Friday Abstinence from 16 September 2011

The Bishops of England and Wales have decided that the practice of abstinence from meat on Fridays be introduced as the common act of **Friday Penance** from Friday 16 September 2011 (i.e. Friday last). If you do not eat meat, some other food should be sacrificed on Fridays. This small act of penance serves to join us all together in remembering Christ's suffering, and in joining in solidarity with those who lack the food they would like. However small this effort may be, the bishops see a real value in having an act of penance which the whole Catholic community does together on the same day.

A View for the Pew

Many people sense that being Carmelite means somehow being caught up with a life of prayer – and they would be correct. But what does this freely-chosen lifestyle consist of? Essentially, as a community, we gather each day to recite and sing what is called the **Prayer of the Church**. Two primary hours that are celebrated are in the morning and in the evening. This consists of a simple structure: we gather in our private Hermann Cohen chapel each morning and evening, to praise and petition God. We listen to God's word proclaimed, and steep this word in silent recollection to move our hearts.

The praise is in the form of recitation of psalms and canticles from sacred scripture. The petitionary form is similar to the *Prayers of the Faithful* you often hear at Mass. So we listen to a reading from God's word and we reflect on that reading in silent reverence. Is that all we do? Not all, but I thought I'd introduce you to the simplicity of some part of our way of praying. Our togetherness in prayer encompasses the mind of the Church through this simple regular practice of the Prayer of the Church. Some of you may even remember Evensong, or Vespers as it is commonly called today. We still celebrate these prayerful moments as part of our commitment to a life of prayer for the Church, and for you as perhaps busy schedules form habits difficult to make space and time to be present to God. We are called to hallow these hours for the Church, for the Order, for everyone, if only to symbolise the rising and dying of Christ – rise to good news to encourage the letting go of what disrupts this in our journey. Simply put, we let God's word disturb our comfort zones. By our fidelity to these hours that can become dry and difficult for all kinds of reasons, we stammer, struggle and strain to ponder God's word – “ever ancient, ever new” to grow in friendship with God and others.

New Liturgy - The Creed – “I believe”

The first words of **the Creed** are one of several changes to that text. When the Creed was proclaimed by the bishops at the Council of Nicea (325 AD) they used the first person, **I**. We have been used to saying “*We believe*” and it is true that we do share the same faith we proclaim. Yet we cannot speak for another person in exactly the same way as I speak for myself. I have to proclaim my personal faith and take responsibility for how I live it, not anyone else. You will notice other changes too in the Creed, all trying to come closer to the original text.
