For many, particularly in the USA, the Vietnam War defined the 1960s – 1970s and left a lasting impression on American polity and policy. It was probably the first war to be so intensely and immediately covered by journalists, led to deep divisions both in the USA & Europe and formed the trigger for urban terrorist movements such as Baader-Meinhof in Germany, Red Brigades in Italy, Action Direct in France. It also spawned a huge volume of literature and film. This course will look at both the narrative of the war and the consequences both in USA & Europe. The war was a game-changer for the post-war generation.







This huge region of North-East China was for centuries an area of contact and conflict between three empires: China, Russia and - later - Japan. It was the scene of the Russo-Japanese War of 1904-05, was made a puppet 'empire' by Japanese aggressors in 1932, and was the scene of some of the defining battles that led to the Communist victory of 1949. As well as a theatre of warfare, it was a stamping ground for warlords such as the tigerish 'Old Marshal' Zhang Zuolin, and for foreign adventurers including the journalist Putnam Weale, the

Music expresses that which cannot be put into words and that which cannot remain silent: how composers have responded to the literary canon (Part 2).

The quotation (Victor Hugo) suggests that music can articulate something deeply experiential beyond verbal expression. In this session we shall continue to reflect on what kind of relationship music can have with the written word. We shall listen to and discuss the responses of a diverse historical range of composers to a range of literary texts, from Beethoven to Rufus Wainwright. No technical knowledge of musical theory is required: this session follows on from last term's 'Prima la musica e poi le parole?' and will be an opportunity to hear some extraordinary musical settings of familiar (and perhaps some unfamiliar) texts, to explore just how composers have chosen to articulate what they have found in them and consider how this might reflect or even expand your own experience of these texts.

18 Oct Neither a Hero nor a Villain: George Crabbe, Benjamin Britten and *Peter Grimes*.

Britten's opera *Peter Grimes*, now a staple in the standard operatic repertoire, is seen as a defining moment in modern opera and has inspired a rich diversity of critical responses. Beginning with the long and involved history of composition of both music and libretto, including its adaptation of an obscure 18th century narrative poem, we shall reflect on both the personal and the historical, the 'interior' and the 'exterior' contexts of its origins and how these might impact on our appreciation of this extraordinary work. We shall look at the opera's troubled première at Sadler's Wells in 1945, its initial critical reception then, and consider ways – character, psychology, allegory - in which this tragic story can be understood today. We shall listen to a selection of defining moments in the opera itself – but this session is for all lovers of music, of singing and of opera and no



In the decades before Darwin published his theory of evolution, zoology in Britain underwent a transformation. Driven by commerce, political expediency, and philosophical principle, British exploration of the world's remotest regions had revealed a seemingly endless array of new and often bizarre creatures that challenged long-established systems of interpreting the natural world. This distinctively 'imperial' science was based on a complex association of the concerns of scientific institutions in Britain and the activities of colonial naturalists, who provided much of the raw material with which innovative scientific theories about the nature of species were formulated. This material culture included specimens, alive and dead; written descriptions; and spectacular fillustrations.

Some of the most important collections of early nineteenth-century zoological illustration are those accumulated by the Marquess Wellesley, governor-general of Bengal and elder brother of the Duke of Wellington, and Brian Houghton Hodgson, British Resident in Nepal, now housed in the British Library and the Zoological Society of London. This talk will explore the origins and creation of the




