Threats and Opportunities

As in many historic town centres however, threats and decline become evident and steps are necessary to arrest these situations. Intrinsic in arresting decline is the identification and realisation of new developments and opportunities.

Recent initiatives have supported some improvements. However, there remains a significant opportunity for a co-ordinated development strategy for the area.

The challenge is to ensure that Lerwick's Old Town and waterfront is retained as a gateway for visitors and a flagship for the Shetland community.





Lerwick's History

From the early Viking visits and the later Dutch fishermen in the 16th century, the development of Lerwick began along Bressay Sound. In the mid 17th century the potential of Bressay Sound was realised by the British Government when the first foundations of what is now Fort Charlotte were built. Fort Charlotte remains a central feature of the old town today.

Lerwick's historic town centre and waterfront developed further as the merchants built Lodberries along the shore of Bressay Sound in the 17th century. Since then Lerwick has become the principal town in Shetland, expanding from a population of a few hundred in 1700 to a town of approximately 7500 in 2008.

The old town of Lerwick bounded by its immediate waterfront grew out of commerce and retains its commercial base today. Substantial growth of the town occurred in the 19th century with significant developments in the fishing industry.

The expansion of Lerwick has centred on the development of its waterfront with the original shoreline now much changed. The original old town, much of which is designated as an Outstanding Conservation Area is largely intact and serves to represent the history of Lerwick virtually since its foundation. It continues to serve as an historic, civic, social and cultural centre, a business centre and a centre for tourism and may be considered as the most important built environment in Shetland.

Lerwick Old Town & Waterfront (Steering) Group

On 31st March 2005 a public meeting was held in Lerwick to discuss Lerwick's Old Town and Waterfront, and to determine how best to secure its future.

Forty-five people attended, representing a cross section of the community: - residents, members of the wider local community, and community groups interested in the future of the area. Organisations represented included Shetland Islands Council, Lerwick Town Centre Association, Lerwick Port Authority, Lerwick Community Council, Visit Scotland and the Shetland Civic Society.

The meeting which provided opportunities to reminisce and discuss possible ideas for the future, concluded with agreement that a community based group working in partnership with a range of organisations, could provide a valuable vehicle through which to take forward many of the ideas generated.

Twenty-two of the forty-eight attendees signed up to get involved, and a steering group "Lerwick Old Town and Waterfront Group" was formed.

This group has met periodically to agree priorities, prepare a draft constitution and has most recently worked in partnership with the Planning Service to prepare this document.

The Steering Group was constituted in July 2008, the "Lerwick Old Town Development Association" the community group formed to work in partnership with the Community, the Planning Service and other key organisations in the area to take forward this vision for the area.

Vision For The Future

This Joint Action Plan sets out a vision for the conservation, enhancement and development of Lerwick's Old Town, an area primarily but not exclusively defined by the Lerwick Lanes Outstanding Conservation Area.

It identifies opportunities for development and improvements, which if implemented, could make a significant contribution to creating a vibrant, sustainable and high quality environment in and around Lerwick's Old Town



The Action Plan is a working document, which requires commitment and support from a range of stakeholders. Through effective partnership working, much can be achieved to safeguard the future of Lerwick's Old Town and to develop links to the waterfront and other adjacent areas through appropriate development.


