"My Words will not Pass Away"

Nowadays we hear much about the fragile nature of our world and its uncertain future. Perhaps we are tempted to feel that this is a new phenomena. Looking at the scriptures [both Old and New Testaments], we see that biblical people are very aware of the fragility of the world and the fragility of human life. They do not use terms like "global warming" but they can point to much evidence that makes them aware of how fragile and uncertain their future is: wars, conflicts, famines, earthquakes, diseases etc. The approach the Bible takes to this is twofold. Firstly the Bible acknowledges and gives voice to these deep human fears; hence the frequent use of dramatic and very vivid language and imagery. The biblical writers were far better psychologists than we often give them credit for, they understood that human fears cannot be left unacknowledged or unspoken. All our deepest pains, worries, fears, insecurities etc. are to be found expressed in words, imagery and prayer. This is more true than ever when it comes to all the unanswered questions about our future destiny.

Secondly the scriptures continue to emphasise that we can only place our trust in God. Even if, or when, the whole world as we know it comes to an end, God will still be there and in control of everything including our destiny. When all human power, knowledge, systems and experience fail us, God is there, and whatever takes place is part of his greater plan for us. This approach is not an invitation to complacency, naivety or indifference, we must do all we can to save, build up and care for our world and human life. So what does the scripture tell us we must do? **Pray** – prayer is the constant theme coming through in these readings. Prayer is not some kind of last resort, what we do when we cannot do anything else. It is prayer that saves and builds up our world and human life. When we are praying as we should be, then we are in contact with God, his wisdom is guiding and instructing us [even though we are unaware of this most of the time]. In addition, prayer shows us what we really should be doing and gently moves us to give up what is not important or relevant. It is prayer that keeps Hope alive in us, and prayer that gives us the security and strength to live, act and decide wisely in all the uncertain and fragile situations human life places us in.



Many of the scripture readings we have at Mass at this time of year speak of this theme. Our Gospel today gives us a good example:

"In those days, after a time of distress, the sun will be darkened, the moon will lose its brightness..... and then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory...." A little further on we read: "Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away".
