Letter to the Philippians

For four Sundays, of which this is the second, we have extracts from *St Paul's Letter to the Philippians*. In New Testament times, Philippi was an important Roman city in the north east of Macedonia. It was situated on the important Roman road to the east and was the site of Mark Antony's defeat of Brutus and Cassius in 31BC. The population of Philippi was a mixture of Roman veterans and Macedonians with a small Jewish population. We read in the *Acts of the Apostles* that the Jews did not have a Synagogue but met for prayer at a place by the river and that is where Paul first went to speak with them.

The Church in Philippi was the first that Paul founded in Europe. From Paul's Letter to the Philippians we can see that Paul seems to have a particular love for this Church – some people suggest it was Paul's favourite Christian community! The background to his Letter to the Philippians could be summarised as follows:

- * Paul is in prison it is not clear where or when.
- * The Christian community in Philippi has been particularly kind to Paul and he wants to acknowledge this generosity.
- * There are divisions in the Church.
- * Some person or persons have upset or disturbed the Christians of Philippi.

We could sum up Paul's message to the Christians of Philippi with these two statements:

Only Jesus Christ matters - the preaching of the Gospel and the unity and solidarity of all who believe.

Jesus is our source of joy and therefore a Christian must always remain joyful [look at how often the words joy and rejoice are used in this letter].

Our Second Reading today is perhaps the best known and most often quoted passage of this letter. It begins with an appeal to the Christians to be like Jesus Christ - to have the mind of Jesus Christ. Then Paul quotes this beautiful hymn [whether Paul wrote this hymn or is quoting a well-known early Christian hymn, we do not know].

The content of the hymn can be seen in six movements:-

- 1. Jesus is God.
- 2. Jesus voluntarily lets go of this and fully accepts the human condition, even the unpleasant aspects like slavery.
- 3. Jesus goes further and accepts death, even an exceptionally painful and humiliating criminal's death on a cross.
- 4. God raises Jesus up to the highest possible place.
- 5. All that exists in heaven, earth and the underworld must pay Jesus homage.
- 6. All people must acclaim Jesus as God and give glory to the one true God.

A Christian, then, must know and appreciate what it means to be a disciple of this same Jesus. To be a disciple of Jesus is the greatest of all gifts of God and that is why Paul says to the Christians of Philippi: "Be united in your convictions and united in your love, with a common purpose and a common mind. That is the one thing that would make me completely happy".
