Love Your Neighbour as Yourself

Today's first reading comes from the **Book of Leviticus**. It is the third book of the bible and a book I guess most people have never read! It is a book that consists entirely of laws and customs about many aspects of daily living and the worship of God. Most of these laws, rituals and customs go back to Moses and the time of the exodus but the book in its current form was completed much later [we know this because the people are obviously living in settled communities]. Both Moses and Aaron were of the tribe of Levi – this tribe did not receive land after the Exodus but because of their priestly function were to receive tithes from all the other tribes. Therefore the book in its current form was completed by Levitical priests in the period after the exile in Babylon to help the people be faithful to the ancient laws given by Moses, and to restore the true worship of Israel.

The people of Israel are God's chosen people and this must be expressed in every aspect of their lives. They must not be like the people around them – God is the measure of their holiness. The theme of the whole book can be summed up in the words we have in the extract in today's Mass: "Be holy, for I, the Lord your God, am holy".

In today's extract we find the most famous line in the Book of Leviticus: "You must love your neighbour as yourself". God is the measure of holiness, self-love is the measure of love of neighbour. These are very demanding measures which the author set before the people of Israel because they are inclined to measure themselves against the adherents to neighbouring religions. It is not what neighbouring peoples and religions do, or do not do, that matters but the law they are privileged to receive from God. The law they have received from God, through Moses, sets them apart from all other peoples and so they must be faithful to this in everything they do.

Jesus puts this message even more strongly in our Gospel today: You must not just do what tax collectors and pagans do but "you must be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect". God's perfection then is the measure of Christian perfection, nothing less!



When Jesus is asked which is the greatest commandment, he combines the very well known and revered law {the Shema}, "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind [Deuteronomy 6:5] and the command from Leviticus: "You must love your neighbour as yourself" cf. Matthew 22:34-40.

Moses received the law from God, Jesus gives it Himself with his own authority. In addition Jesus is the measure of our adherence to this new law of love. A Christian must always measure themselves by the standard of love of God and neighbour set by Jesus in his life and death.
