INTRODUCTION

Palm oil is one of the most important food commodities in the world. It is used for cooking in many developing countries, and in food processing and production (of chocolate, biscuits, ice cream etc) across the developed world, and in a wide range of consumer goods including shampoo and cosmetics.

Indeed, because of its healthier qualities versus animal fats (palm oil contains Vitamin A and betacarotene), palm oil use for cooking and food manufacture is also increasing even in the United States – in the last decade US imports from Malaysia (the world's biggest palm oil producer) jumped from less than 200,000 metric tonnes to over 1m tonnes by 2008.

And with palm oil's growing use in bio-fuel production, world demand looks set to accelerate further. Already, almost a quarter of global palm oil production is going to bio-fuel.

Against that background, the scope for increased production is relatively limited, particularly in the equatorial regions of East Asia where commercial oil palm plantations were first established 100 years ago. There is widespread resistance in countries such as Malaysia and Indonesia to the idea of turning over yet more equatorial rainforest to palm.

As a result, big producers are returning to the region where the oil palm originated – equatorial Africa – where the trees grow in the wild and where there are old and neglected plantations, so that investment can boost yields and plantation efficiency without huge encroachment on the established ecology. There are also vast acreages of semi-cleared land and scrub where the oil palm will thrive.

Agriculture research specialist Hardman & Co last year identified that US\$6 billion has already been earmarked by international investors for the crop's development in the region, with much of the money coming from government-controlled operators in the Far East, such as Malaysia and Indonesia. Those two countries already dominate world palm oil production but are severely restricted for future growth, largely because of lack of suitable land available.

BACKGROUND TO THE INVESTMENT

The Economy of Sierra Leone

The country continues to make a steady recovery from the civil war of the 1990s, with GDP growth last year now estimated at 5.1% (CIA World Factbook) following a 5% rise in 2010. Along with other countries in sub-Saharan Africa, Sierra Leone is expected to see GDP growth of around 5.8% this year, according to the IMF.

The African Development Bank has also forecast that the whole of Africa will see GDP growth running at 5% a year for the next 50 years, so that there will be more than a billion middle class Africans by 2060 (roughly 50% of the population). The whole continent is now regarded as a core ‘growth story’ for the first half of this century at the least.

With the assistance of the UK government, the UN and World Bank, Sierra Leone continues to establish firm governance and institutions, and is targeting key areas of the economy for further growth – particularly agriculture.

Whilst some 50% of the population is still involved in subsistence agriculture, there has been significant growth in assistance to commercial farming of some of the staple food commodities, such as rice, palm oil and sugar cane. In 2006, and with technical help from Malaysia, the government began funding the ‘Sierra Leone Oil Palm Production Project’, established in Bonthe District in the south of the country.

At the most recent Budget Hearing of the Ministry of Agriculture, Forestry and Food Security, Mr Alusine Kallon (Director of the Bonthe project) told the audience that Sierra Leone has now seized the palm oil opportunity and does not want to be left behind as other countries push into commercial production. He pointed out that Sierra Leone is already ranked 15th in terms of world output, and has the capacity to jump to 5th place in just five years.

Economy of Palm Oil

World production of palm oil topped 50m metric tonnes last year, and accounts for around 30% of all output of oils and fats. ‘Red palm oil’ (which comes from fruits of the palm tree) and ‘palm kernel oil’ (which comes from the nut) account for over 60% of the oils and fats transported around the world.

Recent estimates from The Economist magazine suggest that global palm oil production in 2012 will be 51m tonnes. Their analysts also suggest that yields will be higher in 2012/13, “resulting in global production of 54.6m tonnes, with a further rise to 56.7m tonnes in 2013/14”.

Red palm oil is regarded as the ‘base’ commodity in terms of international pricing (Crude Palm Oil ticker: CPO), and *The Economist* also goes on to predict that world prices will weaken in 2013/14 from the current US\$1,070 per tonne level. Its estimates suggest that the price of the commodity will average around US\$850 per tonne through the rest of this decade.



The short-term predicted weakness in palm oil prices is based on the steady increase in output being maintained alongside flat demand resulting from continued uncertainty in the world economy. However, with the world's biggest users of palm oil – India, China, Far East and Africa – still seeing significant GDP growth, The Economist's predictions may well prove too cautious. With palm oil usage in bio-fuel production also growing rapidly (and at an unpredictable rate), more optimistic forecasts that the commodity will maintain current price levels appear more accurate.

Within Sierra Leone, demand for palm oil continues to grow as the economy gains ground. But production of palm oil has been at a virtual standstill for the past 10 years, at around 36,000 tonnes a year, and the country is now a net importer of the commodity.

In addition, in the West Africa region as a whole, demand for this basic foodstuff continues to grow strongly, leaving the amount of production available for export under pressure, especially as investments in bio-fuel grow.

The government of Sierra Leone actively encourages inward investment in oil palm, both for food and bio-fuel production. The Sierra Leone Investment and Export Promotion Agency has the following information on its website (www.sliepa.org):

Sierra Leone is ideal for agriculture. **It has over 4.3 million hectares of cultivable land available**, plentiful aquatic resources, a tropical climate, rich soil, and lowland and highlands areas. A current base of production in staple foods (rice, cassava, vegetables), cash crops (sugar, cocoa, coffee, ginger and cashew), and tree crops (oil palm, coconut), **has potential for significant expansion**. A communal/chieftdom land tenure system and strong government facilitation makes land easy to obtain in most agricultural areas through secure, long-term leases.

Proven export potential: Population growth and recovery of incomes across West Africa is causing a rapid increase in demand for food crops. There is high regional demand for products such as ginger, palm oil, cocoa, coffee, and rice. Sierra Leone's historical commercial and export success points to investment potential in palm kernel processing, kola nuts, mangos, peanuts, cassava, piassava, and livestock. THE PLANTATION AND THE MANAGER

West African Palm Oil Limited is a highly experienced commercial agriculture company, with farming and plantation interests across Liberia and Sierra Leone. As the tenant of your land, WAPO undertakes to establish a commercial oil palm plantation along with providing the required infrastructure to refine the pressed Crude Palm Oil for direct sale.

WAPO anticipates that it will be using the Tenera variety of palm, which already grows in Sierra Leone. Although the Tenera palm kernel is smaller than other commercially grown varieties, this particular variety produces larger 'fruit bunches', thus more kernels and fruit. In addition, the small nut produced by Tenera trees is easier to shell and so easier to obtain the kernel.

Asset Sales

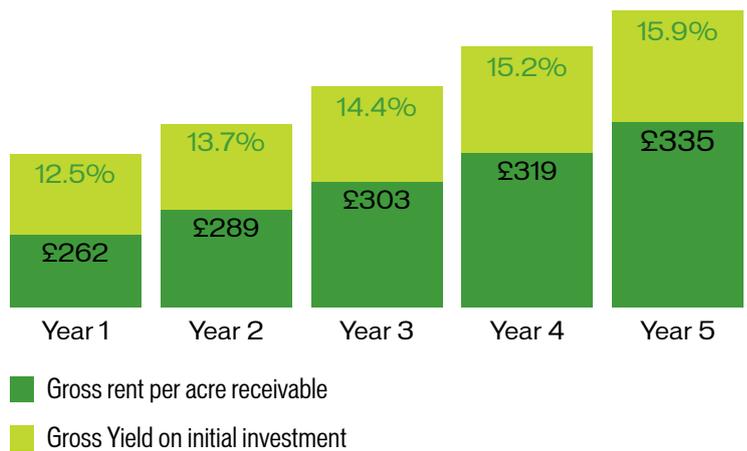

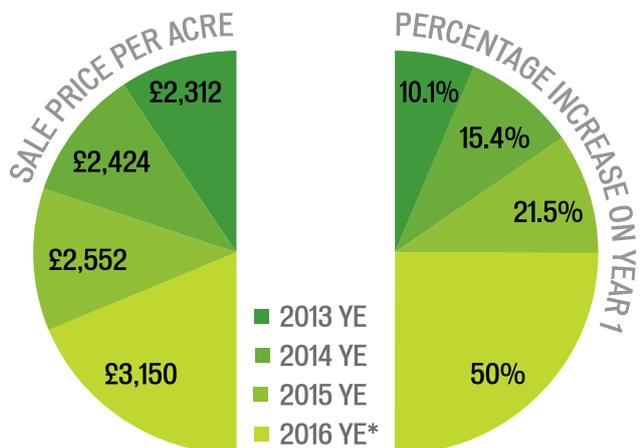

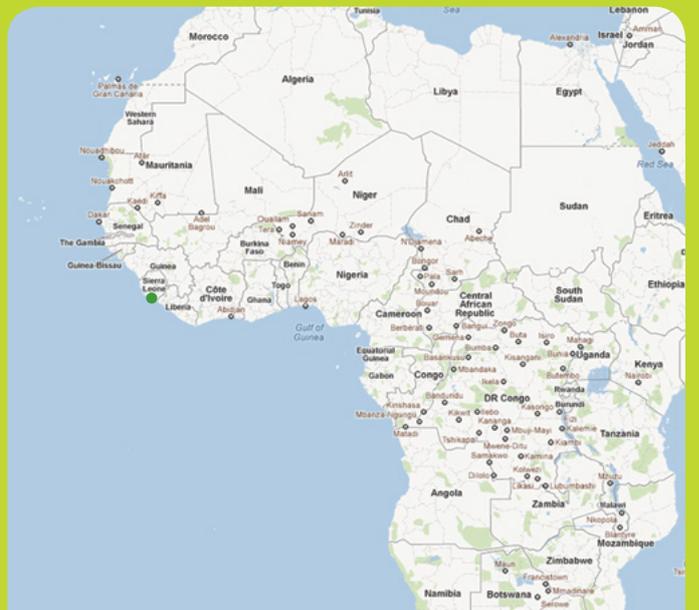
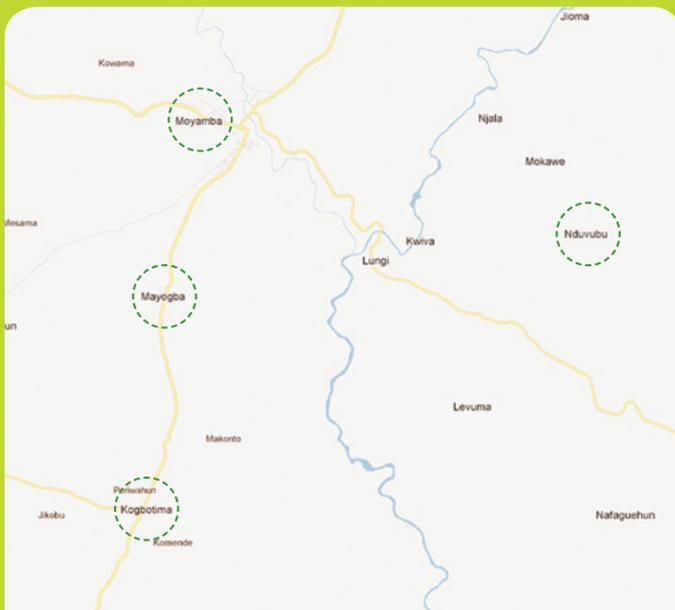




LOCATION

Reforestation "MOYAMBA"

For the plantations, nurseries and the production plant(s) "GO" will inform "PM" how many workers are needed on monthly basis; recruitment will be preferable within the boundary and the villages as under point 11. The amount of workers will fluctuate for the different seasons as dry-, harvesting-, and wet season. It is expected that over 1500 people are needed within the plantation and bio-refinery/production plant. The total labor created will be in an order of magnitude of 1.700 +/- 15% for the first 10 years of exploitation,

Amendment II to lease agreement dated 17-6-2010



"Moyamba Afforestation Lease"

As per the above mentioned lease agreement signed and dated 17 June 2010, amendment # I was added as an integral part of the said lease agreement stating that Paramount/Regent Chief Hon. Foday Momo Guleme is acting on behalf of the Kaiyamba Chiefdom, Moyamba District, that has been signed and agreed April 25, 2012.

This appointed new Paramount/Regent Chief Hon. Foday Momo Guleme has ratified this lease agreement including all sub-lease agreement(s) under same conditions as the mentioned main lease above and dated this April 26 2012. Green Oil Corporation Ltd certificate of registration No. 158/2010 / 1945, has transferred the mentioned lease rights to Green Energy Corporation Ltd of Freetown, in full, while Green Energy Corporation Ltd in mutual collaboration with Global Carbon Commerce of Dubai, registration nr 94739, has sub-leased, 5,000 ha of in total 17.320 ha for fifty years to: Plantation Asset Management Property Limited of London, who has taken full implementation responsibilities.

Some amendments I and II are a fully integrated part of the main document and have been duly agreed and signed:

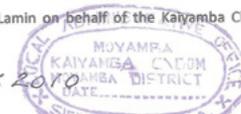
1. In the third year of production "GO" will implement a soap factory including beauty product production line for the artisanal manufacturing of natural "eco-soap", "eco-shampoo" and some other eco-products out of the by-product of the esterification plant the so called Glycerin (women community program)
2. In the first year of production, some roads will be implemented to give access to the different plantations and required areas
3. In the second year a 3 room health centre, 4 water-flush toilets and 2 solar-hot water showers will be implemented in Mbudorbu, a solar water 4" pump will be on disposal, while solar mosquito protection equipment will be installed.
4. In the second year a 3 room health centre, 8 water-flush toilets and 2 solar-hot water showers will be implemented in Korgbotuma, a solar water 4" pump will be on disposal, and central solar mosquito protection equipment will be installed.
5. In the second and third year solar operated electronic mosquito devises will be installed in the different villages, one unit is able to protect approximately 800 m²
6. Additional: point 8 to 12, which could include: clean water pumps, solar light, solar street lights, additional roads, schools, and education material as schoolbooks, fishing boats, fishing nets, cooling-house, school/university fees and expenses for bright students within the boundary, micro-loans, etc., will be discussed with the stakeholders.
7. 7-12 to be discussed and agreed with stakeholders.

Funding for the above in this Annex I; points 1 to 12 will be supported through the World Bank under the CDM project conditions; sustainable developments scheme Moyamba.
