2nd Reading Luke Ch 5 v 1 - 11

One day as Jesus was standing by the Lake of Gennesaret, the people were crowding around him and listening to the word of God. He saw at the water's edge two boats, left there by the fishermen, who were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little from shore. Then he sat down and taught the people from the boat.

When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into deep water, and let down the nets for a catch."

Simon answered, "Master, we've worked hard all night and haven't caught anything. But because you say so, I will let down the nets."

When they had done so, they caught such a large number of fish that their nets began to break. So they signaled their partners in the other boat to

come and help them, and they came and filled both boats so full that they began to sink.

When Simon Peter saw this, he fell at Jesus' knees and said, "Go away from me, Lord; I am a sinful man!" For he and all his companions were astonished at the catch of fish they had taken, and so were James and John, the sons of Zebedee, Simon's partners.

Then Jesus said to Simon, "Don't be afraid; from now on you will fish for people." So they pulled their boats up on shore, left everything and followed him.

THOUGHT FOR THE DAY

Luke never calls the 'Sea of Galilee' a sea but only a lake. Jesus calls it the Lake of Gennesaret. It is also known as the Sea of Tiberius. The lake is 13 miles long and about 8 miles wide. The river Jordan flows into it from the north and it flows out to the Dead Sea in the south. In the time of Jesus there were at least nine cities around the lake with a population of, more than 15,000. Josephus records that on one expedition he was able to commandeer 240 fishing boats. Fish was sent from Galilee to Rome. Today we hear of Jesus taking the Good News out-side the Synagogue. He sits in a boat to teach because the crowd had been pressing in on him. The boats belong to Simon Peter (and his brother Andrew who is not mentioned) and to the brothers James and John.

Notice how gently Jesus deals with people. From most of us he asks small things first. It is only if we are willing in the small request that we can expect Jesus to ask us to do something greater. Jesus gets into Simon Peter's boat and says, 'Put out a little way from the shore – just a little way from the land.' It is not asking much yet the tired fishermen could have said, 'No'

After speaking to the crowd Jesus turns to Simon Peter and says, 'Put out into deep water.' This was only possible after being in the shallows. The deep sea was a fearful thing for many Jews, an element that cannot be controlled. Yet God calls into the deep of life and from the depths of our own being. Again Simon Peter could have refused. Discipleship comes through obedience.

Now Jesus says, 'Let down your nest for a catch.' Maybe at this moment the fisherman Simon Peter wonders what this carpenter knows about the sea. Fishing is done at night, and Simon Peter and his fellow fishermen have been out all night and caught nothing. It is interesting to discover how often God calls us through our emptiness or the fruitless tasks we have performed. Simon Peter answers, 'Master, we have worked all night long and have caught nothing.' How often is there a feeling of life slipping through the nets or through our fingers; so it all a waste of time? Yet Simon Peter continues; 'Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets.' Though reason and habit say,' 'No', Simon Peter still obeys, and through obedience comes the comes the miraculous catch of fish. A more miraculous catch is that of the fishermen. Once Simon Peter, James, and John came to land their fish, Jesus said, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' And they left everything and followed Jesus.

We must see this as a 'call narrative', where God calls someone to work for him. The call authenticates the person and their vocation. This will remind the readers after the death and resurrection of Jesus that the apostles had been called by him.
