Welcome to the 2025 Handbook

I hope that 2025 will be a good sailing season, and that you will be able to take part in some of the sailing club activities both on and off the water:

- Thursday night sailing: From 4.30pm school term time, April October. All members are welcome to come and make use of the club boats, or their own.
 - Try Sailing: Every other Thursday (when Tide is high) will be available for Try Sailing; Instructors available and no experience necessary.
- Dinghy racing: Club races are scheduled most Sundays, around the high tide time, and these are a great opportunity to sail. Everyone is welcome and no racing experience is necessary (junior helms need to be minimum stage 2). We also have the annual Regatta and the Gunn Trophy planned this year.
 - Spinnaker races
 We are hoping to arrange some Sunday races aimed to suit boats
 with spinnakers. Keep an eye out for these if you would like to take
 part as helm or crew.

Some Sunday sailing sessions may be cancelled, as committee members intend to travel locally to race in the regattas of other sailing clubs. Any members are welcome to join in with these traveller events, and every effort will be made to accommodate, either as a crew for someone else, or making arrangements for boat transport. It is also often possible to hire or borrow boats from the host club.

Please let us know if you would like to take part in any of these traveller events. These are a great opportunity to try sailing at new locations.

 Summer Laser series: Thursday night sailing will continue through the holidays as a Laser race night. The club has 3 lasers available for members who want to take part, we have two 4.7 (smaller) rigs, perfect for those just moving into laser sailing.

- Onshore activities: At intervals throughout the year there are work parties to help maintain the grounds, clubhouse and equipment. All help is very much appreciated.
- Training opportunities: As well as training week, which offers a variety of dinghy sailing courses, there are training opportunities throughout the year, including powerboat courses, first aid, and other courses.
 Please let us know if you would be interested in any of these courses, as they are organised on an ad-hoc basis according to demand.
- The Lochcarron skiffs (LCCRA) are also based at the club and there are regular opportunities to try out coastal rowing. See <u>Loch Carron Skiffies</u> on Facebook for more information.

Our activities run entirely thanks to the support of club members, and we rely on everyone to be involved in a rota of duties.

There has been a lot of activity over the winter to help improve the club, from boat repairs and club maintenance to renewal of safety equipment and club organisation. Many thanks to all who have helped with these tasks.

Training

Lochcarron sailing Club has been a recognised RYA Training Centre since 2004 and is committed to offering relevant training to all members. Currently the Club can offer certificated training in sailing dinghies and powerboats, and First Aid as an onshore course.

Most RYA certificated sail training is completed during the annual Training Week which is generally the first week of the summer school holidays.

Occasional coaching weekends for Juniors are run at the club by RYA Scotland.

RYA Powerboat and First Aid courses are run on a more ad hoc basis according to demand.

All participants on RYA courses must be members of the club.

Club Dinghies

The club currently owns 28 boats for use by members. These can be used by any competent member free of charge for club events (apart from the Regatta) on a first come first served basis.

All club boats may only be used when a safety boat is on the water.

Members are expected to treat the boats with respect and return them to storage with the covers (if available) fitted and sails stored in the boatshed.

We know that bits of boats can break and suffer damage during use. It is really helpful to let us know right away so that they can be repaired; either by

informing Steve, Ori or Angela directly or through the repairs book in the clubhouse.

Boats can be hired for the LSC Regatta and training or racing at other clubs.

Dinghy Racing Series

Club Races are open to all club members, including Juniors who have attained Stage 2 or above.

Results are calculated using the RYA Portsmouth Yardstick scheme to determine average lap times.

Dinghy races are controlled from the clubhouse, or safety boat with flags and sound signals using the standard 5 4 1 minute starting procedure.

Various trophies are awarded as detailed below.

General rules for Club dinghy racing

- 1. Club races are run according to the Sailing Instructions which are posted on the Noticeboard in the Clubhouse. Rules for racing are laid down by the IYRA and the RYA.
- 2. All competitors **must** sign in and out.
- 3. Dinghies must not set off from the beach until the safety boat is operational and clear of its moorings. Sailors should respect the instructions of the safety boat crew at all times.

- 4. The safety boat has the prime function of ensuring the safety of boats racing. It may also be involved in controlling the race, and timing boats finishing. The rescue boat must not be distracted by other boats carrying out unusual manoeuvres, nor by keeping an eye on boats sailing beyond the area of the course set for the race.
- 5. Any boats retiring must sail clear of the course set whilst remaining in sight of the Rescue boat.
- 6. Similarly boats which have completed the course and finished the race should sail clear of the finishing line and course.
- 7. Boats which have retired or finished should limit the chance that they may require assistance. They should not undertake intricate manoeuvres, engage in competition with other boats, and must not undertake practice capsizes.
- 8. When the day's racing is fully completed all club boats having finished or retired should proceed ashore, unless approval of other actions has been obtained from the safety boat.
- 9. Members sailing their own boats should be aware that the safety boat will not generally be operational once all the club boats have returned ashore.
- 10. Personal buoyancy aids must be worn at all times when sailing dinghies.

Safety

All club members are expected to be fully aware of the dangers involved in sailing. This code of practice is a brief guide for members sailing their own boats, but is obligatory when members are sailing Club boats.

Code of practice

- 1. Ensure boat is in good order and that buoyancy is adequate and efficient
- 2. Assess current and pending weather conditions before setting sail reef as necessary. Seek advice from more experienced members as appropriate. Club boats may only be taken out on authority of an Officer or a member of the Committee when a safety boat is in operation.
- 3. Confirm that the club rescue boat is available and on the water. <u>Club boats</u> may only be sailed when a rescue boat is in service.
- 4. In dinghies and safety boats buoyancy aids must be worn at all times.
- 5. On yachts we recommend the wearing of life jackets at all times but this is at the skipper's discretion.

TROPHIES

The **Gunn Trophy** is awarded to the club winning the annual team racing event for Junior members of North of Scotland sailing clubs. Participants must still be attending school and sail in Toppers in teams of three.

The **Training Trophy** is awarded to the most improved sailor over the training season.

The **Shipmate Trophy** is awarded to the club member most helpful to others

The **Traveller Trophy** is awarded to the most successful sailor at other club Regattas during the season.

The **Laser Series Trophy** is awarded to the overall winner of the summer laser race series

Child Protection

Lochcarron Sailing Club follows the "RYA Safeguarding and Child Protection and Policy and Guidelines." Our Policy will be available on the Notice Board along with the extensive Guidance document.

The club's Designated Child Protection Officer is Teri Stewart.

If you have any Child Protection concerns please discuss these, in confidence, with Teri who will take it to the relevant authorities as necessary.

Please remember that Child Protection is everyone's responsibility and if your concerns are urgent then they should be taken directly to the Police or Social Work department immediately. Ideally record your concerns but DO NOT investigate.

All Instructors and Safety Boat Drivers are members of the Disclosure Scotland PVG scheme.

Member support and Rota Duties

Our club relies heavily on all members contributing to the effective running of activities. Local members are asked to undertake rota duties —these are not usually onerous and should only be necessary 4 or 5 times per season. The rota is issued twice a season - March to June and July to October — by email and is also available on the website. Inevitably you may be put on the rota at a time that does not suit you and you are asked to arrange a swap with another member.

Rota posts: Update

Safety boat crew;

Safety boats are only driven by qualified (Powerboat Level 2 or above) adult members during club activities. Ideally the crew should also be qualified but competent unqualified members may also be asked to act as crew. One member should be equipped to enter the water in the event of an emergency – in the case of an unqualified crew this must be the crew.

All qualified powerboat drivers must familiarise themselves with the club procedures for operating the safety boat which are kept in the Office and sign the form at the front of the folder. They must also be members of the PVG Scheme.

Race Officer;

For Dinghy races will operate from the clubhouse or, if they choose to, one of the safety boats. They should liaise with the safety boat crew when setting and controlling the race. Details of procedures, race sheets, timer etc. are in the Race Officers box. Training will be given.

Shore Watcher;

During Free Sailing sessions provide shore support in the form of radio liaison, helping the junior members with retrieving boats and most importantly making hot chocolate! A more detailed role description is posted in the kitchen.

All members fulfilling rota roles should make themselves familiar with the VHF radios. Please read the explanatory sheet beside the fixed radio in the clubhouse and ask more experienced members for help if you are unsure.

Free Sailing Sessions

These are informal sessions designed to encourage members to get on the water; especially those who might not feel confident enough to join in with Club Racing. All Juniors who have achieved Stage 1 or above are welcome along with all Adult members who have achieved Level 1 or above or who can demonstrate a reasonable level of competence. There is generally at least one instructor present who can offer advice and support both on and off the water.

Try Sailing

Thursdays with a high tide (i.e. every other week) will be try sailing sessions where anyone is welcome, no previous experience necessary, subject to conditions.

Loch Carron Coastal Rowing Association

The Lochcarron skiff was launched in 2017 and is now based at the sailing club. There are regular opportunities available to try coastal rowing and compete in regattas. Sailing Club members qualify for discounted membership of the Coastal Rowing Association. Loch Carron Skiffies


