Have you been along to one of our Support Groups?

Connecting Carers has support groups in Aviemore, Dingwall, Dornoch, Fort William, Inverness, Nairn and Thurso, with a new group starting in Mallaig at the end of April.

Some groups meet weekly, some monthly, and what they all have in common is the opportunity for carers to meet other carers, share experiences, receive training and support, and gain access to information and advice to help them in their day to day caring roles.

Self-Directed Support -Flexibility, Choice and Control for Carers?


In Highland over 31,000 people have identified themselves as providing unpaid care by looking after and/or supporting an ill, frail or disabled family member, friend or partner, who cannot manage without this help. Unpaid carers need support to prevent the caring situation escalating to the point of crisis. Connecting Carers, as a service, can help prevent a caring situation from getting to this point, but on occasion more is required.

Good support for the person who is being cared for can also make the carer's role easier, as it means carers can have a break and a life alongside caring.

The Social Care (Self-Directed Support) Scotland Act 2013 is a SDS Options for Carers: There are four Self-Directed Support Scottish Parliament Act that ensures that local authorities options and one of the duties of the Act is that everyone has offer Self-Directed Support to anyone who requires support to be told about all the options available: services, including unpaid carers who require support to help them maintain their caring role. Currently in Highlands **Option 1 – known as a Direct Payment**. The individual 401 adults and 283 children have Option 1 (Direct Payments) budget is a cash payment and will be paid into your SDS bank and 187 have Option 2 (Individual Service Fund).

The aim of Self-Directed Support (SDS) is to provide support services required from organisations. in a manner that allows people to have choice and control over what kind of support they get. In theory it means that Option 2 – known as an Individual Service Fund. This is people can choose and arrange some or all of their own when the money is held by another organisation. Although support instead of having it chosen and arranged by other the money is managed by them, you still have control over people.

Carers have the right to ask for an assessment in order to get **Option 3 – known as a Traditional Service.** This is when the support.



This assessment will be undertaken by a member of the NHS Highland Social Work Team (Adult Services) or Highland Council Social Work Team (Children's Services). The assessment usually takes the format of a Personal Outcome Plan (POP) that identifies the outcomes needed for the cared for person, linked to the support required.

Once the POP is completed and the level of need is determined, it is then presented to a panel who make a decision on the finance required to ensure that the right support is obtained.

Option 4 - is a mix of any of the above options. If you want to choose some of your support but have other parts arranged for you, option 4 is for you.

The ethos of Self-Directed Support has 3 strands, flexibility, choice and control. Having flexibility, choice and control is essential to ensure the right support and activities are purchased to ensure that the outcomes identified as part of the Personal Outcome Plan (POP) are met.

A recent communication from NHS Highland to carers about Option 1 (Direct Payment) could potentially have a negative impact on some individuals' personal outcomes not being met due to limitations on what the money can be spent on. These changes are not just impacting on the wellbeing of the carer, but most importantly, on the person receiving the support.

The NHS guidance could be interpreted by the reader as removing the 3 strands of the Act, flexibility, choice and control.

If the person you care for has been affected by the new guidance for Direct Payments, please get in contact with your Social Worker to request a review of the personal outcomes. Self-Directed Support You can always contact the Connecting Carers team too.

Connecting Carers is represented on the Carer Improvement recent Group along with a number of carers who have been communication impacted by the changes. The course of action that is taking linked place to try to mitigate the impact of the new guidance in relation to Direct Payments is as follows:

• NHS Highland to carry out a self-assessment review against the guidance of the The Social Care (Self-Directed Support) Scotland Act 2013. The aim of this review is to ascertain the areas of development that need to be achieved to meet the duties of the Act.

- The development of a Stakeholder group, to include users and carers who will provide guidance to any communication that is being developed linked to Self-Directed Support that requires to be shared with carers.
- To learn from Best Practice from other Local Authority areas throughout Scotland
- It was agreed that any communication has to be written in a style that carers and the cared for person can understand.

If the person you are looking after has been impacted by the changes please get in contact with your social worker and ask for a review of the Personal Outcome Plan.

Why is Advocacy good for Carers?

Advocacy is a process of supporting and enabling people to:

- Access information and services.
- Have their voice heard on issues that are important to them.
- Defend and safeguard their rights.
- Have their views and wishes genuinely considered when decisions are being made about their lives.
- Explore choices and options.

An advocate is someone who provides advocacy support when you need it. An advocate might help you access information you need, or go with you to meetings or interviews in a supportive role. You may want your advocate to write letters on your behalf, or speak for you in situations

where you don't feel able to speak for yourself.

Advocacy can be helpful in all kinds of situations where you:

- Find it difficult to make your views known.
- Need other people to listen to you and take your views into account.

Part of Connecting Carers, Highland Carers Advocacy is a very busy service, supporting carers with a variety of issues from accessing Home Care and Respite, to improving communication with related agencies. Our Advocacy team's role is not to provide the answers, but to work with carers to enable them to

14,902 Respite Hours Awarded

Between April 2016 and Feb 2017, we awarded funds to 264 applicants totalling £25,892 through the Connecting Carers Time 2 Be, Wee Treat, Parent/Carer Kinship, Sibling, Respite and Hardship funds.

This amazing sum gave carers in Highland the equivalent of 14,902 hours of respite from their caring roles.
