The Breaking of Bread

Our Gospel today concludes with the words: "They recognised Him at the breaking of bread". In the lexicon of the early Church the 'Breaking of Bread' was another name for the Eucharist or Mass.

We could perhaps ask ourselves the question: Do I recognise Him when I come to Mass? or: What prevents me from recognising Him? Our story today can be helpful in confronting these questions. The story begins with two disciples who are feeling very down, rejected, hopes dashed and have taken the decision to walk away. Jesus is walking with them but they cannot recognise Him. Recognition does not come instantly, they must go on a journey. There are two parts or aspects to the journey.

Firstly, they must "tell their story". The first journey is back over their lives, exploring the causes and circumstances that led to their current situation. They must tell Jesus everything, allow him into every part of their history, reality and pain. This is a very difficult journey for all of us. There are places, circumstances and experiences we do not want to visit or even acknowledge. Yet if we fail to go there, our eyes remain shut to the presence of the healing and transforming of Jesus in our lives.

Secondly, they must be taught the scriptures. The journey through scripture will open their minds to receiving the wisdom and light of Jesus Christ. This is not just about knowledge of the word of God – it is about prayerfully listening to the word and letting the Word speak to us where we are now in our daily lives. We must listen to Jesus speaking to us as we journey through life and we must reflect on the events and circumstances of our lives in the light of the wisdom of scripture. If we fail to do this, there is a danger we are listening to the Jesus we invent in our heads and not to the real Jesus whom God reveals to us.

Another lesson this Gospel teaches us is that we cannot recognise the presence of Jesus in our lives without help. Help comes in various guises: Jesus Himself, the scriptures, other people, prayer, sacraments [especially the Eucharist]. If we go it alone like these two disciples, we will find ourselves going in the wrong direction. The correct direction is inward,



that is the direction this "stranger" guided the disciples during their conversation along the road – "Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road". This "stranger" was taking them deep within themselves, helping them to discover the deeper truth of themselves and their reality and ultimately to discover the God who was within them and ever present in their lives.
