

# THE PROPOSED NEW PARISH OF STRATHNAIRN AND STRATHDEARN

During 2023 the parishes of Daviot & Dunlichity, Moy, Dalarossie & Tomatin, Cawdor, and Croy & Dalcross, are to be united to become the new parish of Strathnairn and Strathdearn Church of Scotland.

During 2023 the parishes of Daviot & Dunlichity, Moy, Dalarossie & Tomatin, Cawdor, and Croy & Dalcross, are to be united to become the new parish of Strathnairn and Strathdearn Church of Scotland. It is hoped that the new format will start from the beginning of August 2023, with Sunday services from then being held in Croy church and the Strathdearn Hall in Tomatin. The churches at Daviot and Cawdor will be used as missional churches, holding Bible studies, prayer meetings, as well as the usual Coffee and Crafts, (in Daviot), and children's groups in Cawdor. The buildings will be available to the community, and it is hoped, will be open every weekday. Midweek services of worship may also be held in these two churches, as we hope to become ever more available to the communities we serve.

s we move into 2023, great changes

The finances of the four existing charges will also be united and there will be one charity number.

The biggest change will be the fact that we will once again have a full-time minister. Rev Robert Brookes will become the minister for the new parish of Strathnairn and Strathdearn. Robert has been our Interim Moderator since 2018, but this will be the first time since June 2015 that we will have our own minister. He will take our services, and will be available to the whole parish. The new parish will have one session consisting of members from the four present parishes. All elders remain elders, but not all will be part of the new session – it would be too cumbersome.

There will be lots of changes, and a lot of hard work ahead. However, we are in God's hands and are confident of the future. Be sure Daviot church will remain in use, and we hope that more and more it will play the pivotal part of the community that we all want it to be.



# FIRE SAFETY AT HOME

Be Safe: Don't be a statistic, make sure you and 2022 regulations for fire safety to protect



**Alarms:** Check your smoke and heat alarms are working. Replace batteries if necessary.



**Cooking:** Never cook hot food while under the influence of alcohol. Leaving cookers unattended or being distracted while cooking is the most frequent cause of fire in the home.

**Tumble dryer:** Empty the lint (fluff) from the filter within your Tumble dryer regularly. The lint is







very flammable and letting it build up increases your risk of a tumble dryer fire.

**Lights:** Unplug fairy lights or other electrical Christmas decorations when you leave the house or go to bed.







**Candles:** Extinguish all candles before you go to bed. Never leave a burning candle in a bedroom. Be especially careful with night lights and tea lights, which can get hot enough to melt plastic. Always put candles on a heat resistant surface/holders.

Electric blankets: Never leave an electric blanket switched on when you're in bed unless it's marked 'suitable for all night use'. Check the blanket, plug and flex regularly for damage (e.g. fraying fabric, scorch marks, exposed wires). If you're in any doubt, don't use the blanket.



Portable heaters: Keep heaters away from curtains and furniture and never use them for drying clothes. Unplug or switch off portable heaters when you go out or go to bed. Only use gas or

are on top of the legislation yourselves, home and family.

paraffin heaters in well-ventilated areas. Heaters consume oxygen and in enclosed spaces can produce harmful gases and/or cause carbon monoxide poisoning.

**Smoking:** If you feel tired smoke outside or stand up and smoke at a window or outside door. Most fatal fires are caused by smoker's materials.



### Wood Burning/Solid Fuel Stoves

◆ Chimneys and flues should be swept regularly.



- ◆ Use well-seasoned, air-dried (minimum of 6-12 months) wood.
- ◆ Do not run the appliance at low output for long periods such as overnight. Do not damp down to save relighting in the morning.
- ◆ If the wood burner has been used at a low output for a long period this should be followed by a controlled high burn for at least



30 minutes to dry out any creosote and to warm up the chimney again.

- ◆ Do not stack logs or place any other combustible materials immediately adjacent to the stove, boiler or heater.
- ◆ Empty and check the ash can every day.
- ◆ Always use a metal non-combustible ash can.



### Carbon Monoxide (CO) Poisoning

◆ Heating and cooking appliances fuelled by coal, smokeless fuels, wood, oil and gas can cause CO poisoning. You should have a carbon monoxide detector fitted in any room where there is a



carbon-fuelled appliance (such as boilers, fires (including open fires), heaters and stoves) or a flue.

◆ Recognise the early symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning will save your life. Symptoms are similar to flu, with nausea, dizziness, tiredness, headaches, stomach and chest pains all key indicators.

# Strathnairn Community Woodlands update

Firstly, we'd like to thank the volunteers who have come along to workdays and helped with the maintenance that is needed to keep Milton and School Woods as beautiful assets to our community, enjoyed by walkers, runners, dogs, families, school children, community groups and people who want to reconnect with nature. And our thanks also extend to all the people who came in December to cut down their own Sitka spruce Christmas trees! The Sitka spruce love our woodlands to the point that if we didn't cut them down, none of our native trees would survive and we'd lose the biodiversity that's so important to us. Look out for our next Christmas tree event this December. And our next workday will be in Milton Woods on the 15th April there are loads of jobs still to do, so we would love to see you there!

Milton Woods has been receiving plenty of care and attention in the last few months. The new trees that have been planted over the years are doing well, and many tree tubes have been removed (there are plenty more to be removed - one of the ongoing jobs on our workdays). We have purchased more benches, so look out for them next time you wander around the woods. It's a good opportunity to sit and appreciate a few moments of calm absorbing the sounds and sights of

our lovely Strath. Some of them still need to be properly placed - the ground was too frozen for placing supporting slabs on our last workday. So just check before you sit down!

The picnic bench has been moved to the Milton Wood orchard (signs are due to be reworked, so there will be directions to get there). We now have about fifty fruit and nut trees in the orchard, thanks to recent help from the P6 children of Farr Primary School. The children came out on Friday 24th March along with Mrs. Fitter and Mrs. Logan and did some excellent work planting twenty heritage apple trees. This was accompanied by some learning on the physiology of trees as well as how

they protect and support each other. We hope to run an apple picking event in the autumn, and get hold of a juicer - so it might be a bring your own bottle event. The trees we planted last spring seem to be doing very well and were even trying to weigh themselves down with apples last year.

We're also preparing for our Community Woodland Gala on Saturday 27th May (see poster). We're expanding on last year's very enjoyable gala, and will be based at the School Wood cabin, with activities such as singing, music, weaving, spinning, woodcraft, make your own smoothie (by bike!), wood splitting, learning about the medicinal properties of plants, and mini-orienteering, bush-



# THE SPRING TERM OF MUSIC LEARNING IS NEARLY OVER AND WE'RE MOVING TOWARDS SUMMER!

It's been another term of amazing work by our budding musicians thanks to the great collaborative work by our incredible music teachers.

The performance group has just started meeting on Tuesday evenings in Farr Hall - an opportunity for all abilities of musician from grade 1 equivalent experience and above to meet and play together with our professional tutors. Group music lessons continue weekly on Wednesdays with fun music sessions. keyboard, guitar, ukulele, violin and drums at Farr Hall, and our learners are making really impressive progress. ### Nursery

On Tuesday 21.03.23, the children of Farr Nursery visited Munro's Garden Centre with some of their parents and staff. We had a lovely morning choosing some spring flowers to brighten up the entrance to the nursery. While we were there we planted some sunflower seeds and learned about why the bees need lots of flowers to gather food and make honey. We finished up with juice and biscuits in the outdoor café. The bus ride there and back was really fun too.

### **Yellow Room P1-2**

The Yellow Room have thoroughly enjoyed continuing their Egyptian topic this term. They have explored the different Gods and Goddesses; the role of the Pharaoh; the process of mummification through mummifying apples and making their own Egyptian bread (this was a particular highlight!) The class had an amazing day on their Ski Trip to the Cairngorms and produced some excellent recount pieces of writing. Recently the Primary 2's have enjoyed learning about angles, going on a right angle hunt in the classroom. Well done Farr Primary! Andrea Fitter.










# FARR COMMUNITY HALL

### **Our History**

Stratherrick Gun Club was founded in the 1890's, originally called Stratherrick Glass Ball Club.

It was situated at various sites over the years but settled at Lyne of Gorthleck in 1922 where it staved for 52 years then to Druim Temple in 1974 and finally in 1983 at Abersky, Torness where it is now.

Our club, believed to be one of the oldest in Scotland, shall continue to supply a safe and happy environment for all clay pigeon enthusiasts as well as somewhere for the young ones to learn and hopefully progress in the sport.

2008 - Club erected Cabin and Toilet block, along with a Generator to supply power to the cabin and 3 electric traps with an acoustic release svstem.

2019 - With an SSE approved Grant for new traps and a new acoustic release system, however, due to Covid, (which



affected most Sports), the Club sat dormant.

April 2022 - The Club got back up and running, after a lot of maintenance through many volunteers, we were able to hold a Charity Shoot. The old Traps and old Generator struggled through the day, but a great day was had by all.

September 2022 - The SSE approved Grant was used to purchase new Traps and an Acoustic Set. as well as connecting the Cabin to

National Power Grid with a Grant coming from SCTC.

December 2022 - Club held a Christmas Shoot with 20 entries, and all claimed a prize! There was also some tuition on hand with a "have a go" trap set up.

2023 and beyond - We are now in the process of building the club back up and introducing new members with the help of a Facebook page. Our Clubhouse is fully connected to PowerGrid and is warm and inviting. New members can shoot alongside our old faithful's, the international shooters and those new to shooting. Our new DTL traps and a Rabbit Trap will keep us entertained - without the breakdowns! We hope to have an Open day during the summer with a Ladies and Novice Day, we even have something in store for the Little ones. All equipment and supervision will be taken care of by the Club.

# Strathnairn Heritage Association

The Strathnairn Heritage Association(SHA) trustees would like to update residents of progress to date.

We would like to update the community on the progress Strathnairn Heritage Association has made since the last newsletter. # **Corn Bread Muffins**

### **Corn Bread Muffins or Loaf**

# Makes 8 generous muffins or a loaf

A great value and simple recipe for a savoury snack for all the family. They will keep for 3 days in an airtight container. Slice the corn bread loaf and freeze it in slices, ready to be toasted or defrosted at will. Freeze muffins whole.

### Ingredients

250g Plain flour ½ tsp Salt

10g/2 tsp Baking Powder

50g Sugar

1/4 tsp chilli flakes or two pinches of cayenne pepper

70g Tinned sweetcorn

50g Onion

2g Fresh Parsley or Coriander

1 Egg

50g Diced Butter or use 50ml Sunflower oil 250ml Milk

### Instructions

**Step 1** - Lightly grease your muffin or loaf tin. Preheat the oven to 200C.

Add the flour, salt, baking powder and sugar to a mixing bowl with a pinch of cayenne or chilli flakes and mix.

**Step 2** - Drain sweetcorn and mash roughly with a fork and fold through. Very finely chop your onion and parsley-or-coriander and add to the mix.

Make a well in the centre of the mixing bowl and crack in your egg, and pour in most of the milk.

Step 3 - Add softened butter and beat the wet ingredients in to combine to form a soft and slightly sticky dough - it should be looser than a normal bread dough but a lot thicker than a batter.

**Step 4** - Pour into your tin and sprinkle the top with flour. If making a loaf, score a split down the centre. If making muffins, make a small X in the top of each one. Place in the centre of the oven – cook loaf for 40 minutes or muffins approx 18 minutes.

Remove from the oven and allow to cool for 10 minutes before removing from the tin. The bread will need a further 10 minutes cooling to firm up before slicing.

### **MAKING A DIFFERENCE IN COMMUNITIES:**

### A Community Development Officer for Strathnairn

It is with great delight that I have been appointed as your new Community Development Officer for Strathnairn Development Company where I'm currently based at Farr Hall, 4 days per week. Over the month of March, I've been meeting up with some incredible people from local community groups who are doing great things to involve people in their activities. My heart lies in communities where



my passion for community development drives me to make a difference in peoples' lives. My aim is to create a friendly, social environment for people to come together and feel connected, so they can lead happier and healthier lives where they can thrive in

their community.

The purpose of my role is to help facilitate the delivery of the CAP and the ways in which I do this is by taking direction from the Board of Trustees on the CAP priorities and by meeting the performance indicators set by our funder, SCBF. Initially I have been tasked with delivering on the 'quick wins' identified in the CAP so my iob in the first few months will involve organising events and liaising with community groups to encourage new ideas through knowledge sharing and community learning. Other objectives include providing

support to help develop and connect people with the aim of creating opportunities for community groups to grow and refocus community activities.

### My background

My range of knowledge, skills and experience in community learning and development is broad and I've worked in several management roles across the public, private and third sectors, as well as volunteerina in my own community. Originally raised in the Isle of Lewis, my home village of Aignish is in the Eve Peninsula of Point at the site of the 14th Century Eaglais Na h-Aoidhe (Ui Church) where 19 Lewis Macleod Clan Chiefs are buried, including the infamous feuding warrior Roderick Macleod, 7th Chief of Macleod. Nearby is the Aignish Farm Raiders Monument which commemorates the struggles of 14 brave men and women, who in 1888 fought for land rights in



the face of oppression from the government and landowners, paving the way for Scottish land reform. During the time of the Covid Resilience Response I was privileged to spend time in Lewis where I was able to work remotely and take care of my mother where I also reconnected with the people and the island once again. This gave me an opportunity to take long beach walks along the coastal trail on the Braighe some of which took me along the sandy boardwalk to the neighbouring village of Melbost where Maggie from Farr Hall grew up.

Currently I live in North Kessock by the shores of the Beauly Firth with my partner Les and two sons, Connor and Seumas, who play rugby for Highland. It was here in 2016 where my passion for community development began with start of my social business Bridge A Gap which focused on mental health & wellbeing and tackling social isolation and loneliness in communities.

### Current development activities

The current goal of the CDO is to meet people and create lasting relationships across the 27 community groups to build community capacity and improve community cohesion by working collaboratively with groups and other stakeholders to enhance the social, environmental, economic and wellbeing benefits in the community of Strathnairn.

Is this food off?

It is important to understand best before and use-by dates on food labels to keep food safe and to help reduce food waste.

### Food date labelling

On most packaged food, depending on the product, you will see either:

- a use-by date relating to food safety
- a best before date relating to food quality

Use-by dates are about safety

A use-by date on food is about safety. This is the most important date to remember.

Never eat food after the useby date, even if it looks and smells ok, as it could make you very ill.

You can cook and eat food until midnight on the use-by date but not after.

The use-by date will only be accurate if the food is stored according to the instructions on the packaging.

After the use-by date, don't eat, cook or freeze your food.

Best before dates are about quality

The best before date, sometimes shown as BBE (best before end), is about quality and not safety. The food will be safe to eat after this date but may not be at its best. Its flavour and texture might not be as good.



The best before date will only be accurate if the food is stored according to the instructions on the packaging.



#### The sniff test

For foods with a best before date, you can use sensory cues to find out if the food is appropriate to eat. You could look for visible mould on bread, taste to see if biscuits/crisps are stale, or sniff/smell some dairy products with a best before date to see if they have soured.

For food with a use-by date, the 'sniff test' is not an appropriate method for testing if food is safe to eat. Food can look and smell fine even after the use by date has passed, but the product will not be safe to eat. We can't see or smell the bugs that can cause food poisoning.

Manufacturers are responsible for deciding whether to apply a use-by date or a best before date on their products. This will depend on factors such as how the food is made and how risky it is. They will make sure the right label is used on the product.

Always check the date labels on food to see whether it has a useby or best before

If you have a problem with your sense of smell and cannot use it to detect if food with a best before date has gone off or stale, then ask someone else to check it for you. If that is not an option, then we advise that you stick to the best before date on the packet as this has been determined by the manufacturer to be the date which the food is at its best.
