### *He followed Him along the Road*

We are reading Mark's Gospel this year. Over recent Sundays we have been meeting Jesus at various stages of his journey to Jerusalem. Today he is leaving Jericho for the last stage of the journey [next Sunday he will be in Jerusalem]. Jerusalem, as we well know, is where his suffering and death takes place. That is the background to the story of Bartimaeus which we have today – one of the most beautiful and well known of Gospel stories. When this story is read outside of its Gospel context, that is what it remains – a beautiful, attractive and uplifting Gospel story. At the beginning of the last stage of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem, Mark's Gospel poses the most difficult and challenging of all questions: "How can one joyfully and enthusiastically become a disciple [a follower] of Jesus knowing that the cross is around the next corner?" We are confronted with that most thought-provoking of questions in this carefully constructed story.

When we first meet Bartimaeus he is *"sitting at the side of the road"*. In other words he is not part of the crowd who are following Jesus, he is not yet a disciple. All changes when he "hears" that he is in the presence of Jesus.

The prayer of Bartimaeus is: *"Son of David have pity [mercy] on me"*. Bartimaeus recognised what he really needs from Jesus: mercy, forgiveness, salvation, wisdom, spiritual sight. We are told that Bartimaeus *threw off his cloak, jumped up and went [rushed] to Jesus*. He comes to Jesus naked, vulnerable, open, enthusiastic, joyful and courageous. His faith has been awakened and he is open to and ready for a complete change of life.

Bartimaeus receives his sight from Jesus and he follows Jesus along the road – that is how the story ends. He can see through the eyes of faith who Jesus is. With eyes open he can embrace the challenge, power and joy of discipleship. Bartimaeus can see the full meaning of this when the eyes of his faith are opened. The journey to the cross is the journey of true discipleship.

When a child is baptised, the ceremony begins with the placing of the sign of the cross on the child's forehead. Those who are at our evening Mass this Sunday will see our new **RCIA candidates** signed with the sign of the cross. It is the beginning and end of our faith journeys and our source of strength along the way. Once Bartimaeus has met Jesus and had his eyes opened, there is nowhere else for him to go except follow Jesus "*along the road*". For Bartimaeus, Jesus is not some wonder-worker, magician or benefactor. Jesus has come to give him life, light, love, wisdom and strength, and the source of all this is the cross of Jesus.

This story beautifully illustrates to us that there is no contradiction between the joy, wonder and peace of following Jesus and the cross of Jesus. In fact the two are the one reality. Those who generously and courageously embrace the cross are the most joyful, courageous and peace-filled Christians.
