

# POLICE REPORT, OCTOBER 2020 BEAT AREA MW02, MW05 & MS04 – ROSEWELL & DISTRICT



From 1<sup>st</sup> October 2020 to 31<sup>st</sup> October 2020 in the beat areas MW02, MW05 & MS04 – Rosewell & District – There were 4 crimes recorded, with 2 solved to date for the Rosewell area.

## **Incidents of Note**

- Between 6<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> October at Whitehill Football Club, Carnethie Street, the A.E.D was stolen.
- About 13:30 hours, 17<sup>th</sup> October there was a disturbance in Louisa square. The individual responsible has been identified and will be reported.
- On 23<sup>rd</sup> October two youths were on the roof of St Matthews RC Primary school, Carnethie Street. They threw several tiles of the roof breaking them. The youths were later traced and charged.

## **Community Police information**

Community Police are aware of recent incidents at the outdoor classroom and will conduct patrols in the local area.

A number of residents in the Midlothian area have contacted police after becoming victims of fraud, whereby they have received phone calls from persons declaring themselves as representatives of various banks fraud teams. Victims are advised that their accounts have been compromised and asked to transfer funds elsewhere at which time control of funds is lost. Police are also aware of a report of fraud where the complainer received an email purporting to be from a financial company offering a high interest rate on savings.

Police request members of the public to be vigilant to such conduct and educate elderly or vulnerable family/friends. Further information on types of fraud can be found on the Police Scotland website
