Remembrance Sunday

We welcome you all to our Mass today, **Remembrance Sunday**, as we remember and pray for those who gave their lives in two world wars and in other conflicts of our time. The 11.00am Mass will be a **Requiem Mass** especially for them. We pray also for the families who have been bereaved and we pray for peace.

Going around London [or indeed any other capital city] one is struck by the number of monuments to heroes of warfare. It is difficult to know where to start when we begin to reflect on the influence war has had on who we are and how we live: national identities, language, economic situation, traditions, customs, culture, religious identity etc. – all of these and so much more have been influenced, shaped and defined by the results of battles and wars throughout human history.

Sometimes it can be disturbing or embarrassing to think about the enormous part wars play in the scriptures and in the history of the Church. We thank and praise God for Israel's victories in many of the scriptural prayers and psalms [we rarely reflect on the words we are saying or their original context or meaning!]. Many of the Church's finest buildings or works of art are the result of victories in battle and warfare. Most of us who have grown up Christian or Catholic have done so because of the outcomes of various wars of the past. In the view of many historians, if there was a different outcome to the Battle of Lepanto [1571], most of us reading this newsletter would have grown up Muslim.

Throughout history, warfare has been the greatest stimulus to the development of human ingenuity, culture, traditions, legal systems, political systems, education, science etc. We would have remained very "primitive" and un-developed if we had not started fighting with each other.

However, we are all too aware of the tragic side of warfare – the loss of human life [especially young lives], injuries, grief, refugees, destruction of property and livelihoods etc. War comes with a huge price and our world is blighted by the tragedy, pain and divisions caused by so many wars. Warfare brings out the best and the worst in human beings. Why this is so is a mystery beyond anything our minds can fathom.



Warfare brings before our eyes the deepest complexities and paradoxes of human life, the beauty and tragedy of life, the creativity and destructiveness within us all, the love and hatred that equally drives us, the heroism we are capable of and the depravity we can sink into. War, more than anything else in human experience, teaches us who we are, confronts us with so many welcome and unwelcome truths and opens our eyes to our true potential and greatness.

Today is **Remembrance Sunday**, a day to remember and reflect upon so much. At the heart of today's celebrations is <u>Silence</u>. We remember, honour and pray for all the millions of people who have died in wars. We acknowledge the immense debt we owe to those who have gone before us. Today is also a stark reminder that there are still wars going on in so many parts of our world; some we know about, some others that never make the "news". Each war is a tragedy and there are so many of our brothers and sisters caught up in it and suffering enormous pain.

Finally today we stand in silence before the awesome responsibility we bear as people of 2010: for our world, for the generations that will come after us. Today's issues, tragedies, questions and conflicts can never be ignored, they are shaping who we are and how we live and are creating the legacy we will pass on.

"They shall not grow old, as we that are left grow old. Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them".
