Sunday 24 July 2011 - Seventeenth Sunday of the Year

"To discern between Good and Evil"

Our First Reading today begins: *The Lord appeared to Solomon in a dream and said, 'Ask what you would like me to give you'*. We would all probably like an offer like that from God!

Solomon asks for a heart "to understand how to discern between good and evil". God responds: "I give you a heart wise and shrewd as none before you has had and none will have after you".

Would any of us ask for this? If we received it, would we be able to live with it? The whole biblical story of Solomon could be read as a parable to answer these two questions. Solomon received what he asked for but struggled to live with this gift and its consequences.

The story of Solomon is very relevant for all of us and it helps explain the struggles we have, to live Christian lives in our world today. The closer we come to Jesus the more we must engage in the battle between good and evil. Jesus opens our eyes to truth – truth that is both positive and negative, life-giving and destructive. To live with this awareness, insight and knowledge, when the rest of the world seems to happily ignore it, is very challenging and isolating. Solomon had many struggles but his two principle struggles are also the struggles of everyone who is called to Christian living and Christian leadership: **loneliness** and **failure**. All leadership, and particularly Christian leadership, brings one face to face with these two basic human realities.

Loneliness: More and more I hear people saying: "trying to live a Christian life today isolates me". To be a committed Christian is to live in a minority, sometimes a minority of one. The more deeply one lives one's Christian life, the less others are going to understand them [even other Christians!]. The bible illustrates this for us in the case of Solomon by telling us about his 700 wives and 300 concubines. I guess not one of these thousand women who inhabited his harem could understand him, had a real meeting of minds with him or could provide him with the understanding and support his heart craved for.

we see Jesus becoming more and more isolated as the Gosper story progresses, to finding himself totally alone on the cross. Jesus does not give us an answer but tells us to follow him there – follow him to the lonely empty space that is within each of us. This space can only be filled by God, we are tempted to fill it with so many relationships, things, ideas, etc. that do not satisfy but rather increase the enslaving desires. Inner freedom requires that we live with and embrace this empty space and allow it to be a source of creative energy and life.

Failure: My former spiritual director told me, "Matt, Christianity taught the world only one thing – <u>failure</u>. Jesus taught the world how to fail well but the world refuses to listen!! I understand more and more what he meant.

Solomon ruled Israel in a time of unprecedented peace and prosperity, yet his reign was failure in every aspect of life: economic, social, diplomatic, religious, spiritual, moral, personal. He left great achievements but is most remembered for his failures. He had not learned how to fail well.

If we learn how to fail well, how to deal with failure, how to respond creatively to failure, then we will achieve great things – few people in the history of humanity have done this. Jesus Christ is the only one who has shown us how.

Solomon got what he asked for but could not live with it or its consequences. Can we live with being Christian, and the consequences of living committed Christian lives, in the world of 2011? My guess is that few of us can or are even willing to try; but those who do are the people this world most needs but least welcomes.

This is my last Newsletter. I came here on March 28th, 2005. It has been a great joy to write these weekly Newsletters. A special thanks to **Rita McDonagh** for editing and printing them each week.

A Day for Life
