GUEST SPEAKER - STUART MORRISON (SM) OF SPRINGFIELD PROPERTIES

Questions were prepared in advance:

Has any Developer Contribution been agreed with Highland Council (HC), and where will this money go?

No developer contributions were identified for Phase 1.

Stage 2 developer contributions were quoted as £2,571 per house & £1,457 per flat towards primary school education. A further £1000 per home for community facilities. Totalling £144,931.

Springfield are awaiting a response from HC regarding phases 3 & 4, but SM expected amount to be more than phase 1 & 2.

SM stated that HC decided where the money was spent, subject to the six tests laid out by the Scottish government whereby the money would have to be relevant to the development – therefore probably spent in Dornoch, or at least locally.

Is there any Community benefit Springfield may be willing to contribute? Springfield would be willing to contribute to community development, but it would need a more in-depth discussion. In a past development project, Springfield had helped with play areas and a skatepark, but installation of the skatepark caused controversy because the community had been split about its desirability.

PM briefed SM that the two main projects overwhelmingly supported in surveys by the whole community were a Sports Barn at the Dornoch Academy and a new Community Centre.

SM elaborated that there would be £1000 per home towards community facilities, and he asked if these funds should go to that Community Centre; PM stated that there was potential for this. SM continued that there is a regulation that states the money must be spent within 15 years.

JB commented that 'Pot 170', is where he believed the money would go. He continued that some of this had been allocated for the Dornoch South development, which it is hoped will eventually lead to a new Community Centre.

JB continued that he was interested in the educational contributions and where they would end up as there is a 'desperate need for better facilities.'

How many low-cost housing units will there be, and what will the rough discount be?

These houses would be for rental not for sale and would be delivered with a partner as follows:

Phase 1 - 10 - Albyn Housing

Phase 2 - 12- Albyn Housing

Phase 3 - 12- HC

Phase 4 - 14 - HC

Phase 2 – Private market housing had begun and would be completed by June 2022, with the remaining 16 completed by August 2022; the 12 affordable homes would be delivered to the partners outlined above in that timeframe also. SM stated that if Springfield received planning permission promptly, the intention would be to move into phase 3 immediately.

What are the mechanics of construction, including transport/machinery arrangements.

SM stated that they were not at the stage of confirming for Phase 3 & 4, but would be expected to follow the same principles as the first two phases.

Both DM & VM expressed concerns about the current infrastructure's ability to handle the traffic (especially the road's narrowness). SM appreciated the comments and hoped that DACC would continue to inform

them of this. SM then elaborated on the connections between areas, and SM stated that pedestrian access would be discussed in due course. GD reiterated the importance of cycle and walking paths. She stated her willingness to work with Springfield, the school and landowners. SM stated that despite two new pedestrian connections being constructed to an adoptable standard to the south, that the "Safe Route to School" was still likely to be the Embo Road due to the fact that it would be part of the adopted road network.

JB asked whether Springfield would be developing further after this project was completed. SM stated that Springfield might be interested in developing further because there was clear demand.

JB then asked if there was potential for a road to be put in after the project was completed, and LD asked if what had been proposed as footpaths would be upgraded to roads later, leading to more development in the area at a later date? SM stated he did not think so, but a potential link may go in due to the emergency service access required.

GR asked if he could define an 'informal path'? SM replied that the definition was up to HC, but usually the only difference between formal and informal was that a formal one gets adopted by HC and an informal one does not. GR continued by asking about the access to Burghfield via Cnoc-An-Lobht and noted the steepness of the roads, which may be difficult for the older residents. PM suggested taking this discussion about pathways offline with GD.

SM continued that there would be roughly 80 secure stores for cycles. He continued that the roads would not be adopted until all the construction transport no longer needs to use them. GD continued that this is an issue as residents need to have their bins collected from their road before 2024. SM did not realise this was the case and would raise it first thing tomorrow.

The possibility of a Good Neighbour Agreement was mentioned. SM required more details, and GD suggested this also got taken offline.

PM thanked SM for his time. JB wished to extend his thanks as well. SM stated his appreciation for the time to answer queries and offered to keep in touch.

GUEST SPEAKER – CAROL MACKAY – DORNOCH AND DISTRICT COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION (DADCA)

CM spoke on behalf of several people who had approached her regarding DACC's objections to commercial properties being changed into residential properties – including the old vet'ssurgery.

GR stated that the basics were that they are properties in the centre of Dornoch, and shops are disappearing and becoming too residential. JM brought up the vacant property, which had been in the market for two years, and DM stated it was trying to rent at £8000 a year. CM stated that she was aware of the logistics and just wished to know the views of DACC and how they made their decision.

JB stated that in his time in DACC, they had rejected three commercial properties for residential planning applications. One was in the business park for flats, the second was the vet's surgery, and the third was Annabel's shop on the High Street. JB continued that Dornoch has a vibrant high street and that losing commercial properties loses the vibrancy of the town. JB continued to ask, 'where do DACC draw the line'? He continued that DACC was trying to maintain the Dornoch Masterplan and highlighted that HC had the final say; HC agreed that the flats should not be at the business park but disagreed with DACC's view of the old vet's surgery, and thus a change of use was granted.

CM continued that there appeared to be a great deal made from objections in the press, and wondered if there was consideration to what happened to the buildings if they did not get the planning permission.

GD said that the HC plan stated that current commercial units should not be turned into housing. GD elaborated that the question is more 'what is the plan for these buildings' and added that Dornoch does not currently have a mixed economy; instead, it is mainly hospitality driven. GD then referred to the proposed Local Place Plan, which should bring together the main community groups within Dornoch, including more community consultations where the community will have more say, but for now, the current plan must be adhered to. CM understood and stated that she also ad an issue with the subjectiveness of the press coverage. JB said that although the Northern Times (NT) are nearly always present at the meetings. DACC never heavily objects to any of the planning permissions and that CMc is free to report what she pleases without any interference from DACC and DACC would not have it any other way. GD continued that a vigorous debate had taken place, and it had not been an easy decision. She continued that she did not want people to think that the community was not at the heart of the decision and that it was difficult to reach any agreement. GD continued that there is a need for a more up to date town plan since this one is almost ten years old. CM stated that she has no personal affiliation with any of the persons included but urged DACC to be more transparent – asking, "is there a waiting list for commercial properties? Is the community aware of the process that DACC goes through (regarding the Masterplan) or how they make their decisions?" GR stated that individuals come and go, but the community survives and that it is about looking at the bigger picture. GR agreed that he understands CM's point, "but would it be the same in 5 - 10 years?" VM reiterated what GD had said regarding the fact there were challenging conversations to have but that the Hub had recently opened, and LS (Asset Manager of the Hub) had stated at the time that she could have sold the spaces ten times over. VM continued that she agreed with the point of the press and stated that if she was not a part of DACC, she might have thought the same. DM added that initially, the Dornoch Business Park would be 'all singing and dancing' and pointed out that JMc had discussed having retail units down in that area that were affordable (i.e. not £8000 a year). DM continued that it would be good to get the business park back on the agenda. PM said that this would be in GD's Local Place Plan. PM thanked CM for raising this and added that DACC now has a pre-planning meeting that they should perhaps invite members of the public to attend. CM reiterated that she was interested in the process and wanted to see DACC have more transparency about the processes, think outside the box, and look at what happens if the buildings do not get planning permission to change to residential. JB wanted to record that there are c.160 new houses already consented or in the process of being considered and stated it was about keeping the balance. CM thanked DACC for letting her attend and stated she was looking forward to an update. ITEMS FOR DECISION 5. **PLANNING & LICENSING APPLICATIONS** A pre-planning meeting was held on September 12th.
