Family Prayer

There is a story of a person who climbs a mountain. He gets into difficulty and somehow manages to cling on to a root of a tree protruding through the rock face. As he dangles, clinging to this root, he starts to shout for help at the top of his voice. He hears a voice say "It's OK! I am here to help vou!" "Who are vou?" called the climber. "God" came the response. "Really! Oh, thank you! Help me please", says the climber. "OK" says God. "Now I want you to do one thing for me". "Anything!" cries out the climber, beginning to lose his grip. "Let go"! Silence. "Is there anybody else up there?" cries out the climber!!

I wonder if this story reflects a certain attitude towards prayer affecting how families pray together? Sometimes, because of life's disappointments, introducing the confidence of prayer to our children has become a little tempered, if not difficult, for one parent to do with them. Perhaps it is left to one member of the family to do the "prayer" thing while the other still grapples with their understanding of prayers' relevance to their lived situation.

Often times such relevance happens when certain criteria, certain securities, become exhausted, unable to answer a lived situation. Prayer is often confronted in moments like this with feelings of despair. And despair is the opposite of faith. So, in effect, we truly are involved in what the catechism calls "a battle". Prayer is not easy at the best of times when taken seriously, e.g. the ability of making time amid busy schedules of school drop-offs and pick-ups is "nigh" impossible. But when it's the worst of times, it's easy to perceive why the Church states "prayer is a battle". Our image of God is thrown into turmoil; wrong notions of who God is can emerge and challenge our confidence.

Towards the end of her life when all her physical securities were gradually stripped away, the death of her father (her ideal image of God), and the onset of tuberculosis taking her health from her. Therese of Lisieux entered a spirit that wrestled with the depth of despairs' mocking voices.

She understood the interconnectedness with the way she experienced prayer with how she lived life – an insight the catechism lends "we pray as we live and live as we pray". (2725). Instead of crying for another image of God to replace the one that had been shattered by her experiences (like the climber did, calling out for another kind of help), she leant on faith's confidence to the point that even though "I feel no joy in God's presence, I believe because I want to believe" she declared. There is lots of evidence to suggest that this did not come out of a vacuum but from the family prayer life.

Taize Reflects

At Christmas, let us also have the courage to listen to the word of Jesus: "Whoever sees me sees the Father" (John 14.9). As a result, the fear of God, fear which insinuates itself so easily, no longer has grounds for existing. St Peter Chrysologus writes that God became a child so that we might cease to be afraid of him.
