Sunday 21 November 2010 - Solemnity of Christ the King

'Let Him save Himself if He is the Christ'

Today is the **Feast of Christ the King** and the last Sunday of the Church's year. Throughout the past year we have been reading the *Gospel of St Luke* [next Sunday we begin *Matthew's Gospel*] We have seen and reflected upon many characteristics of how Luke presents Jesus to us. One of these characteristics is Jesus as **Saviour** - note how often we see the words: *Saviour*, *Save*, *Salvation*. Let us recall a few examples:

"My spirit exults in God my saviour" [Mary, in her prayer].

"A saviour has been born to you" [Angel to the shepherds].

"My eyes have seen <u>salvation</u>" [Simeon when he sees the baby].

"Today salvation has come to this house" [Jesus to Zacchaeus].

These are just a few examples of many we could have quoted. In our Gospel today we have Jesus upon the cross and this is the question that the scene poses: Is Jesus really the person this Gospel claims him to be? We could argue that the opponents of Jesus get it absolutely right – if Jesus is Saviour, then he should not be on the cross, he cannot possibly die – he must be able to save himself! For Luke, author of this Gospel, the whole credibility of his story depends on the answer to this question. So how is the question answered?

- * Salvation is not an escape, it is not a running away from truth, reality, pain, death etc. It is not a last resort we turn to when everything else has gone wrong.
- * We are not saved <u>from</u> being human, we are saved <u>by</u> being human. Human life, lived well, lived as it should be lived, is a journey of salvation. *We are not saved on our terms but on God's terms. We cannot dictate to God "Have you no fear of God at all?"
- * Salvation is a loving acceptance of God and all that God wants to give us.
- *Salvation is not a possession or a right, it is a relationship "Jesus remember me when you come into your kingdom".
- * There is no one beyond the reach of God's salvation, the first one to be saved is a guilty criminal nailed to a cross. It is not a reward, it can never be deserved, it is always a free gift, a gift available to everyone who has the humility to ask.

For us, the most important line of this Gospel passage is the first one: "The people stayed there before the cross watching Jesus". We are these people, the readers, the listeners to this Gospel. We must stay for a long time before the cross. This scene is a beautiful painting we must never take our eyes off. That is what Mary does at the beginning of the Gospel, it is now what every Christian must do. We will never fully understand how Jesus is Saviour or King or God but we must follow Him, stay with Him, humbly speak with Him and be open to receiving his gifts.
