'Be Opened'

In today's Gospel Jesus is in pagan territory and they bring him a man who is deaf and dumb. The people ask Jesus "to lay his hands on him". This is a gesture used in many of the sacraments of the Church; it is a prayer for healing, blessing and an invocation of the Holy Spirit.

Jesus effortlessly restores his powers of hearing and speech. Word spreads everywhere and "their admiration was unbounded. He has done all things well, he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak". Limitless admiration and astonishment sum up the atmosphere of this scene. What is really happening is much greater and more far-reaching than the astonishing change in one person's circumstances.

Jesus is opening the ears and giving a voice to all into whose lives he comes. Jesus opens the ears of all who are deaf to the voice of truth, goodness, beauty, love, justice, etc. whatever it is we are deaf to, once Jesus enters our lives we can no longer be imprisoned by, or hold on to, our deafness. Those who hear the word of God are given a voice – a voice that speaks words of comfort, hope, truth, wisdom [welcome or unwelcome] to all the world. From early Christian times, blessing the ears and mouth has been part of the baptism ceremony. This is also one of the ceremonies in the RCIA journey. The name of the ceremony is "Ephphatha" which is the Aramaic word used by Jesus and means "Be opened". In Baptism a person's mind, heart, life is opened to the presence, action and words of Jesus. A Christian is given the grace to hear God's word and to speak his word through their life style, actions, attitudes and words.

Baptism is a very personal experience but its implications go way beyond the individual. This Gospel story wonderfully illustrates this aspect of baptism for us. We do not even know the name of the man but nothing can stop the news of him spreading – nothing can stop an individual who accepts the Gospel from spreading it. Throughout the history of Christianity scholars have been puzzled by the geography in the first sentence of today's Gospel – read it with a map in front of you [Jesus seems to be going in four different directions at the one time!].

Mark, of course, is not interested in giving us a geography lesson, he wants to make a much more profound point. Jesus is in our work created using

There can be no limits to who can hear it, who can be healed or forgiven by it or who can be the medium through whom it is heard. The word is spreading in an uncontrollable way and the normal rules of navigation or locomotion do not apply.

I conclude with how another translator translates the conclusion of this Gospel passage: "But as much as he tried to command them, they proclaimed it all the more extravagantly. And they were superextravagantly amazed, saying, 'He has done everything well: even the deaf he makes to hear, and speechless ones to speak".

No person who receives Jesus Christ and is baptised can remain deaf and without a voice.
