

What should we be doing in our gardens?

For February:

Buy your annual flower and vegetable seeds before the popular ones run out: Prepare vegetable plots and sow some vegetables like broad beans and peas under cloches;

Start off sweet peas in pots - remember to soak seeds to help germination; Get your greenhouse ready to sow seeds for annual flowers and tomatoes, but resist sowing for a few weeks unless you have an electric propagator; Chit some early potatoes;

Prune winter flowering shrubs after flowers have finished;

Cut back ornamental grasses; Divide and replant snowdrops after flowering but when leaves are still green;

Keep putting out food and water for the birds.

We will also be holding our annual **Plant Stall on Saturday 5th May**, so please remember when sowing seeds, potting on plants or taking cuttings this Spring to grow some for our stall.

Kenninghall Parish Council (KPC) News December 2017/January 2018

December and January Chair

Thank you very much to Brian for chairing the (very timely!) December and January meetings.

Parish Councillor vacancy

In the December meeting, three candidates each gave a short presentation with a view to being co-opted in to the councillor vacancy. It was decided to invite Roy Arthurton to join the KPC. We would like to thank the other two candidates for taking the time to present to us.

Norman Groves

Former Parish Councillor, Norman Groves, passed away recently. The KPC would like to pass on our condolences to his family. He made a great contribution to the village and will be missed.

Commemorative bench

Pip Whittle will be designing and building the commemorative bench to remember Steve Gordon. Pip will be making it out of solid oak and will be similar in style to those in the wood. Pip states these benches tend to be 'bullock proof'. So, quite robust then! A plaque will be placed on the bench.

Neighbourhood Development Plan

A meeting is due later in January 2018 and any updates will be discussed in a future KPC meeting.

Traffic monitoring equipment (SAM2)

The SAM2 is ready for delivery! We really do need more volunteers to move the equipment from one place to another. It will not take up too much time and would be a great help to the village. Please contact Jeremy Hall or the Parish clerk at **kpcparishclerk@outlook.com** if you are interested.

Village Hall update

At the December meeting, the trusses were on and the gable ends were being built. The roof will soon be covered. Latest completion date is April 2018...

Bike parking

As previously mentioned, the planned location for the bike racks in the market place is no longer viable. There should be provision for bike parking available at the village hall.

Playing field

The roundabout should soon be removed. It has been decided not to update any of the equipment as a new playground should be placed near the new village hall, which will be more up-to-date, safer and easier to keep an eye on. One of the playing field's benches is charred where a vandal set fire to it. We will look to see if any funding is available to put in another bench or two.

Potholes

There are several areas of potholes in the village. Apparently, Highways

regularly inspect the roads with a view to establishing the severity of the potholes. KPC will contact Breckland to see exactly what their schedule of repairs are.

Roads - white lines

White lines in village locations will not be reinstated. It is deemed safer not to have white lines in village locations as it apparently slows the speed of traffic and makes drivers more cautious. The KPC has no influence on the reinstatement of these lines and it is a national policy to reduce white line usage in more rural locations. This type of measure is called a 'self explaining road' (SER) and is designed, alongside other measures, like changing the surface type of roads, to encourage



safer driving behaviours.

Do you use the Borderhoppa?

Do any of you use this service? The Borderhoppa is a not-for-profit charity that provides transport services in the local area. We have had some correspondence from the company and are not aware of anyone who uses the service. If you do, can you let us know? Please contact a councillor or the clerk - details on the parish council website.

Kenninghall to Diss bus service to be discontinued

The bus company, Coachways, who provide the Saturday Attleborough to Diss (via Kenninghall) service (NC1) is discontinuing it from 28th February 2018. NCC has supported this service and are disappointed that Coachways has decided to stop the service. NCC are 'considering if it is viable to continue to support a level of service with another operator either in full, in part or not at all as other options may exist'. KPC will be offering their feedback to NCC that it is disappointed the service is being discontinued.

WWI Commemorative Fund

2018 will be the centenary of the end of the First World War and there is a fund available to help commemorate it. Information has been forwarded to the Village Hall Committee and the primary school to see if there are any community projects or events for which they may wish to apply for funding.

Beware - theft of oil

Norfolk Constabulary has reminded residents in the area to secure their oil tanks as there has been an increase in oil thefts. They advise keeping an eye on oil levels, securing oil tanks with suitable locking devices and installing security lighting and CCTV.



Positivity from The Dam

When you read this I will have passed my 63d birthday (I know I don't look it but honestly I have) and I will have become even older and wiser than I was before and it is with the benefit of mature reflection that I have decided to say something nice about the government for a change.

In spite of the fact that twenty months after the referendum I am still waiting to hear if I'm going to be turfed out of



this country in a year or two, irregardless of the fact that I have lived here for some 46 years and was just beginning to think of England as my home, I am determined to occasionally take an optimistic view of things.

So when The Prime Minister decided to mark the anniversary of the Balfour Declaration by inviting a guest to number 10, while the anniversary (the

71st) and the guest (a chap called Benjamin Netanyahu) seem a bit incongruous, I nevertheless welcomed and applauded her initiative.

When Lady Eve Balfour declared that the soil should be regarded as a living organism and maintained in the best possible health so that it might sustain healthy crops with good nutritional values, she was instrumental in founding the Soil Association and was as it were the midwife at the birth of the organic movement.

She inspired generations of farmers to look for a way of producing wholesome food without having to resort to a cocktail of chemicals and while it is baffling that a foreign politician should be invited to celebrate this 71St anniversary I am delighted that her important work is remembered and celebrated at Number 10.

With regard to the proper stewardship of the land, I am regularly stopped in the street by farmers who want to know how they should reduce the extent to which they are poisoning the land. Only the other day one of our local farmers asked me what he could do to persuade the public that farming is still a respectable business even though the ground, the water courses and even the food we eat are polluted with neonicotinoids and glyphosate and now that the nitrates have reached the very water we drink.

Crops were already slow to get fertilised because the honey-bees had nearly all succumbed to the nicotine habit and now it turns out that fungicides such as Chlorothalonil are responsible for a steep decline in bumble bees. Bees are responsible for fertilizing three quarters of our food crops so this is no trifling matter. Roundup (once marketed as safe

enough to drink) has been proven to be carcinogenic and traces of it can be found in all the (non-organic) bread we eat and there are traces of neonics in 75% of honey sampled.

Neither does it help when our dear little village is regularly enveloped in a nauseating cloud of avian skin, feather and faecal particulates, causing the more sensitive ones among us a great deal of discomfort.

The chap was genuinely quite upset but I regret I could offer no advice other than to convert to organic methods. The addiction to chemicals is something I have always steered clear of (preferring natural herbs) so I have no idea how difficult it can be to wean oneself off the hard stuff but my guess is that once wedded to the notion that we can fight nature and win, it is likely to be near impossible to come round and admit that living in harmony with nature is the better option.

Never has there been a greater need to lock carbon up in the soil but instead, the soil is being eroded and compacted and organic matter is at an all-time low, leading to soil erosion and what are called the 'Norfolk Browns'; Dust storms where the very stuff that might support the crops for future generations is blowing out to sea. All because the wise words of Lady Eve were ignored by successive governments.

Let's hope this government will show more sense and promote organic management in future.

We have to stay open!

£100,000 needed to save popular Kenninghall Pre-School Nursery

Our popular pre-school could need about £100,000 to replace its crumbling 25-year-old mobile building - or risk having to close for good.

The pre-school nursery provides a vital service to working parents in the village, who might not otherwise have time to take their children elsewhere. It has spent its whole quarter of a century lifespan in the same mobile classroom on the grounds of Kenninghall Primary, which is less durable than a brick building and has long been showing signs of wear and tear.

We are at a point where a survey has been done and it has not got a long shelf life left," said pre-school chairman Heidi Glendenning. "The scenario at the moment is that if the building were to fall down tomorrow, we'd be stuck. We have no other facilities to move the pre-school to. We have to stay open."





South West Norfolk MP Elizabeth Truss visited the pre-school on Friday, January 12 to support the fundraising campaign.

Mrs Glendenning said the pre-school desperately needs more space including a quiet area, disabled access and a bigger outside space, adding: "It's better for their learning. It's just a better environment for them. We'd like to offer more facilities but in a mobile classroom we just can't do that."

Organisers estimate that they will need somewhere in the region of £100,000, although the final total will depend on where they can build as

well as the size and type of building they go for.

"We're talking about various options," said Mrs Glendenning. "We're in the village and we're heavily relied on by parents round here. Some families share a car and can walk to the pre-school. It's really important for the village to keep the pre-school."

Fundraisers will pursue grant money but said it is likely donations will also be needed from the public.





Tree News by Lucy Whittle

I hope everyone had a happy and healthy Christmas this year. Not so for some people sadly.

Two founder members of Kenninghall Lands Trust and the resulting committee have passed away this last month.

On 23rd November Norman Groves passed away whilst sitting at his computer. A terrible shock for Anne but a wonderful way to go. And Peter Francis died on 23rd December at home, also a terrible shock for Shirley. Twenty one years ago Norman and Anne helped me put an exhibition on in the church about the changing countryside in the parish in particular hedgerows. We called the exhibition "Hedges, Past, Present and Future". It was very well received and won an award from Breckland District Council and the Campaign for the Protection of Rural England. Anne and Norman concentrated on the importance of birds in the countryside and their role in enhancing it, and the different variety of birds living in hedgerows.

Norman and Anne played a huge role in the village, being involved in many other things apart from the Lands Trust, which I will not go into here. They were amongst the prime movers who instigated Kenninghall Wood, which was planted in November 1999 to mark the Millennium. They spent hours painting sticks for marking out which tree went where, for example black for oak, yellow for hornbeam etc. I think they probably painted getting on for 1500, roping in help from their grandchildren, who still remember doing it. They were both a tower of strength and inspiration and kept me going when I flagged. They attended every meeting with good ideas and enthusiasm to get whatever task they took on done. Without them we would not have our lovely woods today. I will miss Norman very much but will stay in close touch with Anne by telephone.

After planting Kenninghall Wood in November 1999 we got a taste for planting woodland so I approached the owner of what is now Hemp Meadow Wood and wore him down until he gave in and agreed to sell it. In the meantime Peter Francis and a number of other people had the idea of establishing a

Trust whose sole purpose was to enhance the countryside in our parish. Kenninghall Lands Trust was created after much thought and hard work by all who were involved, including Norman and Peter. Norman decided not to become a trustee but Peter Francs became our Treasurer until recently, when Anne Wood took over. Peter suffered from ill health for many years but he too kept involved with the Trust, attending most meetings. He stepped down from his position as Treasurer at the last AGM in May. Coming from a financial background he was most thorough in his book keeping and had a hard job keeping us all in order.

So, two founder members have passed away but they will not be forgotten. Their names are beautifully written in our Founders Book which is kept in the church for all to read. If you have not seen or read this book do, if you have time, glance through it. It is a piece of history. It is in a wooden box, unlocked, on the table by the War Memorial, take it out and have a read.

What a sad year in many ways it has been with the passing of our wonderful and dedicated Parish Council Chairman, Steve Gordon, and now Norman Groves who never said an unkind word about anyone, and Peter Francis whose generosity helped enable the purchase of the land now known as Hemp Meadow Wood.

We are looking for someone who could make a plan of the Orchard. Maybe an aerial view, or a sketch, with the variety of trees written in beside each tree. It would be nice to put it up in the orchard for everyone to see. If there is anyone out there who would like more information before committing themselves then please get in touch with me or any other Trustee.

This is the time of year when the hazels are at their best. The catkins are beautiful hanging threads of gold and yellow - one stopped me in my tracks and I just had to stop and let it soak in to me. It is official...... it is alright to be mad about trees. Judi Dench, in a recent TV programme, turned sideways to the camera gave a giggle and said she had 2 passions. Trees and Champagne! I am right with you Judi!

It is the centenary of the end of the First World War this year and I feel it should not go unmarked..... well I would wouldn't I! It would be lovely to find somewhere to plant 100 oaks. Any offers or ideas where let me know.

Our hedge laying is going very well and we are on course to finish on Wednesday 14th February. Three kind people have come forward with offers of making soup or baking a cake for our workparties. There are many ways of helping without having to dig or weald an axe or chop brambles. Please get in touch if you would like to make us a cake for the March party or any other month. Nothing fancy - we mustn't spoil them!
