Remembrance Sunday

We welcome you all to our Mass today, **Remembrance Sunday**, as we remember and pray for those who gave their lives in two world wars and in other conflicts of our time. The 11.00am Mass will be a **Requiem Mass** especially for them. We pray also for the families who have been bereaved and we pray for peace.

Why do we Pray for the Dead?

Having reflected upon some questions last week, I have been asked by various people: What do we mean by "Praying for the dead?", "Praying for the Holy Souls?", "Souls in Purgatory?" or whatever phrase one uses or has heard.

In order to respond to this we need to remind ourselves of certain facts about death. Our physical bodies die but our spirits live on. Therefore after death we are still the same human beings, the unique persons we always were and that God created us to be. Love does not die, neither do our relationships. After death our spiritual lives continue and the process of spiritual growth which began in this life continues. Our spiritual lives and spiritual growth are very dependent on the support and prayers of the Church and that essential relationship continues after death. Praying for the dead then is a continuation of the support, friendship and love that sustains us in this life and which we believe to be an essential support for the spiritual growth that still needs to take place after death.

"Purgatory" is the name the Church uses for the place, situation, stage, process, in which this growth takes place after death. We have no way of understanding how life after death might be, so our explanations and teachings are based on our understanding of spiritual growth as we know it in this life. Purgatory is not a punishment, it is a gift and an invitation. We were created for union with God and God offers the possibility of that union to all of us. In order to be ready for union with God we must first be converted, cleansed, purified and transformed into the people we were really created to be. While this process begins in this world, most of us die before it is complete.

All growth and change involves pain, sacrifice and depravation – this we know very well from our experience of life. "Fire" is an image often used by spiritual writers to describe this transformation and it is a word often used in traditional teaching about purgatory. Let us listen to St John of the Cross describing how this fire works: "The very fire of love that afterwards is united with the soul, glorifying it, is what previously assailed it by purging it, just as a fire that penetrates a log of wood is the same that first makes an assault on the wood, wounding it with the flame, drying it out, stripping it of its unsightly qualities until it is so disposed that it can be penetrated and transformed into the fire..... The very God who desires to enter within the soul through the union and transformation of love is He who first assails and purges it with the light and heat of His divine flame".

After death we are exposed to a love of God that is deeper and more complete than anything we knew or could imagine in this life. It is going to take time, pain, healing, growth and transformation for us to be ready to fully receive, live and reciprocate that love.

St John of the Cross tells us that "This Flame of Love is the Holy Spirit". Purgatory then is the Holy Spirit completing in us after death the work he had begun in us during this life. Our prayers are the help, support and love we give to each other; a help, support and love that death cannot take away, rather they become deeper and richer when freed from the limitations of this life.
