A new Colorimeter in Inverness

Research shows that some children who have **reading difficulties** may benefit from coloured overlays placed on text. If a child feels the print moving or blurring, sees patterns in the print or tires easily whilst reading, this could indicate visual stress. This may seem normal to a child who could think that everyone sees text or print in this way. School may have tried overlays to see if it helped but an appointment should always be made for an Optometrist to carry out their own assessment of the child's vision. If overlays are beneficial the optometrist may suggest **Clorimetry** as the next stage. This may result in the prescribing of spectacles with coloured lenses. The colour will be more specific to each individual's needs, much more precise than the overlay and very often a different colour to the overlay.

Children can be tested at Raigmore Hospital, Inverness and local optician JM Macdonald, 8 View Place Inverness now have their own colorimeter as do Campbell Eyecare, 36 High Street, Alness. Cairngorms National Park Travel Grant

To offset the high cost of travel to or around the Cairngorms National Park, the Outdoor Learning travel grant is available to schools anywhere in Scotland. Voluntary and community groups within or close to the Park will also be eligible for up to 75% transport costs, up to £200. Priority will be given to schools and groups from deprived areas, those who have not visited the Park before and groups who support people with disabilities, young people, ethnic minorities and those who experience economic disadvantage or health inequality. The visit should take place in or around the park, raise awareness & understanding of the park & involve Ranger services, where possible.
