# A View for the Pew

Chair of the Bishops Conference, Department of Evangelisation and Catechesis, Bishop Kieran Conry, has taken the initiative to build on the visit of the Reliquary of St Thérèse of Lisieux to England. His department decided to dedicate a week long "Witness to Service" under the inspiration of **St Thérèse**. On the poster at the back of the Church he states:

It is the task of every parish and baptised person to break open for others the meaning of Jesus' story through witnessing to their faith through loving service... This initiative challenges us to take a fresh look at how we can show the face of God by the good works, small and large, that we do in daily life. I encourage you to take part in this "little" week of evangelistic service. ("Little Way Week" will run from 1-7 October).

So I could not help but tell a "wee" story about a childhood experience of Thèrèse that perhaps helps us to capture the kind of spirit she possessed and the sort of inspiration she could encourage us with, as her little way with us.

Firstly a question: How many of you have accidentally ripped a piece of wallpaper in your home? How many of you have tried to fix it again, hide it in some way, so your parents wouldn't find out? And how many of you allowed the blame to fall on your brother or sister? I am not just talking to the children either!! Hmmm. Quite a lot of you?

Well, the same sort of thing happened to a "wee" girl when she was about 5 years old. She noticed a tear on her bedroom wall. She then began to play with it and then accidentally ripped it from the wall. Instead of trying to hide this from her parents, she immediately ran to her mother. She told her mother and then waited for her punishment.

Imagine you did this to your mother. What do you think your mum would do? Well, this little girl's mum did what most would say to a child so young – *just wait till your dad gets back*! Dad was out working – he made clocks. Hours went by, everything went back to normal. The matter was forgotten about by her mother and her sisters, but as soon as dad arrived through the door, this little girl ran to him and admitted her fault, and then awaited her punishment... what do you think dad did? He did not punish her honesty.

He looked at her and then picked her up and gave her a big hug for being honest and not trying to hide things so that other people might get the blame. And guess what, kids? - she's now a saint! And guess what else - and this is for all you mums and dads – her mum and dad are beatified ... Blessed Louis and Zelie Martin.

Just think, children, if you keep being honest like this little girl, you could be a saint. And mum and dad, if you could react like this to your children's honesty – you too could become a saint! Anybody want to know the girl's name? **Thérèse**, or **Teresa** for those who do not speak French! And being a saint means she is your friend like all the saints. Ask her today to help you with something – she will and quite quickly too. Perhaps the challenge for the "Little Way Week" is to be honest and acknowledge it when we see it; this could be St Thérèse's way of helping us "Witness through Service" in a world of dishonest decisions that corrupt and bring more pain and suffering to others than the fullness of life Christ showed is possible in ever so simple ways.

This change in the "I confess" directly translates the Latin. Many people who knew the Latin Mass will often say "mea culpa, mea culpa, mea maxima culpa" when they take responsibility for a mistake. Whenever we repeat something, we clearly emphasise what we are saying. There is a classical tradition too of repeating things three times as a poetic form. You find this in the 'Lord Have Mercy', and the 'Lamb of God'. You will notice it too in other prayers like the Gloria where one thought is expressed in three or more different but similar ways. We will never have enough words to describe who God is or how we relate to his love and mercy .....

Today, Sunday, is **Racial Justice Day**. There will be a special collection after all Masses for the *Catholic Association for Racial Justice*.
