Broomley and Stocksfield Parish Council Chairman's Annual Report May 2017 – April 2018

During another busy year, the Parish Council has continued to work on maintaining and improving facilities in the village and surrounding areas, with a strong focus on ensuring that all of our residents and visitors can enjoy a beautiful, safe, clean and pleasant environment. We have tried to provide the facilities that local people want, and to deal with any problems, very often by working in partnership with other community organisations and public bodies.



Our two play areas at Kate's Plain and Branch End receive many compliments, and are kept in good condition by our Groundsman, who carries out weekly inspections along with necessary repairs and maintenance to ensure that they remain safe, enjoyable places to spend time in. During the year, thanks to a group of Councillors and our Clerk, we organised the installation of additional play and fitness equipment at Branch End play area, with a view to offering options for teenagers and adults, and this has proved very popular. The majority of the funding for this development came from Northumberland County Council's (NCC) Housing Developer Fund.

Following a great deal of background and preparatory work, the Parish Council has now awarded the contract for the long-awaited car park extension at the sports fields. We expect confirmation of the start date for the project imminently, and



anticipate that the new facility will be completed and in use in the next few months. We are very grateful for the advice and expertise of local resident Nick Jones, who, as well as offering support so far, has also volunteered to act as Project Manager, alongside our Clerk.

The 30 year lease on the eastern sports fields began in August 2017, and the Parish Council is now in the process of discussions with Stocksfield Cricket Club, Stocksfield Football Club, Prudhoe and Stocksfield Rugby Union Football Club, and other sports fields users about the improvements they would like to see to the pitches and playing surfaces. We recognise that this development will take time, not least because of the extent of fundraising involved, but we are hopeful that it will result in high quality sports facilities in the heart of our community which will benefit residents for years to come.

Once again, the Remembrance Day service at the War Memorial in November, led by lay minister Robert Peers, was well attended by people of all ages, including our local scouting and guiding groups and officers from 3rd Regiment of the Royal Horse Artillery. As usual, Stocksfield Guides provided welcome refreshments after the service, raising £80 for the Royal British Legion.

In the past year, the Parish Council has given grants and donations worth over £9,000 to a number of local groups, including Stocksfield Players, Stocksfield Baptist Church, the Tuesday Club (at Stocksfield Community Centre) and Stocksfield Scouts. The funding supports specific projects which benefit our community and contribute to the life of the village. The Parish Council also makes an annual financial contribution to the Parochial Church Council's Burial Board which looks after the cemetery at St Margaret's Church in Hindley.

B&SPC Chairman's Annual Report May 2017 – April 2018

The speed and volume of traffic in the village, particularly on the A695 and New Ridley Road, have continued to be a key concern for Councillors and residents, along with the perennial problem of cars obstructing the pavement. Responsibility for highways lies with NCC, but the Parish Council has made strenuous efforts to raise local issues with our County Councillor and NCC officers, and to work in partnership with other organisations, such as Northumbria Police, where appropriate. We have also indicated to NCC our priorities for the Local Transport Plan, placing the emphasis on safety for pedestrians, particularly those who are elderly or disabled, use a wheelchair or have young children.

During the year the Parish Council's Advisory Groups have continued to work on a specific aspect of our remit and to make recommendations for action to the full Council where appropriate. The General Governance Advisory Group (GGAG) looks at financial matters, policies and other issues linked to managing the Council's affairs, while the Planning Advisory Group (PAG) considers planning applications and comments on pre-application enquiries. The Communications Advisory Group (CAG) covers all aspects of the Council's communication with residents and the public, and is currently undertaking a review of our signs and notices, with a view to rationalising them. The Rights of Way and Environment Advisory Group (ROWEAG), though chaired by a Parish Councillor, is mainly made up of local residents who volunteer their time to monitor the health of the river and the burn, keep invasive species under control, and review the footpaths and rights of way within the Parish boundary. This year they have also established the Stocksfield Station Working Group to look after the planted areas at the station. I would like to express my sincere thanks to the members of this Advisory Group for their dedication to the village.



Our Flood Wardens and the Clerk updated the Flood Plan during the year, and distributed leaflets to those residents most likely to be affected if flooding should occur. The Flood Wardens have also undertaken training to enable them to operate an emergency reception centre should the need arise.

Kath Pollock resigned from the Council in September for personal reasons. As a member of the GGAG, Kath made a valuable contribution to our work, and was also one of the Councillors who led on the provision of additional play equipment, as well as representing the Parish Council on a local community forum. I would like to extend my thanks to Kath for her commitment to our community. In January we welcomed Helen Rae as our newest Councillor; she brings considerable expertise and experience which we appreciate.

The coming year will see concerted effort on the production of a new Parish Council Plan to underpin our work, and we are currently developing a survey which will be distributed to all residents and local businesses, seeking views on how they see the village's future.

Parish Transport Survey

Do you have concerns about access to public transport across the parish and suggestions as to how it might be improved?

Anecdotal evidence suggests public transport, except for journeys along the A695, is getting worse but real evidence is needed if improvements are to be made. SCATA (Stocksfield Community Association's Trading Arm) and Broomley and Stocksfield Parish Council want to find out as much information as they can about all aspects of transport in and around Stocksfield. SCATA and the Parish Council have already researched Community Transport schemes operating in other parts of Northumberland and the survey enclosed with this issue of NE43 News seeks to identify the issues specific to Stocksfield. Once the results of the survey have been analysed they will look at possible solutions.

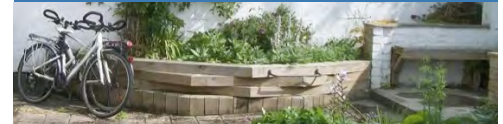

What's in a name? Tell us what you think.

The Parish Council has been reviewing the various signs that it has placed around the village – predominantly at the Sports Fields and its two Play Areas – and how the Council's name is formatted. There is no getting away from it but Broomley and Stocksfield Parish Council is a mouthful and causes some design challenges: it is too long to fit neatly onto reflective clothing for employees and volunteers. The Council is considering changing its name to Stocksfield Parish Council and some of that thinking is outlined below.

The Council's origins can be traced back to at least 1894 when the settlements of Stocksfield and Broomley were of similar size. Whilst Stocksfield has grown considerably, Broomley is no longer the 'other' significant area of population alongside Stocksfield. New Ridley, for example is almost three times larger than Broomley whilst Hindley is of similar size. Other settlements within the Parish include Kipper Lynn, Apperley, Old Ridley and Ridley Mill. Stocksfield is so dominant in terms of population that if the Council were being formed now the inclusion of any other settlements in its name would be unlikely. With the exception of four properties near the border with Riding Mill, all properties in the Council's area have Stocksfield's NE43 postcode. In daily use the Council's name is already abbreviated to Stocksfield Parish Council. Its domain name is 'stocksfieldpc' which is also used for its email addresses. Official lists of parish councils within Northumberland can confuse readers who may search for 'Stocksfield' rather than 'Broomley and...' Government guidance is clear that a council's name should relate to the geographical name of the area concerned. It is the Council's view that the inclusion of Broomley in its name can cause confusion (particularly when appearing before Stocksfield) and does not properly represent the geographical area. The argument for not changing is essentially historical and the potential that residents of Broomley may feel disadvantaged or less favoured in some way.

The long and the short of it (pardon the use of language!) is - what do you think of the proposed shortening of the name to 'Stocksfield Parish Council'? Councillors are clear that they believe it would more accurately describe the present-day Council but are keen to hear what residents think before they make a decision. The financial implications for any change are minimal: the Council has for example delayed renewing signs until a decision about its name is taken. Please let your Council know your views before 31 July, preferably by email – full contact details are on the last page of this newsletter. You will need to leave your address when commenting so that we know you are a resident.

Bywell Arts Festival Friday 22 – Sunday 24 June 2018

Accessible art, tasty teas, fabulous flowers!

If you're looking for a great family afternoon out that will put smiles on everyone's faces without costing a fortune, why not come to the Bywell Arts Festival?

The ancient Bywell churches of St. Peter's and St. Andrew's once again provide the venue for this popular annual exhibition of paintings and other craftworks by local artists and designers. Both churches have an interesting history and are well worth a visit in their own right, but on this weekend they will be home to around 200 paintings and craftworks for sale by local artists. There will also be some stunning floral displays decorating the churches.

Well established as an exhibition for original works, the Arts Festival in recent years has expanded to offer numbered unframed prints for sale, which has

created a more affordable option and will appeal to a wider range of buyers.

Friday 22nd June, 7-9pm: Be among the first to view the exhibition and enjoy a glass of wine or beer on a summer's evening as you stroll between the churches.

Saturday 23 and Sunday 24 June, 10am-4.30pm: Exhibition and sale open. During the exhibition hours there are excellent refreshments available, including delicious cream teas, served in a marquee next to St Peter's church, and a Pimms Bar that opens in the afternoons. There are also cakes, plants and second hand books for sale and a variety of stalls. Everyone is welcome to enjoy the art and relax in this idyllic and peaceful rural setting.

Ample free parking and toilet facilities are close to the churches.



Street furniture's going places

The Council has over recent years been replacing some of its older street furniture as the original items have started to wear. Some may lament the removal of wooden seats and tables but the use of modern composite furniture significantly reduces the maintenance costs of the items and provides longevity. Two picnic tables at Branch End Play Area were the first with one of the two new tables being accessible for wheelchair users. New seats have been installed at other locations where the old seats were no longer functional or where the seat's location had been reviewed. The most recent has been the seat at New Ridley.

The initial consideration of the New Ridley seat was in 2017 and was prompted by a report from a resident that the view had become obscured by the growth of a large expanse of gorse bushes located on private land. Whilst the landowner was prepared to allow the Council to remove the gorse bushes, all detritus had to be removed once cut. The Council was concerned that undertaking such work on private land would set an unwelcome precedent: the Council requires landowners to maintain their own land. The use of volunteers was not viable as it was in conflict with the Council's Volunteer Policy which would have prevented any volunteers undertaking this work from being covered by the Council's insurance. Councillors were also concerned of the proximity of the seat to eastbound traffic on a road subject to the national speed limit. The matters taken together prompted the Council to reposition it south of Lead Road and to replace it with a new composite seat. The Council continually inspects its street furniture to ensure it is fit for purpose and safe to use.

Highways Matters and road safety measures –

update from County Cllr Dale

Northumberland County Council is moving forward with the design work on the introduction of the 20 mph on the A695 at the beginning and the end of the school day, the 20 mph speed limit in the Painslawfield Estate and an anti-skid surface at the Baptist Church corner together with the erection of bollards on various parts of the A695. As soon as there is a draft design available Cllr Dale will be holding a consultation in the village so that everyone can have a look at the draft and put their views forward to the County Council officers.

The County Council's LED lighting project is being rolled out throughout the village. There have been various concerns which Cllr Dale has taken up with the County Council.

Cllr Dale's full Annual Report for 2017/18 is on the Parish Council website which includes various updates on other matters in the village.

Hedgerows & Grass Clippings

Each year the Council receives complaints about overgrown hedges reducing the width of footpaths or even blocking them. Complaints are also made about grass clippings (and sometimes worse) being dumped on verges around the village. Together let's try to keep the village looking its best – please keep hedges cut back to the boundary of properties and remember that dumping grass clippings in a public place (from wherever they have been cut) is a criminal offence.

The Parish Council is able to make grants to eligible organisations and groups either based or working within the Council's area. If your group wants to be considered, take a look at the Council's website where full details can be found, including the application forms. The deadline for the next round of grant applications is 30 September 2018. Successful applications for grants of up to £500 would be paid in this financial year but any grant application over £500 would be considered, although payment would be deferred until April 2019. Grants cannot be paid for work already done or something already purchased, so make sure you apply in advance.
