the legislative requirements and good practice, the following documents were developed and distributed to stakeholders. The various PPP information materials which were used as part of the project information disclosure process.

Background Information Document (BID): The BID (**Appendix E3**) provided important information regarding the following:

- ❖ A project description of the proposed 83 MR project.
- ❖ The Scoping and EIA and the PPP to be undertaken in support of the relevant environmental authorisations/permits and the contact details of the Environmental Assessment Practitioner (EAP) and the stakeholder engagement consultants.
- ❖ Details about how stakeholders can register as an Interested and Affected Party (I&AP) and be kept informed about the project developments.
- ❖ The public review and comment period for environmental reports; and
- ❖ Invitation to attend an open day.
- ❖ The BIDs were emailed on **Tuesday, 30 November 2021**, and hand delivered to project stakeholders registered in the stakeholder database (**Appendix E6**). The BID is available on the following websites:

Comment and Registration Form: An I&AP registration form was sent out to stakeholders to register formally and/or to submit comments (**Appendix E3**).

Newspaper advertisements: A newspaper advert (**Appendix E4**) was placed in *The Steelburger*, on **Thursday, 2 December 2021** and *The Lowvelder*, on **Thursday, 2 December 2021**. The advert included the following details:

- ❖ Brief project description.
- ❖ Legal framework, the competent authorities.
- ❖ How stakeholders can access the Draft Scoping report for public review and comment.
- ❖ The details of the open day.
- ❖ Registration as stakeholders.
- ❖ The contact details of the EAP and the stakeholder engagement consultants.

Site notice: The site notice provides an overview of the project and highlights the applicable legislation, environmental authorisation/ permits applicable to the project. It also outlined the stakeholder engagement process to be followed and where relevant information could be obtained from. A locality map of the project site was included in the site notice. Details of the open day and how stakeholders can register as I&APS were included in the Site Notice. Pictures and co-ordinates of where the site notices were placed were also recorded in the site notice report and a site notice map was developed (**Appendix E5**).

Notification Letter with a Comment and Registration Form: An email was sent to stakeholders to inform them about the proposed 83 MR project. The email also shared details of the open day and invited the greater public to formally register as I&APs. A Comment and Registration Form was also provided for stakeholders to use for formal registration and to submit their comments or concerns (**Appendix E3**).

Telephonic discussions: Stakeholders are also consulted by means of telephonic discussions. These discussions facilitate the process of inviting stakeholders to stakeholder meetings and provide stakeholders with a platform to raise issues of concern and suggestions regarding the proposed 83 MR Project. Comments and/or concerns raised through telephonic discussions are recorded and addressed by the project team (EAP and the relevant specialists).

2.3.5.2 *Scoping Phase Consultation*

Pre-application meeting: Pre-application meetings were aimed at engaging with key stakeholders regarding the Proposed Project to obtain initial comments which informed specialist studies and project planning. The project team presented an overview of the proposed 83 MR project, locality, infrastructure and land tenure maps were distributed as part of the meetings. Furthermore, meetings were also held with directly affected landowners on a one-on-one basis. Subsequent to these meetings, minutes were developed, and the stakeholder database was updated.

All comments raised by stakeholders during these meetings were captured into the Comment and Response Report (CRR). Responses to comments were provided in line with the overall project scope and available information (**Appendix E9**).

Authority Meetings: Authority meetings were held with various Organs of State, the purpose of the meetings was to discuss the MR 83 project and obtain initial comments which informed specialist studies and project planning. The project team presented an overview of the proposed 83 MR project, locality, infrastructure and land tenure maps were distributed as part of the meeting. Refer to (**Appendix E8**) for a list of meetings and consultations that were undertaken.

Landowner Consultation Meetings: Consultation meetings were held with directly affected landowners on a one-on-one basis. An overview of the Proposed Project, land tenure and locality plans were presented. Landowners were provided with an opportunity to raise issues of concern and comments/suggestions regarding the Proposed Project. Refer to **(Appendix E8)** for a list of meetings and consultations that was undertaken. Outcomes from these meetings are recorded in the landowner/ land occupier engagement reports **(Appendix E8)**.

Site Visits: The purpose of the site visit was to share the impacts of the primary threats to the receiving environment including the Blyde River, in the context of the proposed promulgation of an extension of the Morgenzon Forest Nature Reserve over certain of TGME’s 83 MR mining right areas; and to receive input from relevant stakeholders. After the site visits, minutes were developed, and the stakeholder database was updated. **(Appendix E8)**.

Stakeholder engagement meetings: Stakeholders are invited to participate through virtual and non-virtual engagements. One-on-one consultation meetings will be held via on-line forums such as Microsoft Teams, or telephonically. On-line engagement activities will be available during the public review period. Additionally, an Open Day will be held at the **Town Hall, Main Street, Pilgrims Rest** on **Saturday, 15 January 2022 from 10H00-14H00**. please see below (Table 2-2) for the proposed stakeholders’ meeting schedule.

Focused efforts will be made to engage with directly impacted stakeholders (those residents in the Project area, or with assets in the area), including vulnerable groups at local level. These individuals will be consulted directly and via their representatives, and other influential people within communities. Meetings will be held in a culturally appropriate manner, allowing stakeholders to voice their opinions and/or concerns openly.

All comments raised by stakeholders during these meetings will also be captured into the Comment and Response Report (CRR). Responses to comments will be provided in line with the overall project scope and available information.

2.3.5.3 Availability of Reports for Public Review and Comment

2.3.5.4 Consultation Undertaken as part of the Final Scoping Phase

The aim of consultation during the Final Scoping Phase will be to focus on the formal EIA process, specialist impact studies, Terms of Reference and addressing comments/concerns from stakeholders. Once the Final Scoping Report is submitted to the DMRE, stakeholders will have the opportunity to verify that their comments were captured during the draft Scoping phase, and to review responses provided by the project team. 2.3.5.5 Consultation with Stakeholders during the Impact Assessment Phase

Consultation with stakeholders during the Environmental Impact Assessment phase entails providing stakeholders with comments on specialist study findings, recommendations and mitigation measures proposed. These studies and recommendations will be included as part of the Environmental Impact Assessment Report and the Environmental Management Programme (EIA/EMPr). Stakeholder meetings will also be held to present the findings of the specialist studies and to get comments from stakeholders. The format of stakeholder meetings will be similar to the Scoping phase, these will be determined on a case-by-case depending on stakeholders' preference.

2.3.5.6 Consultation during the Decision-Making Phase

Once the competent authority has come to a decision regarding the authorisation of the project, all registered stakeholders will be notified of the decision made and the appeal process to be followed. The decision from the Competent Authority (CA) will be communicated to stakeholders by means of notification letter (electronic and hard copies), SMS, local newspaper advertisement, posters at publicly accessible areas and on Kongiwe's and OMI's websites.

PURPOSE OF THE DOCUMENT

This Background Information Document (BID) aims to provide you with important information regarding:

- ❖ The proposed TGME Existing Underground Mine Redevelopment Project - Clewer, Dukes and Morgenzon (CDM), Frankfort, and Beta North;
- ❖ The Environmental Impact Assessment and the Public Participation Process to be undertaken in support of the proposed project;
- ❖ An Integrated Water Use Licence Application process;
- ❖ How you can register as an Interested and Affected Party (I&AP) and be kept informed about the project developments; and
- ❖ The public review and comment period for the Draft Scoping Report.

INTRODUCTION TO THE PROJECT

Transvaal Gold Mining Estates Limited (TGME), a subsidiary of Theta Gold Mines Limited, is the holder of a mining right, with reference number MP30/5/1/2/2/83MR (83 MR), granted in terms of the Mineral and Petroleum Resources Development Act, 2002 (Act No. 28 of 2002) (MPRDA) over various properties in the Pilgrims Rest area. TGME propose to redevelop some of its historical underground mines, namely Clewer, Dukes and Morgenzon (CDM), Frankfort, and Beta North within its exiting mining right area.

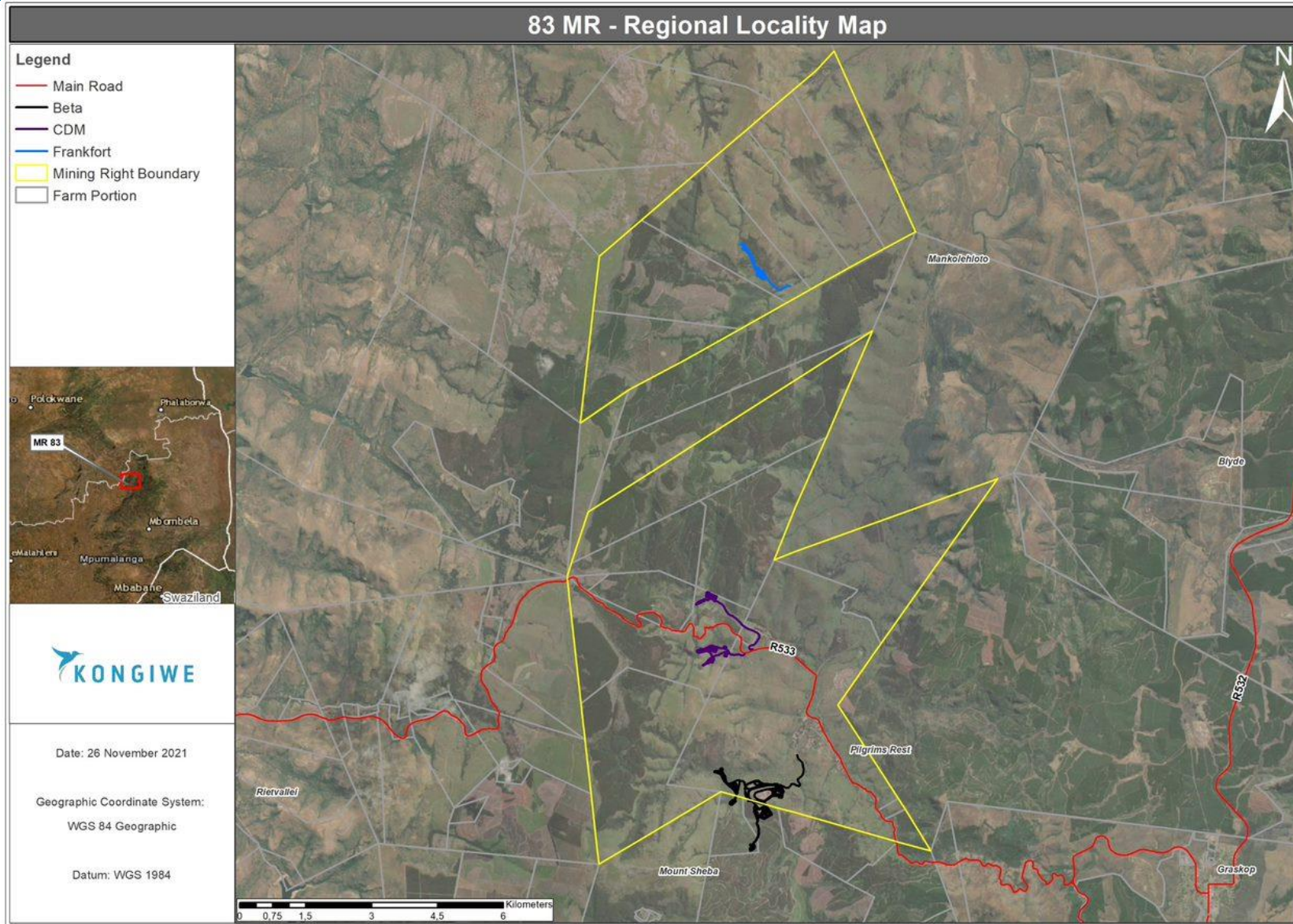


Figure 1: Regional Locality Map

The proposed project will require additional surface infrastructure to support the underground workings, the expansion of the current Tailings Disposal Facility and an upgrade of the old TGME process plant. The surface infrastructure layouts have been designed within previously disturbed areas where possible. Figure 1 below shows the extent of the proposed project and the location of the proposed surface infrastructure.

Various approvals are required to be obtained by TGME in terms of environmental legislation from the Competent Authorities before commencing with the proposed project. OMI Solutions (Pty) Ltd (OMI) has been appointed as the independent environmental assessment practitioner to undertake the Scoping and Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) process in terms of the National Environmental Management Act, 1998 (Act No 107 of 1998) and the Environmental Impact Assessment Regulations, 2014 (GN R982 of 2014, as amended) which is aimed at critically evaluating the potential environmental and social impacts of the proposed project. Kongiwe Environmental (Pty) Ltd (Kongiwe) has been appointed as the Stakeholder Engagement practitioner tasked with conducting the associated public participation processes.

LOCALITY

The mining areas are located close to Pilgrims Rest, Mpumalanga. The Beta underground mine is closest to the TGME processing plant, which is located just southwest of the town of Pilgrims Rest. CDM is located approximately 2.3 km west of the town and the Frankfort operation lies 9.3 km northwest of the town.

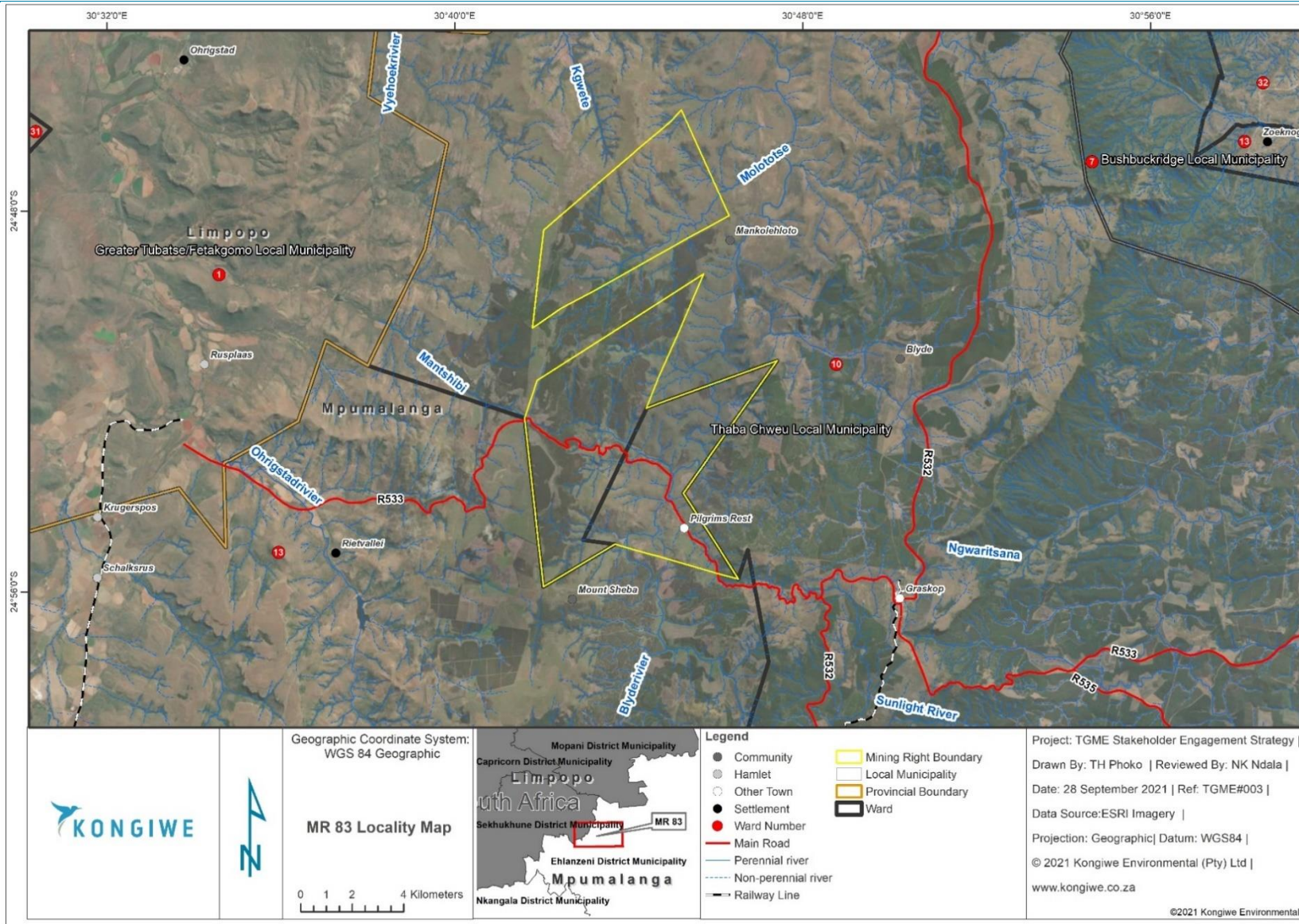


Figure 2: Locality Map

INFRASTRUCTURE PROPOSED FOR THE PROJECT

It should be noted that some infrastructure is already in existence, pursuant to the authorised mining right, and additional infrastructure will be constructed and some infrastructure upgraded within TGME's mining right area. The additional infrastructure will include, but not be limited to:

- ❖ Trackless mobile machinery ("TMM") workshops;
- ❖ Fuel and oil storage facilities;
- ❖ Power distribution transformers;
- ❖ Water supply and distribution infrastructure;
- ❖ Dewatering system;
- ❖ Surface water management infrastructure;
- ❖ Mine residue facility;
- ❖ RoM stockpile area; and
- ❖ Dense medium separation plant

ACCESS

The R533 serves as the main access route to all three mining operations. A provincial gravel road leads from the R533 to the Frankfort operation.

- ❖ **Beta North Project area** is located 1 km southwest of the TGME process plant. The Beta North underground works will be accessed via the Beta North decline. The road to the site crosses the Blyde River. For the operation and mining of the Beta deposits, the haul road and crossing over the Blyde River will be upgraded.
- ❖ **The Frankfort Project area** is located 9.3 km north of the plant area via a gravel road. This road crosses the Blyde River on several occasions. For the operation and mining of the Frankfort deposits, provision has been made in the capital budget for haul road construction and river crossings.
- ❖ **CDM Project area** is located 3 km north of the plant area and is accessed via a gravel road. The CDM project area is close to the R533 and does not require the construction of an additional haul road as the existing gravel road is deemed sufficient for the operation and mining of the CDM deposits.

POWER AND WATER SUPPLY

An Eskom consumer substation located near the operations supplies 6.6kV electricity via a single overhead line to the TGME plant. Current infrastructure and supply will need to be expanded to the planned mining areas. This would require an application for an upgrade to Eskom's supply capacity, which would necessitate the installation of larger transformers at the Eskom consumer substation.

As the existing grid supply will initially service only the process plant area, diesel generators will be required to supply power to the **Beta North project area** until the grid power supply infrastructure has

been upgraded and expanded. Once complete, overhead power lines will be installed to supply grid power to the Beta project. This will form part of a separate authorisation process in consultation with Eskom.

The Frankfort and CDM project areas currently have no access to grid power. These two operations will also require the use of diesel generators until the grid power supply infrastructure has been upgraded and expanded to these mines.

Water supply is an essential service as both the processing plant and the underground mining operations are heavily reliant on the availability of water. Apart from the mining and process requirements, potable water will also be required.

Service water sources available to the **Beta North Underground Mining area** consist mainly of water sourced from the underground workings, surface water (dirty run-off rainwater) collected as part of the project's water management activities, and abstraction of water from the Blyde River under an approved authorisation. Water will be stored in a reservoir and potable water tanks.

Service Water sources available to the **Frankfort Underground Mining Area** consist mainly of water sourced from the underground workings, surface water (dirty run-off rainwater). The Frankfort mine also has an existing licensed allocation for water from the Molototsi River.

Service water sources available to the **CDM Underground Mining Area** consist mainly of water sourced from the underground workings, surface water (dirty run-off rainwater), and boreholes.

Water for drinking will be treated in a potable water treatment plant and distributed to the process plant, underground workings and surface facilities such as the offices and change houses.

WASTE MANAGEMENT

Waste envisioned to be generated from the operations will include domestic, industrial and hazardous waste.

- ❖ **Domestic waste** will comprise all waste material generated by the day-to-day running of offices, change houses and canteens. This will include food, paper, cardboard, plastic wrappers, tin cans, and plastic bottles.
- ❖ **Industrial waste** will consist of material discarded from the running and operation of workshops, mining machinery and process plant. This will include scrap metal, wood, tyres, metal and plastic drums, rubber materials and plastic components from engineering and mining equipment.
- ❖ **Hazardous waste** will include all discarded fuels, oils, lubricants, paints, solvents and other chemicals. These items cannot be disposed of on-site and will have to be managed according to the norms and standards for storage of waste.
- ❖ **Medical Waste** will be generated by the mine's first aid/medical stabilisation facility. Medical waste will include contaminated materials such as used syringes, surgical gloves, and bandages.

- ❖ **Mine residue** will consist of Tailings from the plant to be deposited on the existing tailings storage facility and expansions presented for approval. The waste rock from underground will be stored on various waste rock dumps around the shaft and plant areas.

LIFE OF MINE

Environmental authorisation is requested for a period of 10 years, which will allow for construction and 7 years life of mine (LoM).

REHABILITATION

The Closure objectives of the Final Rehabilitation, Decommissioning and Mine Closure Plan will be measurable and auditable and will be developed on the bases that the rehabilitated areas are safe, stable, non-polluting and are able to support a self-sustaining ecosystem, similar to surrounding historical natural baseline environment.

It must be noted that the current natural baseline environment has been negatively impacted by historical mining, illegal miners and illegal mining from a Biodiversity and Socio-economic perspective. There is quantifiable evidence that the illegal mining has accelerated the loss of biodiversity in the area and therefore the closure objectives will also focus strongly on remediating those areas impacted by the illegal mining, that are in close proximity to the proposed mining activities.

The proposed Final Rehabilitation, Decommissioning and Mine Closure Planning, will include the following Mine Closure Planning Criteria:

- ❖ The vision, objectives, targets, and criteria for final rehabilitation, decommissioning and closure of the project.
- ❖ Outlining the design principles for closure.
- ❖ Explaining the risk assessment approach and outcomes and link closure activities to risk rehabilitation.
- ❖ Detailing the closure actions that clearly indicate the measures that will be taken to mitigate and/or manage identified risks and describes the nature of residual risks that will need to be monitored and managed post closure e.g. implementing an alien invasive management programme and erosion control measures.
- ❖ Committing to a schedule, budget, roles, and responsibilities for final rehabilitation, decommissioning and closure of each relevant activity or item of infrastructure.
- ❖ Identifying knowledge gaps and how these will be addressed and filled.
- ❖ Detailing the full closure costs for the life of project at increasing levels of accuracy as the project develops and approaches closure in line with the final land use proposed; and
- ❖ Outlining monitoring, auditing, and reporting requirements.

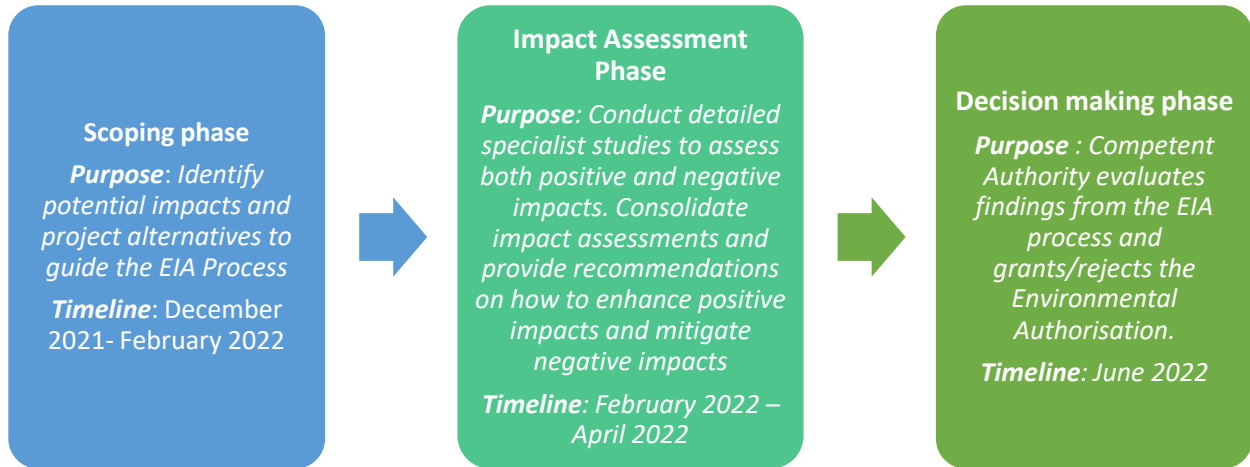


Figure 3: S&EIA process and the associated timeline

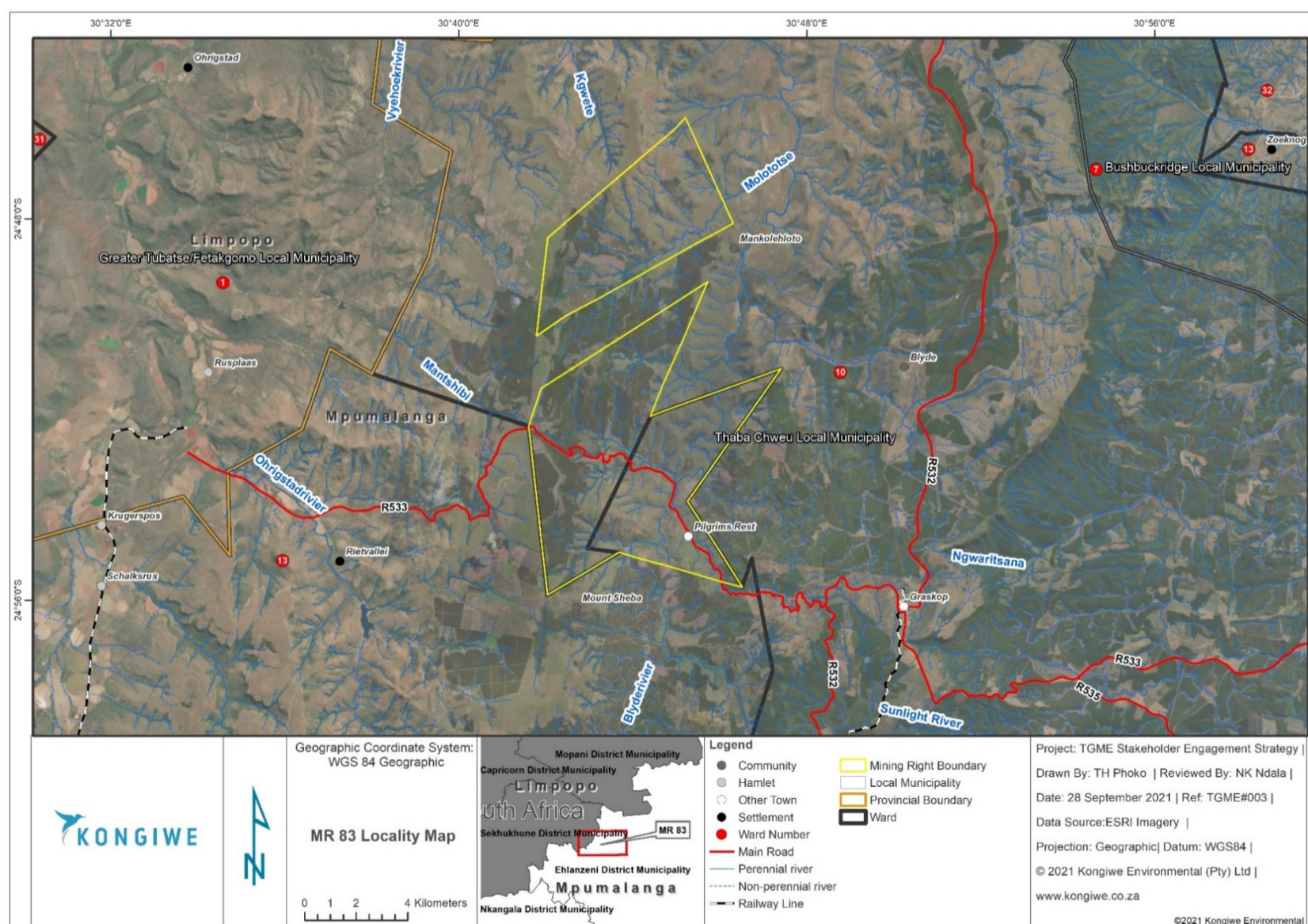
