

From 21st January 2020 to 28th February 2020 in the beat areas MW02, MW05 & MS04 – Rosewell & District – there were 6 crimes recorded, with 0 solved to date.

During this time period there were 38 calls to Police Scotland.

Incidents of Note

- On 5th February 2020 at an address on Gorton Road the occupier noted damage to a wall. It is unknown when the wall was damaged or by what means, however it is suspected the wall had been struck by a vehicle.
- Between 5th and 7th February 2020 in Louisa Square Rosewell, items were stolen from a car parked there.
- About 20:30 hours, on 12th February 2020 there was a theft of scrap metal from a site on Gorton Road. The suspects used a small van during the incident. Police are following a line of enquiry.
- About 21:50 hours on 20th February 2020 in Whitehill Road Rosewell and video doorbell was vandalised.
- About 17:15 hours, 21st February 2020, Police received a number of calls regarding a car that had gone off the road into a field in Roslin Glen. The driver was taken to hospital for to be checked. No criminality detected.
- About 20:00 hours on 21st February 2020 at Gorton Road Rosewell, a window of a bus was smashed. The driver observed a group of three youths throw something at the bus.

Community Police information
