The Mission of Jesus

Our Gospel today comes at a particularly difficult time for Jesus. We have just been told about his rejection by his own people and immediately after this extract we are told about the beheading of John the Baptist. Jesus is trying to get his mission off the ground and these are two major setbacks – rejection by the people he would naturally expect to be supportive and the terrible news that his cousin, who has been chosen to prepare the way for him, has been beheaded.

What does Jesus do? Rather than getting discouraged, Jesus decides to press ahead with his mission and move it forward to the next stage - the sending out of his disciples. The two important points being made about the mission of Jesus in this Gospel are:

- 1. In the face of opposition, setbacks and obstacles, the message must not be compromised, adapted or apologised for. The full message of the Gospel must be preached at all times and in all circumstances. The Gospel is a powerful message and no human forces can get in its way. The mission of Jesus [and later of the Church] goes forward in all times and circumstances. How the Gospel is presented and lived will vary and adapt to circumstances but its essential message remains the same. The message that Jesus asks his disciples to preach is exactly the same as what he preaches himself and they are asked to do the same work as he does. The work the Church does today and its message is exactly the same, though times, circumstances and methods have changed.
- 2. The disciples of Jesus are sent to bring the Good News to others. They must do so without any self-interest or any hope of personal gain. A disciple is at the service of Jesus and is totally dependent on the Holy Spirit. Again this is true for the Church in all times and circumstances. The building up of the Kingdom of God and the spreading of the Good News is not a human enterprise. No human forces can stop it. Likewise no human ingenuity, power or initiative can alter it, speed it up or improve it. It is a work of God, and his disciples are at its service.
