ATTENTION DEFICIT / HYPERACTIVITY DISORDER

AD/HD is defined as a pattern of behaviour that combines inattention, impulsivity and distractibility with or without hyperactivity. The disorder may also co-exist with other conditions such as Asperger Syndrome, Developmental Co-ordination Disorder, Autistic Spectrum Condition, Anxiety, Depression, Obsessive Compulsive Disorder, Oppositional Defiant Disorder or Learning Difficulties.

AD/HD HIGHLAND SUPPORT GROUP

Is made up of volunteers all with experience of AD/HD or other related developmental conditions. The Group aims to:-

- Hold regular support meetings and group family outings.
- Promote awareness of AD/HD both to professionals and the general public in the Highland area.
- Collate up to date information and make this available to members of the group and anyone else who may request it.
- Ensure that EVERYONE realises that children with AD/HD are not 'problem' children – they are children with a problem.

ADHD & ADD

Some Common Symptoms & Concerns

- Over activity
- · Passive behaviour dreamy/spaced out
- Poor concentration
- Impulsivity/inability to understand 'cause and effect'
- Poor memory retention
- Disorganisation
- Learning and Communication Disorders
- Cannot prioritise
- Frequent frustration
- Inflexibility
- Immature behaviour
- Erratic mood swings
- Constant attention seeking/disruptive behaviour
- Peer relation problems
- Over sensitive to criticism
- Low self esteem
- Lack of inhibitions
- Need for instant gratification
- Reactive aggression
- Sleep / waking disorders
- Periodic depression / anxiety
- Strong tendency to substance abuse

Many children will exhibit some or all of these symptoms and not be diagnosed as having AD/HD; being inattentive, hyperactive or impulsive at some point is a normal part of growing up. The difference with children with AD/HD is that they present many of these symptoms in a variety of situations.

HELP!

"Routine • Repetition • Structure • Praise"

AD/HD -type difficulties can be very effectively managed with the support of family, friends and professionals. Children & adults can learn skills and strategies required in order to help themselves.

PRE-SCHOOL - talk to your GP & Health Visitor about any concerns. A referral should be made to a paediatrician or a child development centre, where an assessment can then be made by a specialist.

SCHOOL-AGED CHILDREN - talk to your GP, child's teacher, school nurse/ doctor or special needs co-ordinator. A referral can then be made to a Community Paediatrician or other child specialist.

ADOLESCENTS/ADULTS - consult your GP and ask for a referral to a specialist. There has been more recognition in recent years of the potential difficulties faced throughout life by adults living with AD/HD. Refer to www.aadduk.org which is the website for an organisation set up by adults with AD/HD to raise awareness, advance education and promote and support research. Also a Scottish Charity called Addressing the Balance which was set up to help and support adults of all ages as well as advising on up to date resources and interventions.
