Sunday 28 November 2010 - First Sunday of Advent

Advent

In our first reading today we have the prophet Isaiah at prayer. He is reflecting upon the world in which he lives and the lives of the people around him. It is a world being ravaged by wars and conflicts, a world that has lost its sense of direction and a world ignoring the law of God. Isaiah has a vision, or dream, of a world in which everyone recognises God and is united around the worship of God and obedience to the universal law of God. These words sum up the prophet's thinking: "God will wield authority over the nations and adjudicate between many peoples; these will hammer their swords into ploughsharers, their spears into sickles. Nation will not lift sword against nation, there will be no more training for war: O House of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord".

This is a vision born out of prayer and serious reflection on human experience and world history. It is not naivety; Isaiah can see clearly the wisdom of "walking in the light of the Lord" and the folly of believing we can live and order human affairs without the wisdom that comes from a God who can "wield authority over nations and adjudicate between peoples". When people recognise God and accept that they are answerable to God for how they live and the decisions they take, then they instinctively turn away from war and conflict. The result is that the energy and ingenuity currently put into war, conflict and rivalry is now put into human and economic development.

Isaiah sets an example for us as we begin our season of **Advent.** This is a time to bring into our prayer the needs, concerns and uncertainties that our world of today faces. In our day, just like in the time of Isaiah, there is need for a radical change in thinking and operating. Only God can give us the wisdom, strength and courage to make the kind of changes that need to be made. These changes are not just in the world around us, the most challenging and most effective changes that need to be made are in the human heart and mind.

Advent is a time of preparation for the great meetings of God and humanity. God and the human race become one when Jesus is born – we will all have to answer to God when he comes at the end of time. At the



time of Isaiah, mountains were the great places of meeting with God, Jerusalem was the place of worship and the place to learn the law of God. Now is the time for us to meet God in our hearts, to reflect on our lives, actions and decisions and to turn to God with truthfulness, humility and openness. Isaiah puts the invitation so well: "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the Temple of the God of Jacob that he may teach us his ways, so that we may walk in his paths; since he Law will go out from Zion, and the oracle of the Lord from Jerusalem".
