Sunday 18 January 2009 – Second Sunday of the Year

Infant Jesus

[Next Sunday we will have the celebration of the "Santo Niño" here in our Church. Today I give something of the historic and Carmelite background to this devotion].

Devotion to the child Jesus is inspired by the gospel accounts of the birth of Jesus – we could say that the first people to worship the child Jesus are the shepherds and the Magi - 'And going into the house they saw the child with his mother Mary, and falling to their knees they did him homage'. It was only a matter of time before Christians began to depict the child Jesus in art – drawing, painting and sculpture. Many saints are noted for their devotion to the child Jesus; for example, St Francis of Assisi, St Anthony of Padova and St Bernard of Chlairvaux. St Teresa of Avila took her sculpture of the child Jesus around with her when she was founding her convents.

The devotion was particularly strong in Spain and it is there that the statue of the Child Jesus of Prague originates. The sculpture is the work of an unknown Spanish artist and is said to have originally been in a convent somewhere between Cordoba and Seville. It was given to Maria Manrique de Lara by her mother on the occasion of her wedding to a Czech nobleman Vojech of Pernstejn. She in turn gave it as a wedding gift to her daughter who on the death of her husband gave the sculpture to the Carmelites in Prague [perhaps we see here the origins of the tradition of praying to the Infant of Prague at weddings].

At first the Carmelites kept the statue in a private chapel and the novices prayed before it twice a day. Then later the statue was moved to the main Church and became very popular.

In 1631 the Saxons invaded Prague and the Church was destroyed. Some time later Fr Cyril, a Carmelite Priest from Munich, visited the ruined Church and found the statue thrown out with other rubble. The sculpture was badly damaged and Fr Cyril raised money for its restoration, and so once more it became an object of devotion, and many miracles are associated with it.

During the 17th century there was much turmoil due to ongoing wars with the Swedes and in 1784 the Carmelites lost their Church and monastery. Later it became a parish Church under the care of the Knights of Malta. In 1993 the Carmelites were invited back to Prague to take over the Church



they had lost more than 200 years earlier. Once more it has become a place of prayer, pilgrimage and devotion to the Child Jesus.

From the very beginning an important part of the devotion to this statue has been dressing it. Even when Fr Cyril found the damaged statue it was dressed in blue. Today the statue has over 70 dresses, the oldest dating back to 1700, and many modern ones, donated from all over the world.

We can understand from this little history how the tradition of praying to the Infant of Prague at time of war began. I will conclude with some lines from a letter of St Edith Stein written in the midst of World War Two, just a few months before her own death in Auschwitz. [The Carmel of Cologne where Edith was a sister from 1933-1938 had a special mission to promote devotion to the Infant of Prague in Germany].

"Yesterday, when I looked at a picture of the Infant of Prague, it suddenly occurred to me that he is wearing imperial coronation dress and surely it was not accidental that his efficacy should come to the fore precisely in Prague. After all, Prague has been the court of the old German and Roman Emperors, respectively, and the city makes such a majestic impression that no other city known to me can compare with it, not even Paris and Vienna. The Little Jesus came exactly when the political imperial grandeur came to an end in Prague. Is he not the secret Emperor who will some day put an end to all misery? After all, he holds the reins even though people believe they are the rulers".
