The Triumph of the Cross

Two weeks ago in our Sunday Gospel we had Jesus address these strong, and rather harsh, words to Peter: "Get behind me Satan! You are an obstacle in my path, because the way you think is not God's way but man's". Peter was trying to stop Jesus going to his destiny – suffering and death on a cross. In doing so, Peter was refusing to accept God's way of thinking and God's way of doing things. More fundamentally Peter was denying the most basic fact of the Christian message: Jesus saves us on the cross.

Human beings cannot save themselves. We are saved by God's free and undeserved generosity and love. How we are to be saved is God's choice: his son Jesus becoming human, living, suffering, dying and rising from the dead. There are many other ways he could have chosen but he did not. Jesus did not have to die on a cross, he could have died in so many other ways but this is God's choice. God's motive was love, so beautifully expressed by Jesus in our Gospel today: God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son. These are powerful words and we could turn Peter's objection around and express it this way: Peter loves Jesus so much that he is not prepared to give him up to suffering and death.

We celebrate today: the *triumph* of God's way of doing things over human ways, victory coming out of what appears to us to be defeat, life emerging out of death. Only God can turn death on a cross into victory and life.

Let us remind ourselves of the well-known words of St Paul in his first Letter to the Corinthians: Here are we preaching a crucified Christ; to the Jews an obstacle that they cannot get over; to the pagans, madness, but to those who have been called, whether they be Jews or Greeks, a Christ who is the power and Wisdom of God.

Paul is convinced from his experience that the cross is essential to the presentation of Christianity – in other words, to try to preach or teach a Christianity that denies or plays down the cross is doing Christianity a great disservice.

In this Feast, not only do we celebrate what God has done for us, we also celebrate His <u>way</u> of doing it. The challenge that Peter is confronted with is also our challenge: Can I accept that the cross is essential to Christianity? There is no other way. Every time we pray we begin by making **a sign of the Cross**; this is a very visible and physical reminder that we cannot approach or speak with God without accepting the cross. The cross is our point of access to God. This is so beautifully expressed for us in our second reading today: in this early Christian hymn, Jesus becomes human in every sense of the word, even to accepting death. The cross brings God so close to us. Jesus, by suffering and dying on a cross and being buried in a tomb, shows us that there is no place in human experience that is unknown to God. Therefore our salvation is completed. That is why the cross is so precious to us Christians.
