St Paul – Person of Prayer

When we read St Paul's letters we are struck by the amount of prayer in them. The letters begin and end in prayer and many times during the letters we find Paul praying, quoting prayers or speaking about prayer. It seems that Paul cannot speak about Jesus or Christian life without breaking into prayer.

We can look at Paul's writings and say that everything written here could only have been written by a person of prayer, a holy person, a mystic. Only a person who knew Jesus intimately and prayed continually could speak in such a profound way.

From the time of his conversion, Paul accepted Christianity with great joy and enthusiasm – we might even add fanaticism, in the most positive sense of that word. As a consequence, and as a pleasant surprise, he discovers prayer in a whole new way. He discovers the new, richer, deeper relationship with God which is possible for a person who is baptised, a person who has received the Holy Spirit. [It would be interesting to ask Paul about his prayer before he became a Christian – all we know is that it is very different since he "met" Jesus].

Baptism, reception of the Holy Spirit, makes possible a deeper, richer and more complete relationship between a human being and God. Now something is possible that was never possible before and this fills Paul with great enthusiasm and joy and he wants all his Christians to know it and experience it.

However, there is a problem: It does not always "feel" like this. The Christian, despite having the gift of the Holy Spirit, often struggles to pray. Paradoxically, the deeper the prayer is the more the person has to struggle - Paul knew this very well from experience. That is the reason for the very helpful advice he gives in our second reading today. He is speaking to Christians who are struggling with their prayer. He wants to encourage and reassure them. The fact that they want to pray is a sure sign that they are praying. Their struggle to pray is a prayer in itself. They must trust in the Holy Spirit who is within them. They are still human and so there will always be a great distance between human knowledge and the power of God working in a hidden way within them. Paul's advice is this:



'The Spirit comes to help us in our weakness. For when we cannot choose words in order to pray properly, the Spirit himself expresses our plea in a way that could never be put into words, and God who knows everything in our hearts knows perfectly well what he means, and that the pleas of the saints expressed by the Spirit are according to the mind of God'.
