Advent

Today we begin the **Season of Advent.** Listening to the prayers and readings of our Mass today, it is clear that, among other themes, Advent is about the future. As human beings, the future is a constant concern for us. We need to plan ahead, keep diaries, make decisions etc. Depending on age or stage in life, major decisions have to be thought about; education, career, marriage, children, retirement etc. Looking forward to the future can be exciting and life-giving, it can also be worrying and burdensome. Advent is the Church's season for looking forward to the future. We are looking forward to the celebration of the birth of Jesus at Christmas but much more importantly we are looking forward to the future that Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection guarantees for us. As Christians we live life with our eyes and hearts set on the future, a future that will never end, a future of love, peace and happiness in God's presence forever.

Our Christian faith poses the following question: Does our belief in the Resurrection and heaven make us more confident, secure, less prone to worry and anxiety etc. That is a difficult question but one that needs asking. There are two more immediate and possibly more relevant questions we could reflect upon today:

What is the biggest, most important and most far-reaching decision I am facing in my life at present?

What is the issue, concern or question that most worries or burdens me at present?

The answers to these two questions are not necessarily the same - in fact, very often they are not. The first question concerns the big, life-changing decisions. These have long-term implications not only for the person taking the decisions but often for many other people also. The second question concerns what we might call the every-day issues of life. Often these can cause us more pain and anxiety than the really big decisions. Many people believe that they do not have a future – a future that they can look forward to, a future they are motivated to work for and a future in which their dreams and ambitions can be fulfilled. In addition many people look forward to the future with fear, anxiety and indifference. This is the cause of so many of the problems of our world and society.



The message of **Advent** is filled with hope – not a hope that can easily turn to illusion but a hope that is grounded in our faith in the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Advent speaks so often about how near God is – if God is near, then we have nothing to fear and every encouragement to be creative, courageous, innovative and industrious. A Christian can never sit back and be indifferent or despondent when God is so near.

During Advent we are encouraged to witness to our Christian faith by our confidence in the future, by the hope we share with others and our efforts to encourage, challenge and enlighten those around us.
