

# POLICE REPORT AUGUST & SEPTEMBER 2022 BEAT AREA MW05 - ROSEWELL & DISTRICT



Please note -

Police report is between the 1<sup>st</sup> of August to the 26<sup>th</sup> of September due to Officers annual leave.

Between 1<sup>st</sup> August and 26<sup>th</sup> of September 2022, there were 59 Calls to Police. 9 Crimes were detected with 5 Crimes Solved. .

# **Incidents of Note**

About 1950 hours on the 5<sup>th</sup> of August 2022, community Officers stopped a vehicle driving suspiciously on Gorton Road, Rosewell. Checks showed the 21 year old male driver of the vehicle had no valid insurance. The male was charged with Driving without Valid Insurance and his vehicle was uplifted and seized.

About 2300 hours on the 19<sup>th</sup> of August 2022, a male was seen to kick a vehicle on Lothian Street, causing minor damage to the body work. A 20 year old male was issued a recorded Police Warning for Vandalism.

About 1745 hours on the 21<sup>st</sup> of August 202, Police received a report of off road bikes doing Wheelies on Prestonhall Road, Rosewell. Roads Policing officers attended the local Rosewell area however were unable to trace any off road bikes.

About 1930 hours on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of September 2022, Police received a report of Youths within a field near to Thornton Road, moving hay bales. Police attended the local area however there was no trace of any youths. The local farmer confirmed no property had been missing or damaged in the field.

About 2115 hours, 12 of September 2022, Police received a report of a RTC near to Gourlaw Farm, Rosewell. Police enquiry's established the 22 year old male driver failed to comply with a stop sign prior to colliding with another vehicle. The 22 year old driver was charged with careless driving and a report has been submitted to the Procurator Fiscal.

About 1900 hours on the 14<sup>th</sup> of September 2022, Polcie received a report of off Road bikes being driven on the fields near to Thornton Farm, Rosewell. The bike was circulated to local officers however was not traced.

#### **OFFICIAL**

#### Information –

- 1) Midlothian Dog warden Tam Crawford has made local officers aware of issues regarding dogs (off the lead) approaching horses and scaring the horse in the Rosewell area. This can scare the horse and cause it to throw off the rider or cause the horse to run in the opposite direction, potentially running into persons when trying to get away. PC Lennox would like to remind Dog owners to keep dogs on a lead when near horses / other livestock. Please also remember when walking dogs in fields to ask for the farmers permission prior to entering the fields.
- 2) Midlothian Police has received an increase In the use of anti-social off road motor bikes and Quad Bikes. Midlothian Community Action Team are gathering intel on this and there are plans to target this in the near future.
  - If off Road bikes are spotted in the area and are being driven in an antisocial manner, can the local community officers be made aware via email (<a href="MidlothianWestCPT@scotland.police.uk">MidlothianWestCPT@scotland.police.uk</a>) with as much details about the bike and rider as possible, along with any other vehicle possible associated with the bikes.
- 3) Local Community Officers are aware that there are still youths attending at Rosewell on Friday and Saturday afternoon / evenings, however, thankfully, there appears to be a significant reduction in crimes being committed by youths attending the local area. PC Lennox has also periodically being boarding the 49 Bus (in uniform and plain clothes) to deter offences ccuring on the route and liase with local youths. Feedback from Lothian Buses appears to show that youth issues / offences on the route have declined. Officers will continue to do routine patrols within the Rosewell area and the Rosewell Lothian Bus route to deter any youth anti-social behaviour.
