THE NATIVE FOODSTUFFS ORDINANCE.

PROCLAMATION.

EDWARD GRIGG.

L. S.

BY His Excellency Sir Edward William Macleay Grigg, Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order, Companion of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Companion of the Distinguished Service Order, upon whom His Majesty has conferred the decoration of the Military Cross, Lieutenant-Colonel in His Majesty's Army (retired), Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony and Protectorate of Kenya.

WHEREAS by section 3 of the Native Foodstuffs Ordinance (Chapter 135 of the Revised Edition) it is provided that where it has been made to appear to the Governor in Council that any district or area is suffering from, or threatened with a shortage of native foodstuffs, he may issue a proclamation (a) prohibiting the purchase or barter of such foodstuffs generally or of any class or classes of the same, for the purpose of re-sale in or export from the district or area in such proclamation specified, unless the written permission of the Resident Commissioner or District Commissioner, as the case may be, be first obtained; (b) prohibiting the export of such foodstuffs generally or of any class or classes of the same from any district or area; (c) prohibiting the use of such foodstuffs or of any class or classes of the same for the manufacture of liquor in any district or area; (d) prohibiting the concealment or destruction of such foodstuffs or any class or classes of the same in any district or area:

AND WHEREAS it has been made to appear to me that the District of North Kavirondo is suffering from or threatened with a shortage of native foodstuffs:

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the powers in me vested as aforesaid and having taken the advice of my Executive Council, I do hereby prohibit—

- (a) the purchase or barter of maize, beans, chiroko, groundnuts, sweet potatoes, kunde and mtama for the purpose of re-sale in or export from the North Kavirondo District unless the written permission of the District Commissioner of the said District be first obtained;

- (b) the export of any such native foodstuffs from the said area;
- (c) the use of any such native foodstuffs for the manufacture of liquor in the said area; or
- (d) the concealment or destruction of any such native foodstuffs in the said area.

GOVERNMENT NOTICE NO. 26.

THE TOWNSHIPS ORDINANCE.

RULES.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by section 3 of the Townships Ordinance (Chapter 82 of the Revised Edition), His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Rules:—

1. These Rules shall apply to the Townships of Kisumu and Lumbwa, and may be cited as "the Kisumu and Lumbwa Townships (Pass) Rules, 1927."

2. In these Rules, unless the context otherwise requires—

The expression "night" means the interval between nine o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning of the next succeeding day;

The expression "native" shall include a native of the Comoro Islands and a native of Madagascar.

3. Every native who—

(a) not being a servant housed therein by his or her employer or not being the husband, wife or child of such servant, shall be found or remain by day or night in or upon any house, tent, warehouse, coach-house, garage, stable, outhouse, yard, garden or other premises within either of the townships of Kisumu or Lumbwa without written consent of the owner or occupier of such house, tent, warehouse, coach-house, garage, stable, outhouse, yard, garden or other premises or without other lawful excuse (the proof whereof shall be on such native);

(b) without valid excuse, the proof whereof shall be on such native, shall be found lying; wandering, or loitering in any highway, yard or other place within either of the townships of Kisumu or Lumbwa during the night, or shall be found wandering abroad and/or lodging in any barn or outhouse or in any deserted or unoccupied building or in the open air or under a tent or in any cart or wagon;

(c) shall be found by night within either of the townships of Kisumu or Lumbwa having in his possession without lawful excuse (the proof whereof shall be on such native) any dangerous or offensive weapon, firearm, or instrument or any key, picklock, crowbar, jemmy, jack, bit or other implement of house-breaking, or having his or her face disguised;

(d) shall remain within either of the townships of Kisumu and Lumbwa for a longer period than two days without employment (the native shall be presumed to be without employment until he proves that he has employment): Provided that the provisions of this sub-rule shall not apply to any native who is in possession of a valid permit to reside in the township, issued by the District Commissioner, Kisumu-Londiani, and provided that the said District Commissioner, Kisumu-Londiani, may issue to any native showing good and sufficient cause a permit in the form of the schedule hereto, and such permit shall constitute the authority of such native to reside within the township for the period stated on such permit;

and every person wilfully aiding or wilfully assisting such native aforesaid shall be guilty of an offence, and on conviction for such offence shall be liable to suffer the punishments prescribed by section 9 of the Townships Ordinance (Chapter 82 of the Revised Edition).

4. Any police officer may take into custody without warrant any person found or reasonably suspected of committing or attempting to commit or wilfully aiding or wilfully assisting any native to commit any offence against these Rules.

5. When there is reasonable cause for so doing any European police officer of or above the rank of assistant inspector or any police officer authorised in writing by him may enter any house, tent, warehouse, coach-house, garage, stable, outhouse, yard or other premises at any time to ensure that the provisions of these Rules are being complied with.

THE TOWNSHIPS ORDINANCE.

RULES.

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred upon him by the Townships Ordinance (Chapter 82 of the Revised Edition), and all other powers him thereunto enabling, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to make the following Rules:

1. These Rules may be cited as "the Townships (Cycle Discs Uniformity) Rules, 1927."

2. Rule 15 of the Kisumu Township Rules No. 1 of 1914 (Government Notice No. 98 of the 6th day of May, 1914), is hereby amended by the deletion of the words therein "painted black on one side and" and the words "in white figures at least two inches in height and on the obverse side the trade number of the cycle and the registration number both stamped into the metal."

3. Rule 4 of the Naivasha Township Cycle Rules, 1915 (Government Notice No. 121 of the 30th day of June, 1915), is hereby amended by the deletion of the words therein "painted black on one side and" and the words "in white figures at least two inches in height, and on the obverse side the trade number of the cycle and the registration number both stamped into the metal."

4. Rule 7 of the Mombasa Township Vehicle Rules, 1923 (Government Notice No. 25 of the 25th day of January, 1923), as amended by the Mombasa Township Vehicle (Amendment) Rules, 1923 (Government Notice No. 129 of the 12th day of April, 1923), is hereby further amended by deletion of the words therein "not less than two inches in height" and the words "and on the obverse side thereof shall be stamped into the metal the trade number of such cycle."

5. These Rules shall come into force on the first day of January, 1927.

The Government or such person or authority as may be appointed for the purpose shall have the right to enter upon any plot and lay and have access to water mains, and service pipes, telegraph or telephone wires, and electric mains of all descriptions, whether overhead or underground, and the grantees shall not erect any building in such a way as to cover or interfere with any existing routes, main or service pipes or the telegraph or telephone wires and electric mains aforementioned.
