World Mission Sunday

Looking around our Church any Sunday we can see very clearly that we belong to a worldwide Church. People of almost every race and nationality in the world come to our Church. This is something we need to acknowledge and celebrate – we are all enriched by this in many different ways. Some of us come from parts of the world where the Church is "old" – that is, a Church whose origins go back many centuries and some almost to the beginning of Christianity. Others come from countries where the Church is "new" – perhaps only a few centuries or even less. In some countries the Church is growing rapidly, blessed with many vocations and youthful vigour. In other places the Church seems to be diminishing or facing difficult and painful challenges. We are all part of the one Church and had the joy of recently celebrating the presence of our Holy Father, Pope Benedict, among us.

From the very beginning of Christianity, Christians were aware that the Good News of Jesus Christ was meant for everyone. It is a "light to enlighten the Gentiles and the glory of your people Israel" [Luke 2:31] and Jesus commanded "go make disciples of all the nations" [Matthew 28:19]. However, the story of the spread of the Gospel has been slow, challenging and at times painful. Though there are Christians in every country of our world, and the Church has never had as many members as it has today, there are still millions who do not know Jesus Christ.

The work of spreading the Gospel must always go on, it can never stop — when it stops, the Church itself dies. We cannot be Christian, we cannot be Church, without a concern for the spreading of the Gospel. Whatever other concerns, challenges or crisis we may have, these must never be allowed to distract the Church from what is one of its fundamental reasons for existence and its first duty to humanity.

In our second reading today we listen to a very elderly St Paul writing to his friend and co-worker Timothy who is now in charge of the Church of Ephesus. Paul is reflecting on his experience of working to spread the Gospel and the challenges, opposition and hardship this caused him.
