Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD)

Services you may encounter:

Community Paediatricians provide a specialised service to children with special (educational) needs, developmental disorders and disabilities. They provide assessment, diagnosis and follow-up of children with special needs. They also refer to, and liaise with other agencies - health, education, social services and voluntary services.

Health Visitors are trained nurses with specialist qualifications who can give advice on child care and development. They may see you at home.

CAMHS means Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services. In CAMHS we specialise in providing help and treatment for children and young people with emotional, behavioural and mental health difficulties. CAMHS is made up of a number of people who have different professional backgrounds (different skills and training). In our team we have Clinical psychologists, psychiatrists, nurses and art therapists and clinicians.

When working with Children with ADHD a member of the CAMH team may complete formal assessments, which can contribute to a medical diagnosis. They may also work with the child and their parents to help improve management of the child's behaviour in the family situation. In some cases medication may be offered.

Referrals to this service are usually made by other professionals (health and education), but parents can also refer.

The **Community Learning Disabilities Nursing services** aim is to provide specialist nursing care to children and adults with a learning disability, to enhance their quality of life in the community and provide advice and support to their families and carers.

A **Primary Mental Health Worker (PMHW)** is a professional who may come from a variety of backgrounds, e.g. social work, education or health, but who has particular experience in working with children and families where there are concerns about a young person's mental health. PMHWs aim to offer assessment and appropriate support at an early stage to help avoid the problems becoming bigger. Children and families can be referred through health, social work, education and voluntary services (e.g. teachers, GPs, social workers). If you are concerned about your child's mental health please discuss your concerns with a professional, such as your GP.

Social Work Services provide information, assess the child's needs and the parent/carer's needs. Also, they can discuss what help is available locally, provide links with health and education, and support and arrange access to other services.

Educational Psychologists work mostly in schools helping to find solutions to improve the learning, social and emotional environment for all children and young people. They work in partnership with children, young people, parents/carers, teachers, other services and voluntary organisations. www.highland.gov.uk/learninghere/psychologicalservice
