Letter to the Romans

Today our second reading is from **St Paul's letter to the Romans.** If I have counted correctly, we have an extract from this letter for fifteen consecutive Sundays. *Romans* is the longest and most difficult to read of all Paul's letters. It is considered by many to be the most influential document of the entire New Testament. Almost from the day it was written the Letter to the Romans has coloured and shaped Christian thought and, at the same time, it has been at the centre of some of the great debates and controversies of Christian history.

It is not clear when, or by whom, the Church in Rome was founded. Rome in the first century had a strong Jewish community and almost certainly the majority of early Christians in Rome were Jewish, though it would also have had Gentile members. When Jews and Jewish Christians had to leave Rome because of Claudius' edict (AD 49), the Gentile Christians would have remained in Rome. After the death of Claudius (AD 54), the new Emperor Nero was more favourable to Jews and many of the Jewish Christians returned to Rome. This is the Church Paul writes to from Corinth in the winter of AD 57-58, a Church which is predominantly a Gentile Church but with a significant Jewish membership and certain tensions between the two groups. To date, Paul has never been to Rome and it is the only letter Paul wrote to a Church he had not been involved in founding. His reasons for writing this letter can be summed up as follows:

- * His conviction of his own special vocation outlined in the first line of the letter: 'From Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus who has been called to be an apostle, and specially chosen to preach the Good News that God promised long ago through his prophets in the scriptures'.
- * Paul's plan, outlined in this letter, is to go first to Jerusalem taking a collection from the Greek Churches to the poor Christians in Jerusalem. Then he will visit Rome and spend some time with the Church there on his way to Spain.
- * This letter is a kind of "Letter of introduction" outlining what he preaches for these Christians who do not know him personally but undoubtedly have heard a lot about him.

* Paul wants, and has wanted for a long time, to visit Rome; let us listen to his own words:

'First, I thank God through Jesus Christ for all of you and for the way in which your faith is spoken of all over the world. The God I worship spiritually by preaching the Good News of his Son knows that I never fail to mention you in my prayers and to ask to be allowed at long last the opportunity to visit you, if he so wills. For I am longing to see you either to strengthen you by sharing a spiritual gift with you or, what is better, to find encouragement among you from our common faith. I want you to know, brothers, that I have often planned to visit you — though until now I have always been prevented — in the hope that I might work as fruitfully among you as I have done among the other pagans. I owe a duty to Greeks just as much as to barbarians, to the educated just as much as to the uneducated, and it is this that makes me want to bring the Good News to you too in Rome'.

Note to Readers: Readings at all Masses on Sunday next will be those of the Feast of St Peter & Paul.
