CHIP+ Library

The **CHIP+** library has a broad range of books for parents/carers & professionals to borrow from which includes titles on subjects such as behaviour, grief, ADHD, fragile X syndrome & emotional difficulties. You can borrow one book for a month and then up to three, free of charge. We have recently had some donations of books from professionals & parents and are very grateful for these. Titles include "1-2-3 Magic" about parenting and "All Dogs Have ADHD" which follows on from "All Cats Have Asperger Syndrome", also in our library.

Occasionally, books are taken out of our library as contact details & references become out of date, although the information is still relevant. We have a number of these books to give away, best suited to teachers & Pupil Support Assistants' which can be collected from the CHIP+ office or posted out if required. Titles include Supporting Children with Behaviour Difficulties/Asperger Syndrome/Emotional Difficulties/ ADHD/ Epilepsy/Down's Syndrome & Cerebral Palsy in the classroom. One of the new books we now have available to borrow from our library is "Just Schools", a practical handbook for a whole school approach to restorative justice.

A Pupil Support Assistant who is a regular borrower from our library had this to say about "Dinosaurs Divorce", a book about changing families: "This is the second time I have borrowed this book & it's excellent. This book lending service enhances my own work with children greatly. Thank you for your help".

Disability Matters

Disability Matters - www.disabilitymatters.org.uk - is a new, practical online resource aimed at everyone who works with children and young people with additional needs and their families. It is hoped that the young people & their families/carers will also find the website useful. Each of the 57 e-learning sessions has been co-produced by young people with disabilities & their families/carers as well as experts in each field of communication, social care, travel, leisure and more. Each session takes no more than 20-40 minutes to complete and can be done as a one-off or you can sign up and have a confidential record of your progress kept. There are also group training modules including real stories of lived experiences and tips on how we can all do better to improve communication, inclusion and make everyone welcome in activities, organisations and services. Bearing in mind the resource was developed in England, the mentions of the Mental Capacity Act in the "Decision Making & Growing Up" sessions do not apply to Scotland as we have the Adults with Incapacity (Scotland) Act 2000. However, the many other topics are applicable to all and they are all free to access.

Motability Scheme

The Motability Scheme is available to all who receive the government funded high rate mobility component of Disability Living Allowance (DLA) or the enhanced rate of the mobility component of Personal Independence Payment (PIP). All or part of the allowance is transferred for the duration of the lease, which is usually every 3 years, 5 years with a wheelchair accessible vehicle (WAV). Parents can join the scheme on behalf of their children or a carer can be nominated. If you would like to join the scheme, you can choose a vehicle, test drive it and consider adaptations. Once you've found a dealer who participates in the Motability Scheme, they will let you join the scheme and order the vehicle. Autism Toolbox

Now updated from when it was first published in 2009, the Autism Toolbox offers guidance to teachers working with pupils with autism. The website supports the inclusion of children & young people with autism in mainstream education services in Scotland.

It offers real life case studies and practical examples of support that can be implemented within individual school settings as well as signposting to documents and other useful websites.

The support a pupil with autism needs is likely to change as they get older and while there may be common features in the teaching approach, the guidance recognises that every child with autism is unique.

The resource was developed by the Scottish Government & Scottish Autism with support from Autism Network Scotland.

Before Words

Even before they are born babies are learning all sorts of things. At around 16 weeks pregnancy they can hear, and a few weeks later they are beginning to recognise voices. The Before Words project helps everyone who talks to babies and young children learn the best ways of interacting with them. We now know a lot more about brain development and the importance of the first few years of life. We know that if we get this stage right then children are more likely to do well later on- at school, in work, in relationships, etc. This project supports parents and others in learning the best ways of interacting with babies to help build positive relationships and develop good communication. Highland Council funds and NHS Highland supports this initiative. The main focus is around pregnancy and the first year of life. All parents are given information in cartoon based handouts and the key messages from this are discussed. This is usually given by staff at the 12 week scan in pregnancy, and then by the early years family team members shortly after the baby is born. If needed further support can be given at these and later stages, and further handouts, some of which link to Play@home, are then available.

Carers Bill

A new Carers Bill was published in March and will underpin carers' rights in law in Scotland. The bill will entitle every adult carer in Scotland to their own support plan, with young carers receiving a similar young carer statement. These measures will set out the needs of each carer, and the help and support they are entitled to. This means they will have a right to receive certain support from their local authority if their needs meet local eligibility criteria. The local authority will also consider whether the support should take the form of, or include, a short break.

Local eligibility criteria will be set with reference to a set of national core principles. This will ensure that consideration is given to important factors, such as making sure that carers get the right support at an early stage. Local councils will also publish local carer strategies that will focus on identifying carers' needs, assessing the needs which exist locally, and the availability of services.

Other measures included in the Bill include the establishment of local carer advice and information centres in every local authority area.

Jamie Hepburn, Minister for Sport, Health Improvement and Mental Health said: "Society owes those who provide a caring role a massive debt of gratitude. We will probably never be able to do enough to truly reflect the contribution they make, but I believe that the Carers Bill is an important step towards recognising the huge contribution that carers make to their family, friends, communities and the wider economy".

Face2Face Project

Face2Face is currently recruiting young people for their opportunity starting at Stage 1 of the Skills Pipeline. The Face2Face Project is available to eligible young people from the age of 15 & a half years and up to the age of 24. Eligibility includes young people who have experience of the care or criminal justice system either directly or via a family member/parent/carer etc. Young people can still be in school and it could potentially be suitable for Christmas leavers. Support through a Project Worker will lead to increased confidence, learning about the world of work and employer expectations, routine setting, budgeting and money management skills.
