Sunday 20 May 2012 - Ascension of the Lord

Ascension

"I am going to send you what my Father has Promised...."

Two passages from scripture prompt my reflection. The first is from St Luke and the second from St John's Gospel:

"Then he led them out as far as Bethany and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. And they worshipped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; and they were continually in the temple blessing God...." (cf. 24:50-53)

"God is Spirit and those who worship him must worship in Spirit and Truth" (Jn 4:24).

Luke's version might be unfamiliar to some of you. This is a story about the **Ascension** and the effects it had on the early followers of Christ. How many of you expected it to sound like this? Me neither! It struck me too and what I heard made me think differently about the role the Ascension may have played in preparing for the *Coming of the Spirit – Pentecost*. It is more than a departure – if it were not, then we really would have an excuse in feeling abandoned by God.

Scriptural Interpretation:

Luke's version of the Ascension story hides a lot of things that if we miss them we could just not connect with this simple passage. Looking closely at the passage – Bethany is a familiar place for Jesus. It was there he met Martha and Mary and Lazarus. It was a place of friendship. The lifting up of his hands is symbolic. It communicates intercession. Moses did a similar thing on top of the mountain as the Hebrews fought their enemies in the valley below. When his hands were raised, the Hebrews were given the strength to conquer their enemies, but when he lowered them, the enemy began to regain the fight and control the Hebrews. Jesus' Blessing is an action that bestows a divine favour or gift.

while these sorts of insights, perhaps we can have a go at developing it slightly. We can say then that this **Ascension of Jesus** portrays him as giving his followers a gift/favour from himself that would help them conquer their enemies as he would intercede for them, such is the extent of his friendship. Can we say an affect experienced, that brought them joy and helped them to attend the Temple worship, was the Ascension's favour, gift? St Luke describes this Ascension experience as prompting a reaction that was unexpected – they "worshipped". This action happened after he had withdrawn from them. I would have bypassed this initial effect and would have said the first reaction to the Ascension experience was to leave the place and start praying for the Promise to come! But in this passage we are given to believe they linger a little more after He is taken from them. Could the gift given at the Ascension – that of worship – be a way to prepare for the outpouring of the Spirit?
