40 Hours Eucharistic Adoration

From this Sunday evening to Tuesday midday we welcome many people to this Church for the **40 Hours Adoration.** It is a great privilege for us to host this event and we hope and pray it will be a rich spiritual experience for all who partake.

This practice of spending 40 hours at prayer before the Blessed Sacrament has its origins in the Middle Ages. Its original purpose was to pray for reparation for sins, for protection from danger and for peace. The number 40 was chosen principally because that was considered the number of hours Jesus spent in the tomb between his death and resurrection. This devotion then is very much linked with Holy Week and particularly with the silence of Holy Saturday. However, the number 40 has many other biblical significances. For example, the people of Israel spent 40 years in the desert, Jesus was in the wilderness 40 days before he began his public ministry and there are 40 days between the Resurrection and the Ascension. This devotion is associated with all these events and a vivid reminder of their spiritual significance. This is a time for us to reflect on the journey God is leading us on in our lives, it is a time of intense prayer and spiritual growth and is a time for us to renew and deepen our faith in the resurrection.

We are told in the Catechism that the "Eucharist is the <u>source</u> and the <u>summit</u> of the Christian life.... In the Blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ Himself". All Christian life has its origin in the Eucharist and is sustained by the Eucharist. We cannot be fully Christian without the Eucharist. The Eucharist is the high point of our relationship with God, we are never closer to Him than we are through the Eucharist.

The mystery of the Eucharist is so great, it is beyond all human understanding or explanation. Faced with the enormity of this mystery, we are naturally drawn to silence and contemplation. These days and nights are a privileged time for this. They are a time to sit with Jesus who died and rose for us, who is always with us and who gave us his body and blood to sustain us on our journeys through life in this world.

- * The 6.00pm Mass this Sunday evening is a special <u>Opening Mass</u> for the **40 Hours.**
- * The 12.15 Mass on Tuesday is a special <u>Closing Mass.</u>
- * Our other weekday Masses will be celebrated as usual.
- * You are welcome to come any time, day or night, during this time.
- * During some of the night time hours, the Church doors will be closed for security reasons. There will be a notice on the door telling you what to do to enter.
- * We will be welcoming parishioners from the other parishes of Kensington and Chelsea and other people from around the Diocese.
- * Most of the time will be silent prayer but occasionally various groups will lead some prayers and reflections.

<u>Special reminder:</u> We will have our **Carmelite Saints Holy Hour** tomorrow, Monday from 6.40-7.40pm, <u>during the **40 Hours**</u>, and <u>not</u> on Monday 26 April as earlier announced.
