The Vine and the Branches

In our Gospel today Jesus tells us: "I am the true vine". This is one of the best known of the images Jesus uses to tell us who he is. However, he is not just telling us who he is, much more importantly he is telling us who we are and the type of relationship he would like to have with us.

That sums up what our Gospel today is about. The message is very simple but very difficult for us to hear. As we listen to this passage and to many other passages of the Gospels, we can sense Jesus' frustration - the message is simple but human beings do not want to listen. We are faced here with some of the most fundamental misunderstandings of the spiritual life

Who is God? Jesus? Holy Spirit? How does a term like "True Vine" or "Good Shepherd" or "Light of the World", or any of the many other images we are familiar with, help us to answer this question? When we try to explore or understand these complex images, we tend to become confused and irritated. We seek answers that are clear and that we can be comfortable with. In order to know God we must go to that place where the answers are not clear and we are taken beyond our comfort zones.

Who am I? What does it mean to be human? Is it helpful to be told we are branches of a vine? The spiritual life asks serious questions of us. It challenges our self-sufficiency, our false autonomy, our intellectual superiority, our securities, our stubborn wills and the inner tyranny of our wants, needs and fears. Who am I when all the illusions are stripped away – or to use the terminology of today's Gospel, who am I when I am pruned by God?

What kind of relationship does God want to have with me? This scares us!! We are not sure about God and if getting to know him involves so much change, pain and growth and we cannot control the outcome – do I really want to keep on this journey? That is the very question that is on the minds of the disciples Jesus is addressing. They could follow him up until now (with a few difficulties along the way) but now he is asking them to really step into the unknown.

To live a Christian spiritual life is to live a life that takes us beyond what we can understand, control or express; it means recognising our total dependence on God's love and mercy and most importantly it calls us to deeper and deeper trust in Him. These words of St Thérèse sum it up for us: "What pleases God in my little soul is that he sees me loving my littleness and my poverty: it is the blind hope that I have in his mercy. That is my only treasure. Why can it not be yours? To love Jesus, the more one is weak, without desires and without virtues, the more one is suitable for the operations of God's consuming and transforming love. It is confidence and nothing but confidence that must lead us to love". St Thérèse understood deeply what Jesus is talking about here.

Next Sunday's Gospel is a continuation of today's – it is all about love. When we allow God to do in us what he wants to do, then we begin to know his love and he leads us to a deeper love. When we become stuck in the questions I quoted above, then we keep God at a distance and our love remains superficial and not very fruitful: "It is to the glory of my Father that you should bear much fruit and then you will be my disciples".
