There is a Child born for us

Devotion to the Child Jesus has long had a place in Carmelite spirituality. St Teresa of Jesus, on her arduous journeys to make each foundation, used to carry a statue of the Holy Child in her arms, to be enthroned in the new monastery. It is known that the austere St John of the Cross, on one Christmas Day, picked up the figure of the Christ-Child and danced around the room with it.

The image best known to most of us is that of the **Infant of Prague**, and it is the Carmelite friars who maintain the famous shrine in the Czech Republic. Here in our own monastery, the Child Jesus is venerated as the Little King of Grace, of French origin. The statue was made for a young French Carmelite, Margaret of the Blessed Sacrament, who did much to foster devotion to the divine infancy. Her prayers were thought to have obtained a long-desired heir to the French throne, and this very regal Child has the unmistakable features of the Bourbon dynasty.

Nearer to our own time, **St Thérèse of the Child Jesus** wrote of her entry into Carmel: "The first thing that struck my eye was the statue of the Little Jesus smiling at me from the midst of flowers and light". Taking inspiration from her religious name, she learned the meaning of spiritual childhood, the "Little Way" that so many have followed in her steps.

There is nothing sentimental about devotion to the Child Jesus. It is a way of honouring the truth of the Incarnation. When we kneel before the Crib, we know that God, our Creator, has truly become one of us – "like us in all things", even to the extent of experiencing the helpless dependence of an infant, the vulnerability of a little child.
