Sunday 26 February 2012 – First Sunday of Lent

Lent

Traditionally the Church asks from us to look at three ways to prepare for Easter - almsgiving, fasting and prayer. So let us take a little look at the latter:

When Jesus taught his way of praying it was in response to his disciples' disposition. They wanted to pray like him. In a very real sense what's implicit in this encounter is their realisation of just how connected prayer and life were to be found in Jesus. That they wanted to pray like Jesus is indicative of what they saw was real for Him (c.f. Lk11.1). Prayer informed, shaped and nourished Jesus' life and now they were beginning to open themselves up and see the need for prayer in their own lives. The inseparable bond between prayer and life is summed up nicely by the catechism: "We pray as we live, because we live as we pray" (2725).

Lent draws us towards discerning the truth of this conviction. Without doubt the cry of Lent calls us to examine what may perhaps feel more like a disconnection between what we pray and what we live. Not to hide from the question. Can we say we live as we pray and pray as we live? is the challenge.

To perhaps try and move in a direction that can help us to be affirmative, St Thomas Aquinas understood that within this prayer of Jesus lies a particular order of petition, that following this order can bring us into a depth of meaning intended by Jesus. In this prayer St Thomas Aquinas perceives Christians are called to remember: "... The Lord's Prayer is the most perfect of prayers.... not only for all the things we can rightly desire, but also in the sequence that they should be desired. This prayer teaches us not only to ask for things, but also in what order we should desire them...." Interesting – a sequence to how we approach prayer.

In the *Way of Perfection*, Teresa of Avila dedicates 16 chapters as a reflection on the gift of this prayer, together with its ramifications in our spiritual journey. Teresa is immediately arrested with the depth of the first two words of Jesus' prayer: "Our Father". Why? To her it revealed prayer as so intimate and personal that it immediately caused her to become motivated to live up to this extraordinary bond *Jesus shares with us* and His Father.

The beginning of this prayer gave her the sense that Jesus had revealed the end goal. If it had come at the end of the prayer, it would not have been as attractive to her. Without this beginning, prayer would have been more about changing ourselves first before we experience the gift of God and his love. Instead, for Teresa, the beginning of this prayer expresses the conviction that God, being unconditional in his love, does not hold back from giving himself, does not require from us to change before he gives his love. Instead, God gives as intimately as God can and allows this giving to speak for itself. The invitation to pray is the invitation to wrestle with our dispositions that say 'we change, then God acts' instead of loving the fact that 'God acts in us with love and so we change'. Lent encourages each of us to keep the door of prayer open and discover this for ourselves. For, once discovered, prayer itself changes as Teresa states:

"Once they (we) are conscious of Our Lord's presence within their (our) souls, they (we) need only look upon Him and conversation will follow. This friendly conversation will not be much thinking but much loving, not a torrent of words, much less a strained prepared speech, but rather a relaxed conversation with moments of silence as there must be between friends".

'We pray as we live, because we live as we pray'.
