Sunday 22 November 2009 – Solemnity of Christ the King

#### ***Jesus Christ, Universal King***

*"All who are on the side of truth listen to my voice"*. These are the very profound words of Jesus with which our Gospel passage today ends. He is explaining to Pilate the nature of the kingdom He is king of. His kingdom is *"not of this world"* and therefore must be understood in a way completely different from how we understand human power, government or society.

This is a kingdom in which the battles fought are not for power, territory or wealth but for *"Truth"*. Those who fight this battle *"listen to Him"*.

I recommend you to read quietly and prayerfully this entire passage of John's Gospel [John 18:18 – 19:16]. Better again act it out – it is written very much as a drama to be acted out. We see before us the battle between human power and the power of God. Watch carefully where the drama is taking place: inside and outside [Inside – Jesus, quiet, dignified, in control. Outside – the opponents, getting more noisy and out of control as the drama unfolds]. Moving between the two stages is Pilate becoming increasingly weak and frightened. Pilate decides to crucify Jesus because his fear of Caesar, the Jewish leaders and the crowd is stronger than his attraction to Jesus and his belief in Jesus' innocence.

Pilate was afraid to be on *"the side of Truth"* and therefore takes a conscious decision not to *"listen to Him"*. The consequence is death – the death of Jesus, the death of truth, innocence, justice, freedom, human dignity etc. etc. The choice Pilate is faced with is the most fundamental choice of human existence and this drama shows us clearly and vividly the consequences of that choice.

Pilate is the mirror-image of each one of us. A little later in the drama Jesus will say to Pilate: *"You would have no power over me if it had not been given you from above"*. The most astounding fact about the Kingdom of God is not that it is freely offered to us but that we have the power and freedom to refuse it. This Kingdom does not come to us with a powerful army or great wealth but with a vulnerability that gives us the freedom and power to *"crucify him"*.

The Kingdom of God is everything we most desire as human beings, it is human life as we would wish to live it: *truth, life, holiness, grace, justice, love, peace* [cf. Preface of today's Mass]. The tragedy of human life is that we allow other loud voices to instil sufficient fear in us that we fail to choose what we really desire.

The Kingdom of God is "*not of this world*" because it does not conquer us with power, wealth or any other type of force. The Kingdom of God must be freely chosen and only those who "*listen to His voice*" and are on the "*side of Truth*" have the freedom to make that choice.
