Wedding at Cana in Galilee

"This was the first of the <u>signs</u> given by <u>Jesus</u>, it was given at Cana in Galilee. He let his <u>glory</u> be seen and his disciples <u>believed</u> in him".

Today we read one of the best known stories of all the Gospels: **The Wedding at Cana in Galilee.** I have begun by quoting the conclusion which is the key to understanding the story and seeing its importance. We need to read this passage remembering how John concludes his entire Gospel: there were many <u>signs</u> that <u>Jesus</u> worked and the <u>disciples</u> saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that <u>you</u> may believe that <u>Jesus</u> is the Christ, the Son of God, and that <u>believing</u> this <u>you</u> may have life through his name".

I have underlined the key word in these quotes to help us reflect on the deeper meaning of this story. John's Gospel is a gradual unfolding of two mysteries: the mystery of who Jesus is and the mystery of belief in him. The appearance of 180 gallons of the finest quality wine might seem important, or at least interesting or attractive to us, but in this story it gets forgotten about immediately. Our attention is called to the real importance of the story: it is part of the gradual revealing of who Jesus is ["He let his glory be seen"] and it is a sign that helps lead the disciples to belief ["His disciples believed in him"].

We are told this story by John so that we [the readers] may believe and that believing we may have life through him. There is one other word I could have underlined in these quotations: saw, see, see. At the end of the Gospel of John, Jesus speaks these words to Thomas: You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen Jesus in the flesh and have not seen the signs like the miracle at Cana.

The Gospel writers are not just concerned with communicating to us information about Jesus, they are also concerned with helping us to believe and strengthening the faith we already have. The Gospels are the fruit of the prayers, reflection and experience of Christian living of the early Church. We need this story and stories like it to help us build up our faith



This story invites us to reflect on how we use the Gospels, the use we make of them in our personal prayer and the choices of text we make when we have to choose for a special occasion - marriage, anniversaries, baptisms, other celebrations. I guess one of the reasons this Gospel is so familiar is because it is so frequently chosen for special occasions. It is also very familiar because every catechism programme, RCIA programme, prayer group and faith sharing group will make use, and often frequent use, of this passage. In doing so we are using it for what the author intended it to be used for.

The early Church learned through experience of the type of stories and reflections that were needed to help build and sustain the faith of believers – the same stories and reflections can build and sustain our faith also.
