God as Trinity

In the Bible God tells us who he is. That telling takes many centuries, happens through countless human experiences and is always by God's initiative and in God's way. When human beings respond as they should, the result is a deeper relationship with God. That is what we find in our first reading today and it is one of countless examples throughout the scriptures. We marvel at the openness and humility of Moses and the words he speaks tell us how deeply he understood the meaning and implications of what was taking place.

We can contrast that with Nicodemus in the Gospel; though we are not given the whole conversation, we can see what is being said. Jesus is telling Nicodemus **who He is** and Nicodemus is replying to Jesus something like this: I need to understand, this must make sense to me, before I can say yes -I will not believe unless it is all logical, reasonable and useful to me. Jesus keeps saying to him: 'This is who I AM, this is who GOD IS, you must believe first, then you will see the truth.

Nicodemus is each one of us - *How can God be three and one*? We cannot be expected to understand this complex teaching about the Trinity! Our brains cannot cope with this but <u>our hearts can</u>. Unlike Nicodemus, if we can say yes to God, to the relationship of love he is holding out to us without reservations or conditions, then we can see and understand, then it will all seem reasonable, logical and it will make perfect sense.

When we celebrate the Trinity, we are not celebrating God as some complex mathematical formula. We are celebrating God as the love of our lives, we are celebrating the God we know in our hearts rather than the one we know in our brains.

Today we are celebrating what God has said to each one of us in our hearts and we are celebrating that little voice within our hearts that says to us: believe, despite whatever your mind might say or what the reasoned and logical arguments of others might say.

If we are prepared to live our Christianity by what our hearts tell us, rather than by our minds, or by the customs, attitudes or expectations of others, then we will come to know the truth of **the Trinity.**

I would like to finish by quoting someone who did just what I am speaking about, and her testimony can prove to us the truth of this. **St Teresa of Avila** is writing after many years of faithful commitment to this:

"Our good God now desires to remove the scales from the soul's eyes and let it see and understand, although in a strange way, something of the favour He grants it. When the soul is brought into that place, the Most Blessed Trinity, all three Persons, through an intellectual vision, is revealed to it through a certain representation of the truth. First there comes an enkindling in the spirit in the manner of a cloud of magnificent splendour; all three Persons are distinct, and through an admirable knowledge the soul understands as a most profound truth that all three Persons are one substance, and one power and one knowledge and one God alone. It knows in such a way that what we hold by faith, it understands, we can say through sight – although the sight is not with the bodily eyes nor with the eyes of the soul because we are not dealing with an imaginative vision. Here all three persons communicate themselves to it, speak to it and explain those words of the Lord in the Gospel: that He and the Father and the Holy Spirit will come to dwell with the soul that loves Him and keeps his commandments".
