considered. Yachts: 530 yacht visits this year, as per previous years these were mainly from

Scandanavia.

### Recent developments:

- Dredging and land reclamation in 2008. There was a dog leg in the existing channel and bigger vessels in particular found this difficult. It was therefore decided to invest the biggest amount the port had done to date, to tackle the difficulties and dredge the harbour. £12 million was the total amount spent and this was financed partly by the bank and partly from own funds. Reclamation of land formed part of that overall project.
- There is a plan for a new fish market at a later date.
- New toilets was a collaboration between LPA and the Council and has attracted very favourable comments from cruise ship passengers and other visitors.
- Sea wall at Small Boat Harbour. This was over 100 years old and when it was inspected was found to have a number of voids. LPA decided to improve the whole thing. The new boat deck is a project being driven ahead by Lerwick Boating Club with LPA assistance. The new boat deck will be much larger and will not have such a steep ramp.
- The new pavilion is a lift on/lift off version and the meet and greet team operate from there. So there is provision for them to assist visitors at the pier as they come off the boats. There is also a leaflet available, printed in German as well as English. The temporary pavilion is a bit of a trial and error affair at the moment but it has worked well so far.

## Capital Projects Planned:

- Greenhead: two new deepwater quays up to 90m in length.
- Lerwick Fish Traders: a tidy up of the area.
- Mairs Yard: this is the preferred site for the relocation of the fish market.
- Fishing fleet harbour: proposal for berthing for pelagic boats.

Consents and other formalities are under way for the first three noted above which are likely to be in the region of £7-8million capital cost. Harbour Revision Orders have also been applied for.

There is also consideration being given to a future deep water berth 10m deep, 240m long to accommodate cruise ships. This sector accounts for only 2-3% of LPA's income so purely on cruise ship income this project could not be justified. It is a project on the horizon and would perhaps hinge on the relocation of the fish market which would free up a lot of space.

### Rent:

This is an important income stream for the authority and there are plans, concept drawings at this stage, for connecting up Blackhill Industrial Estate with the Port Business Park for future business development. Gremista Marina and Shetland Catch are also long term plans and could see major improvements. Arlanda likewise. Again, these are stressed as being long range plans and aspirations and their development really depends on how much money is available.

Victor concluded his presentation and a question and answer session took place. A number of issues were raised by members of the Association including the difficulties associated with closing Victoria Pier when cruise ships visited. It was explained that safety concerns dictated that there was enough open space for the number of visitors. Not only that but lack of space could be a factor in the decision for the cruise liners to visit in the first place. Although it was seen by some as a hindrance to trade on the street, it was noted that some shops have recorded record days when the cruise ships are in, even if pier closed.

Other points raised were the improvements at the small boat harbour including the new railings and the variety of opinions on these. Members were impressed with the number of projects on the drawing board and the business the port was attracting.

The Chairman thanked Mr Sandison for taking the time to come along to the meeting and for the very informative and interesting talk and presentation.
