## The Books of Maccabees

Our first reading today comes from the Second Book of Maccabees. There are four Books of Maccabees in all and they recount various events of Jewish history in the two centuries before the birth of Jesus Christ. These Books have struggled to be accepted as part of the Jewish and Christian Scriptures. None of the Books are fully accepted as part of the Jewish Scriptures. The Roman Catholic Church accepts Book I and 2 as part of its scriptures. Some Orthodox Christian Churches accept Book 3 also. Most Reformed Christian Churches do not accept any of the Books of Maccabees as part of scripture. However, all Jewish and Christian Groups hold all four books in very high regard and the books have greatly influenced, and at times challenged, both Jewish and Christian thinking over the past two thousand years. Some people are very "put off" by these books and question why they are in scripture or are even considered "Holy Books" [this is also part of the reason they have struggled for acceptance]. Among the controversial subjects are: the complex history the books recount and at times seem to distort, the accounts of oppression, cruelty and gruesome acts, the overt and unquestioned Jewish nationalism and issues around the morality of war, revolution, violence and fanaticism. How books dealing with all these subjects can also be so profoundly spiritual is a puzzle for many people. Among the spiritual subjects the Books of Maccabees speak of and have greatly influenced our understanding of, are the following: prayer and especially prayer of intercession, prayers for the dead [the only place in scripture we are asked to pray for the dead!]. sacrifice, martyrdom, resurrection, atonement for sin, judgement, eternal justice, etc. All of these are very much part of our Catholic devotion and spirituality and we owe so much to the influence of the Books of Maccabees.

What the Books of Maccabees write about can seem very "foreign" or baffling to us but the underlying realities are very familiar: sometimes faith must be lived in circumstances that are far from ideal, our faith can seem alien, threatening or unacceptable to the people around us, sometimes very painful decisions must be taken in order to live our faith, there are certain things our conscience will not allow us compromise on, sometimes living our faith costs us financially or socially, our choices can seem incomprehensible or illogical or naïve to others. These

BCL easyPDF Printer Driver the subjects these ancient books tackle head-on and do not shirk from their painful consequences. Among the theological themes explored in these books, we could pick out the following:

- \* There is only one God and He is all-powerful, supreme and totally transcendent.
- \* Israel [the Church!] exists to bear witness to this.
- \* History is a vehicle to convey the truth about God, it is not an end in itself.
- \* God's hand is at work in all human history.
- \* God's law and his truth are what all believers must live by, defend and even die for.
- \* The individual person is at the service of the community therefore the deeds of heroes and martyrs must not be exalted in themselves but must only be spoken of insofar as they give glory and honour to God.
- \* God will put everything right and grant justice to all, if not in this world, then in the next.
- \* God is the supreme defender of truth and he sees the heart, motives and conscience of every human being.
